Literary Context

- Threefold Office of Christ
- Narrative Setting
- Overall Themes & Significance
- Three Main Sections
 - Jesus Prays for His Own Glorification (Verses 1–5)
 - Jesus prays for his own glorification, reflecting on his authority to grant eternal life to those given to him by the Father.
 - Jesus Prays for His Disciples (Verses 6–19)



- He intercedes for his immediate disciples, whom the Father has given him out of the world. Key elements include protection, unity, sanctification, and joy amid worldly opposition.
- Jesus Prays for All Future Believers (Verses 20–26)
 - Jesus extends his prayer to all future believers who will come to faith through the disciples' message, emphasizing unity, love, and eternal presence with him.

- 2. What is clarified?
- 3. What questions do we still have about it?
