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A number that appears very frequently in the Bible is the number three. Now, many times the same number can convey a few different things. For example, in the study of the number three that we're embarking in now, the number three relates to revealing, or testing. Now, testing and revealing are closely related. Why do I say that? Well, a teacher, for example, will give to his or her students a tests in order to reveal and to discover what the students have learned from these lectures from this course. And in the same way, when the number three appears in the Bible, it is for the purpose of revealing something, and sometimes a person is tested. In order to reveal something specifically, let me give you some biblical examples. And let me emphasize biblical examples. Because the significance of the numbers are only found in the verses in the Scripture meaning this, we can't apply the significance of biblical numbers to other aspects of our life, this is wrong and dangerous. And again, we're not talking about give my tray the numerical value of words, this is something that I do not agree with. But when we look at numbers in the Bible, we see something in regard to the number three, we show it reveals a message in a testing for the purpose of Revelation. And here's the example, Jonah, Jonah was given an assignment, he didn't want to do it. And he wanted to flee from the presence of the Lord. And God tested that does he really want to flee from the presence of God? And Jonah was placed in the belly of a fish, three days and three nights? Did he really want to flee from the presence of the Lord? Well, during that time, it says that he longed for the courts of God for the sanctuary of God, who's in the sanctuary of God, God, Jonah was proven to be false. He wanted the presence of God in his life. He was not acting faithfully. Here's another example. Peter, Peter said, All I'll never deny you, you can trust me. Others might deny you, but I'm willing to die for you. And we know something. We know that Peter denied Messiah three times. What he was saying was not accurate. And the number three revealed that the number three conveyed that but in Peters restoration, Messiah asked him three times do you love me? And those three questions were testing Peters love, they were confirming they were revealing to the reader. Yes, Peter had change. Peter was a new person. He wasn't the same one that he was when he denied him before the resurrection, that resurrection had caused Peter to become new, it revealed it to us. And we see many times in the Scripture, something takes place in the third year of a particular king. And what follows is quite revealing, quite informing. So the number three in the scripture has to do with revealing or uncovering, declaring something. Now, I mentioned earlier that numbers sometimes can have more than one significance. The number three can also relate to victory. We see

that the purposes of God are frequently fulfilled on the third day. That's why the resurrection relates to the third day We also see, for example, in the offering up of Isaac, the binding of Isaac, it came about on the third day. So three relates to revealing a declaring a discovery. But three can also relate to victory. So when the Bible says that Messiah rose from the dead on the third day, it reveals the life that he is able to give to his followers. But it also speaks of that type of light, that quality of life, it reveals that which is a victorious life. So I would invite you look and take the time to do a study of the number three in the Scripture. Look at the places where the number three appears in the Bible. And I think you will agree that that number three, wherever it appears, has to do with revealing discovering something revealing something and oftentimes, in a victorious manner.
