

THEMES OF PSALM I AND 2

- The focus on "blessed" at both the beginning of Psalm 1 and the end of Psalm 2, forming and inclusio (which is a biblical study device. This is similar to a refrain or chorus – repetition of material)
- Contrast between the righteous and the ungodly in both Psalms

- Prediction of demise for the ungodly in both psalms: "The way of the wicked will perish" (1:6) and you perish in the way (2:12)
- Use of the same term *hagah* to describe the blessed man meditating on God's Law and the ungodly nations plotting a vain thing.

MARK FUTATO – COMMENTATOR ON THE PSALMS

"The first word of the psalms 'ashre (traditionally translated "blessed"), is a key word that runs through the Psalter from the beginning to end. No single English word captures the full sense of 'ashre. Those who are 'ashre are in a state of total well-being: They lack nothing (Psalm 34:8-10), are delivered from trouble (41:1-2) and are wealthy and have successful children (112:1-3, 128:1-4 144:12-15. No wonder they are so happy! The Psalms are all about how to experience this profound happiness."


BLESSEDNESS

"The importance of blessing in verse 28 cannot be overlooked. Throughout the remainder of the book of genesis and the Pentateuch, the "blessing" remains a central theme. The living creatures have already been blessed on the 5th day in verse 22; Thus the author's view of blessing extends beyond man to that of the whole of God's living creatures. In verse 28 man is also included in God's blessing. The blessing itself in these verses is primarily posterity: "be fruitful and increase in number; Fill the earth". Thus already the fulfillment of the blessing is tied to man's **seed** and the notion of **life;** two themes that will later dominate the narratives of the book of genesis."


BLESSEDNESS



TLDR(L)

- 1. Psalms 1 and 2 function as an introduction—a "prelude," if you will—to the five-movement cantata.
- 2. The first word of the Psalm 1 captures well the intended purpose of the Book of Psalms: blessedness—to flourish; to prosper. It's what we might call "the good life."
- 3. Genesis 1:28 and 3:15 and their underlying promises of blessing by exercising dominion through a seed of the woman are key in understanding the progression of thought through the psalms and ultimately the nature of true blessedness.
- 4. Psalm 1 is setting up a contrast between two different approaches to pursuing the good life.

- 5. The editors of the Psalms arranged the psalms in Five Books in parallel with the Five Books of Moses as a way to say, "These Five Books of songs are the Torah of God with just as important, life-regulating significance as the Five Books of Moses."
- 6. Our lives are driven ultimately by whatever we allow to shape our image of what it means to be blessed, and whatever image you have set before you is what will shape your path.
- 7. Meditation is slow formation. It is letting "the Word of Christ dwell in you richly" (Col 3:16).
- 8. Image-forming meditation on the Torah requires God-inspired songs.
