Sermon Notes: The Parable of the Weeds (Matthew 13:24-30, 36-43)

Introduction:

Matthew 13 is the only one of the five major speeches Jesus gives in the book of Matthew that is addressed to the crowds, rather than only to his disciples. So Jesus begins with the "Parable of the Sower/Soils," acknowledging that there are all kinds of people listening that day.




The specific kind of weeds/tares mentioned have a poisonous variety and a non-poisonous variety. The weeds could have been mildly poisonous, making the whole harvest useless.

Matthew 13:31-33 Before Jesus explains the parable, he gives two short parables: "The Parable of the Mustard Seed" and "The Parable of the Yeast." Both these short parables need no explanation. They are both showing that the kingdom of heaven starts small but grows to become huge.
