Patterns of Lament

- 1. Invocation/ Address- To whom is the Lament given For us, this would be the Lord.
- 2. Lament- What is the problem or issue?

 It's time to voice your complaint and/or point out a seeming inconsistency.
- 3. Confession of faith- rehearsal of the historical acts of the Lord's character


 The reason we can lament is based on the fact that we trust the one to

- 4. Request- Ask for deliverance, a change, or intervention
- 5. Praise- Thank God for the way he has already worked. This can include a vow, "When you act, I will _____
