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We're going to pick it up where we left off last week, Chapter 5 beginning in verse 7. And so if

you would follow along as I read the text. Oops, I need to get there myself here.

All right. You ready?

[Audience commenting]

That wasn't very convincing at all, but...

[Laughter]

Okay, James, by the Holy Spirit is writing and says, "Be patient, then, brothers and sisters,

until the Lord's coming. See how the farmer waits for the land to yield its valuable crop,

patiently waiting for the autumn and spring rains. You too, be patient and stand firm,

because the Lord's coming is near."

[That's the second time, by the way.] [We've got one more to go.]

Verse 9, "Don't grumble against one another. [Some of your translations render it, "Don't

complain] "Against one another, brothers and sisters, or you will be judged."

[And here's the third time] "The Judge is standing at the door!"

Let's pray, if you would please join with me.

Father in heaven, settle our hearts and focus our attention by the Holy Spirit as only You can

and always are faithful to do. Lord, You have to get our attention, and once You get our

attention, You have to hold our attention. And that's not me that does that. That's the Holy

Spirit vis-à-vis the Holy Word that we have before us today.

So Lord, as Kapono prayed, there's something here that You want us to know, and see, and

hear, and heed.

So as we commit this time to You, we would just ask that You would do just that. Show us

what it is that You would have us to see. Speak into our lives that which You would have us to

hear, that we might be found faithful, taking heed to Your Word, we pray, in Jesus' name,

Amen and amen.

You can be seated, the thank you.

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So what I want to talk with you about today is my favorite topic, some of yours, too, right? The Rapture. But more specifically, what it is that we can do concerning our own propensity for impatience, weariness, and how about this one? Even complaining in our waiting for the Lord's return.

As I sought the Lord about the text that is before us today, I really have this sense that the Lord had a word for us today concerning the rapture, really the imminence of the rapture, the nearness of the Lord's return, that the Lord is at the door. I mean, really, that's what the text is about.

James addresses this very matter in light of the imminence of the rapture of the church. Now it's important to understand that James, which is the first book of the New Testament, right, it was written to encourage Christians to live by faith, walk in faith, live in faith, so I found three such encouragements. You might find more, but no less than three that speak to, as an encouragement, our longing for the Lord's coming.

I think about what the Apostle Paul wrote to Timothy by the Holy Spirit as he neared the end of his life, having finished the race, having fought the good fight, and he knew that it was just a matter of time, and he was right.

And he writes to Timothy and basically says to him, I know what awaits me, the crowns, the crown of righteousness. And not just me, but all those who longed for, yearned for, groan for; I've got a few more on the list, I'll let you fill in the blanks, the Lord's return.

I'm thinking about, and maybe this is the Holy Spirit, just bear with me, but I think it's in Romans Chapter 1, a very powerful chapter, by the way. I remember what we were teaching. I was teaching through Romans; we were studying through that book. I wept through the whole chapter, the whole teaching. I was so embarrassed afterwards; I left right after church.

I just - it's so intense about the whole creation just groaning and how God had just given them over, not wanting to force Himself on those who were burning in lust after, women and women and men and men, and just the groaning for His return.

And even Peter talks about it, the whole creation, and it's almost like right now, if you listen closely, and some of you are going to look at me like, wow, you're losing it, Pastor, you're

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hearing things now? I kind of am. I'm kind of hearing this groaning of all of creation in this

yearning for the Lord's return.

Well, let's start with the first one in verse 7, and I know this is something you don't deal with

at all, so it's just theoretical. Be patient.

Now, this example of a farmer that James uses here would have really hit home with them. I

mean, he's speaking to them right where they're at as an agricultural society. And they would

have understood this exhortation, this encouragement to be patient for the Lord's return,

because that's what a farmer would have to do.

They would have to continue to wait, work, be patient, watch, and trust that the crops would

come, that the rains would come.

And just as the farmer would have to patiently wait by faith, patiently; did I say patiently, for

the harvest, so too do we have to wait patiently for the rapture. We just don't sit idly by

waiting for that trumpet to sound.

No, we occupy until He comes. We're busy about the things of God.

Listen, I grew up in a very small farm town. Wheat was the main crop. Very small, and when I

say very small, let me put it into perspective. My graduating class, the class of 1980 - Why are

you looking at me like that?

Ready for it? Wait for it. 16.

[Laughter]

Oh, thanks a lot for that courtesy laugh. Small; we're talking small, small farm town. So small

that when school was supposed to start, usually in September, I mean, this starting school in

August was so foreign to me until we moved here, and my wife moved back home to Kailua.

And I'm like, they're starting school in like the end of July! What is up with that?

Well, on the mainland, in this small farm town, September. Of course, the school year would

finish in like June. But anyway, small farm town - If those crops weren't in, that school didn't

start. They would delay the starting of the school, which meant that we would have to have

school later into the summer to accommodate for those days that we missed at the time of

the harvest.

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You know where I'm going with this, don't you? It's the urgency of the hour, the nearness of

the Lord's return.

And Jesus would say it this way, "Pray to the Lord of the harvest for laborers." Because see,

this is life and death. There's only a small window of opportunity here because if you don't

harvest those crops, you lose them. They will be lost. And those crops are souls, the harvest

of souls.

So they would have understood this dynamic as it relates to being a farmer. Farmers were

the hardest working people you'll ever know, very hard workers. You know what's really

interesting, and maybe I'm taking it too far, but farmers were always watching and looking up.

The weather.

Oh, that's another thing Jesus said, didn't He? In fact, it was more by way of a rebuke. You

guys know how to determine the weather by looking at the sky, and you see clouds. You say a

storm's coming.

You hypocrites! You can interpret the signs of the sky concerning the weather, but you

cannot interpret the signs of the times. There before them is the Savior of the world, God

incarnate, and they couldn't discern it.

Hardworking; they worked all the time. I actually knew a potato farmer because where I lived

in Washington it was close to the Idaho border, and of course, Idaho's known for potatoes.

We're talking real potatoes back when...

Anyway, I'm not going to go off on that. Best French fries you'll ever eat.

But this how is hard of a worker he was when it came time to harvest those potatoes. He

would work all day as long as he could until he could work no more. Then he would sleep in

his truck, and first thing in the morning, as soon as the sun came up and he could see, he'd

start working again. That's hard work. That's hard work.

Well, what's your point, Pastor?

Well, we need to be working and busy. We have a harvest to get in.

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So this farmer is working, but he's also watching. And he's also, by faith, patiently waiting.

And if you think about it, when you first plant the seeds for the crops, can you imagine a

farmer going out the next day going, Where's the crops?

You just planted them. Be patient.

Many years ago when we had planted what are known as, and for those of you with green

thumbs, you'll know what these are, arborvitaes. There are nice shrubbery and all to create

kind of a nice hedge, and we had this huge backyard. In Hawaii we don't –

Anyway, so huge backyard, and so we planted 53 of these arborvitaes. I had a brother help

me, but I couldn't afford to buy the tall ones, you know, that were sort of mature already, so I

had to buy little, itsy bitsy, baby ones, you know, like two feet tall, and then they're even

shorter because you put them in the ground, you know, one foot of them went in the ground,

but anyway...

Here's my arborvitaes, and being the patient godly man that I am, I'm watching those things -

I'm like - because we need a hedge, and I'm thinking the rapture is going to happen before

these things grow and become a hedge.

So what do I do? Well, I went out, I bought some Miracle-Gro, (Chuckling) and I'm out there

spraying Miracle-Gro. I didn't read the instructions, you know, I don't care, you know, so...

So I just put a lot on there, and I'm spraying them, and I'm yelling at them, come on, let's get

this show on the road and let's grow!

And I look out there every day, and nope, they're still...

In fact, one day it almost seemed like they were even smaller than they were like the day

before.

No, it's called patience. You just have to w-w-wait.

Well, that's the problem. We hate to wait. I've shared this before; it's been a while so I can

share it again, I think. Not that there's a certain amount of time in between, but...

I had just left the house, wonderful devotions, you know, time with the Lord, praise the Lord,

you know, worship music, in the Word, prayer. You know how that is, right? You don't want

it to end, but you have to get to work.

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So it had to come to an end, and I get in the car. Still got the worship music playing, and I'm driving, and a car cuts me off, and it has personalized plates on it: H82W8.

Did you already figure it out?

Oh, yeah, you know it's bad when God has to speak to you through a license plate. Hate to wait. And you know what's interesting? I drive that road every day. I had never seen that car before, and I never saw it again. (Humming: 'Twilight Zone' theme song.)

Okay, Lord, I get it. You're trying to get my attention here, and You're trying to show me something here that I need to be patient and slow down and wait. I know you hate to wait, but you need to wait, patiently wait.

And that brings us to our second one in verse 8, Remain Strong.

These all go hand in hand, and we're going to see that here in a moment. But James draws upon a most interesting truth in concert with patiently waiting for the Lord's return. He talks about standing firm, which carries with it the idea of remaining strong by both the establishing and strengthening of our hearts.

Well, wait a minute. I have a question. The question is how?

Well, the answer's at the end of the verse because the Lord's coming is near.

Now, stay with me here. When you know that something is that close, doesn't that encourage you in your impatience? Doesn't that strengthen you as you wait, knowing that the Lord's coming is near?

This is what, in effect, the apostle John was told by Jesus to write to the Church of Philadelphia. We talk about this passage a lot in our Prophecy Updates. It's one of the seven letters to the seven churches. This is the Church of Philadelphia, and it speaks to this very truth about remaining strong until the soon return of Jesus Christ in the rapture of the Church.

In verse 8 of Revelation 3, Jesus is commending them. Listen to what He says to them. He's encouraging them. This is not a rebuke, He says, "I know that you have little strength."

You're battle weary. You're barely hanging on. "Yet you have kept My word and have not denied My name."

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He's encouraging them, and then He goes on in verses 10 and 11 and says this: "Since you

have kept My command..."

And I know we've talked about this. That's a command, and we want it to be a command

because the commands of the Lord are not burdensome. And whenever you see a command

in Scripture, it comes packaged with the enabling.

God's commands, God's callings are God's enablings.

In other words, God will never command us to do anything without also empowering us to be

able to do that which He's commanding us to do. That's why we want it to be a command.

It's a command. "You've kept My command."

I was commanded. What was the commandment?

Oh, "To endure patiently."

Oh, there it is again. You can't get away from this thing. "Because you have kept My

command to endure patiently, I will also keep you from the hour of trial [Or tribulation] that is

going to come on the whole world to test the inhabitants of the earth." That's the 7-year

tribulation.

(Sighing) Okay, Lord, thank You. I'm have permission to share this.

This is a passage of scripture, among many, that is what is affectionately referred to as a proof

text for the pre-tribulation rapture. I don't know how you're going to twist this into a

scriptural pretzel to get away from it, but no matter what translation or even language you

read this in, it still says the same thing, that I'm going to keep you from the tribulation that's

coming upon the whole world.

Notice conspicuously absent from this encouragement to this church is any mention of I'm

going to keep you from the last half of the 7-year tribulation. Just hold on just like three-and-

a-half years; I'll get you out of there, but you have to... three-and-a...

No. "The tribulation that is going to come on the whole world to test the inhabitants of the

earth."

Now, stay with me, please.

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Don't you find it interesting that the post-trib believer is not attacking the pre-wrath believer

or vice versa? What does it tell you when they're all attacking the pre-trib sound doctrine,

sound doctrine, not theory, sound doctrine? Why is the pre-wrath guy not attacking the post-

trib guy? Why is the mid-trib guy not attacking the pre-wrath guy? There's a lot of them out

there.

You know, I heard one guy say, well, I'm pan-trib.

What?

It's all going to pan out.

Really?

Why - You'll forgive me for this, but why is everybody always picking on pre-trib? What does

that tell you?

Well, I have a couple of thoughts on this. I know that's shocking. One thought is this: It

authenticates and validates the sound doctrine of the pre-tribulation rapture. And here's

how we get there, secondly.

That's the genuine. The counterfeit authenticates the genuine. This is why you'll never see a

counterfeit \$70 bill.

Why?

Because there's no such thing as a genuine \$70 bill.

So let's answer our question. Why? Why is everybody always attacking the pre-trib sound

doctrine? Because it's the genuine, authentic sound doctrine. And that's why you have the

counterfeits, which, in fact, authenticate it. That's the answer.

Maybe I'm - correct me if I'm wrong. Do it gently, graciously afterwards if you do. But I have

yet to hear of anyone that is post-trib attacking pre-wrath or anybody else. It's always

everyone piling on pre-trib, just saying.

Well, it gets better verse 11, by the way, because He goes on to say, "I am coming soon."

Now, some of your translations render this word "quickly."

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Again, we've talked about it. For the benefit of those who might be new to this, let me just

simply and briefly explain it this way.

It's the Greek word "tachos" where we get the English word for the "tachometers" in our car,

RPMs. It's a gauge that the time is already set, one minute. The gauge is how many

revolutions per minute, RPMs.

Now, that kind of changes the complexion of this whole verse, right? Because what Jesus is

saying is that I'm coming at a time when things are speeding up, revving up. So just hang on.

Be patient. I know you're just - your strength is waning, but I'm coming quickly.

And knowing that He could come at any time, doesn't that strengthen you? Doesn't that

encourage you?

Well, listen, I'll be patient knowing that it could happen any time. That's a game-changer. I

can hang on. I can hold on because You are coming soon. "Hold on to what you have so that

no one will take your crown."

Well, we're going to turn what might seem to be a corner in verse 9 with something that at

first read might seem to not fit. But it does.

We may not want it to, but it has to do with complaining. Don't complain. Stop complaining.

Don't grumble. Don't murmur, and by the way, against each other, brothers and sisters.

Well, now, wait a minute. Why would the Holy Spirit inspire James to include complaining in

the context of the Lord's return in the rapture of the Church?

I'm glad you asked. You asked, right?

Well, I'm going to answer it.

First, I don't know if it's possible to overstate the importance of what James is writing here.

And if you'll bear with me, I'll explain why.

If we're honest with ourselves, I think we'd have to admit that impatience comes packaged

with complaining.

Now think that through with me. When am I more likely to complain? When I'm frustrated

and impatient. That's why.

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Another question: Because God will always package the "how" of the Holy Spirit with the "what" of His Holy Word - That's again why we want it to be a command because God's callings or God's enablings, and God would never command us or exhort us or encourage us to do anything in His Word without also empowering us, so we're found...

Think about it: He - this is not proper English - He can't not do that. It's inconsistent with His character because then He would be party to our disobedience. If He set us up for a failure that's inconsistent with who God is.

God will always create an environment in our lives, in our walk with Him that is conducive to our obedience. He'll never set us up for failure.

So if God in His Word is commanding us or exhorting us or encouraging us to be patient or stop complaining or, you know, remain strong, He's also going to give us the "how" in order to be found faithful doing it.

Aren't you glad God doesn't just say, Stop complaining because I'm God and I said so?

Okay.

No, I need to know how because this actually happens to be a big problem with me. I'm talking about me, not you; again, I know you guys don't do this.

So how am I going to stop my complaining?

Answer: It's at the end of the verse, "The Judge is standing at the door."

Here's how it all fits. Knowing that the Lord could return at any time changes how impatient I am maybe just a little while longer. I'm not as impatient knowing that it can happen very, very, very, very soon.

Remaining Strong. I'm kind of just hanging on. Wait a minute. He's at the door. That changes it. Oh, that strengthens my heart. That encourages my heart because He could come at any time. I just need to hold on a little bit longer. Things are revving up.

Yes, I'm just barely hanging on, little strength, battle weary, but He could come at any time. I'm just going to keep on keeping on and hold on because He's coming, coming soon, very quickly.

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Okay, Pastor, let's see how you deal with the complaining part. How's that work here?

Oh, question: If you knew that Jesus was going to rapture us this afternoon - wouldn't that be

great, first of all because when's the rent due? It's coming up, so that would be great this

afternoon, wouldn't it?

I love how one said it. I have absolutely no problem in my life right now that the rapture

won't solve. It's all a moot point after that.

But what if, just a "what if" question: What if Jesus raptured us this afternoon? Oh, my

goodness, I struck a chord, didn't I? What would change?

Okay, Pastor, I'm going to look down when I say this. I am a complainer. (Chuckling) I'm not -

Well, I just looked up, so good thing I didn't point.

I am a complainer, but man, if I knew Jesus was going to rapture us this afternoon, I'm not

complaining anymore. I don't have anything to complain about.

Well, that's what James is saying. "The Judge is standing at the door." The Lord's return is at

the door. Jesus is coming very, very soon. It can happen any time.

And that should have such a profound impact on how we live our lives, especially when it

comes to impatience, weariness, and now complaining.

Now there's something else here that I think I would be grossly remiss were I not to address,

and it's very important that we address it related to complaining.

Why would this rise to the level - I mean, wouldn't it stand to reason that okay, remain strong,

you know, be patient, but stop complaining? Why? I can think of a few other things that

would maybe be a better fit.

But why? Why this? Why does this rise to the level of being included in a list in this context?

And thankfully, we need look no further than to the Book of Numbers, a book that gets a lot

of bad press because of when someone asks about the Book of Numbers, what's the Book of

Numbers about?

Numbers. It sounds very boring to me.

It's anything but.

For those of you that went through that book, that study with us verse-by-verse, oh, my goodness, what a book! Actually, I want to draw your attention to three accounts in *Chapters* 12, 14 and 16, and I would certainly encourage you to turn there and then start with *Chapter* 12, the first two verses.

This is going to answer the question, and I hope by the help of the Holy Spirit, tie everything together in the context of the nearness of the rapture of the church. Now, this is Miriam and Aaron. Now you understand that this is the sister and older brother of Moses.

And we read in *verse 1, Numbers 12,* "Then Miriam and Aaron spoke against Moses [Why?] because of the Ethiopian woman whom he had married, for he had married an Ethiopian woman."

Almost sounds redundant, but apparently, they took issue with the fact that he married. He married an Ethiopian.

"So they said, 'Has the Lord indeed spoken only through Moses? Has He not spoken through us also?' And the Lord heard it."

Uh-oh. (Chuckling) Wait, wait, wait, wait, wait. So you're complaining against your brother, actually your blood brother? Which would be akin to complaining against your brother in Christ or your sister in Christ. And the Lord heard it.

By the way, "and the Lord heard it" means this ain't okay. Because you see, Moses is My man. So you're not just complaining against Moses, your brother. You're complaining against Me because I chose Moses.

I called your brother. And you got a problem with that? Oh, and his Ethiopian wife?

They always attack the wife. You know how that is, right? I'm sorry, women, but, man, you guys, you have a way. You don't have to say anything. Just the way you look them up and down.

Oh, don't look at me like that. You know what I'm talking about. And they took issue with his wife.

Now you know what's going to happen, right? I'm going to give you the rest of the story, spoiler alert. I'd still encourage you to spend some time in the Book of Numbers and read this account. Miriam is struck with leprosy.

You think God took it pretty seriously that they would complain against their brother Moses, whom God had called and chosen?

And here's Moses; I mean, he's a humble man. We know the account of when God called him after 40 years on the backside of the desert, not just the desert, the backside of the desert. He's 80 years old, and God calls him, and what does Moses do?

He's like, you know, that was a very old prayer, Lord. And that was like a 40, 50-year-old prayer. And that ship has sailed, and that file is closed, and You got the wrong guy, and he's arguing with God.

He never wanted to be used and called to be the deliverer that God was calling him to be.

And so he starts talking about how I can't even talk anymore. I've developed a speech impediment being here for 40 years. The only thing I've been talking to are sh-sh-sheep, and ba-ah-ah, I can't even talk to them.

That's why throughout the Old Testament you read, "And God commanded Moses to have Aaron speak to the people."

I know you can't, but you're still not getting out of it.

My point being is that Moses didn't posture himself in the position for which he's being accused. I never asked; I never applied for this job to be the spokesman through whom God would speak. It's going to come up again here in a moment, and it runs in the family because we're going to see it with Moses' cousin here shortly.

Numbers 14; this one's really interesting to me. Let me just read verses 2-4. "And all the children of Israel complained against Moses and Aaron."

Oh, Aaron, how's it feel? Shoe's on the other foot. Little taste of your own medicine.

"And the whole congregation said to them, 'If only we had died in the land of Egypt! Or if only we had died in this wilderness! Why has the Lord brought us to this land to fall by the sword,

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that our wives and children should become victims? Would it not be better for us to return to

Egypt?'

So they said to one another, 'Let us select a leader and return to Egypt.'"

You know what God's response was to this?

The reason why this is so interesting' it's actually stunning to me because God's like, that's it,

I've had it. I'm going to kill them, and I'm going to start over with you, Moses. I'm not going

to - They will - I'm - they're done. I'm going to give you all of the blessings and all of the

promises that I was going to give to them.

Now, if I'm Moses, I'm like, Yeah, that sounds good to me, let's go ahead with that one. That

sounds really good. But what does Moses do? Well, God knew what Moses was going to do;

otherwise...

This is why, by the way, God does not offer offers like that to people like me because He

knows that I'll accept them. He knew Moses would not take the deal, so to speak.

Instead, Moses appeals and pleads with God. He says, You can't do that, God. You have a

reputation. Egypt's going to hear about it. I mean, I'm so moved and touched that You would

want to start over with me, but You can't do that.

God knew he would say that. He wanted to start all over; He just wanted to wipe them out.

You know, there's some humorous accounts. This is one of the many reasons why I know that

God has a sense of humor. The main one is every time I look in the mirror, I know God has a

sense of humor, but this is one of those times where, I mean, there's a dialog between Moses

and God.

And by the way, God says to Miriam back in Chapter 12 and his brother, Aaron, "I speak to

your brother face to face."

How about that?

And so here's this conversation recorded for us in the pages of Holy Writ between God and

Moses. And they're going back and forth like a parent, "Your people."

You know how it is, mom, dad, when "your son!"

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Oh, "my son" now?

They're disowning him.

God's like "your people" and Moses' going, "These aren't "my people," they're "Your people!" They're going back and forth. They're not taking ownership of them.

Come on, you did that as parents. Just humor me; tell me you did that.

Anyway, my wife so many times, "You deal with your son! After all, that comes from your side of the family!" I'm used to it. Everything bad's my side of the family.

But they're going back and forth over this whole thing, and God, again, He knew what Moses' response was going to be.

How many times have Moses and Aaron both intercede on behalf of the people for God to stop killing the people? Why was God killing the people?

Because they were complaining; they're complaining, murmuring, grumbling. Do you get the impression that God takes this seriously?

There's so many. I'm only selecting three in the interest of time. One of them is when they were complaining, and God just sends these fiery serpents and bites them, and they start dying.

And Moses and Aaron are praying and pleading with God to stop the snakes, and that's when Moses is told to make this bronze, or this pole, and put a bronze serpent in the shape of a cross, a type of the crucifixion before a Roman cross had even been thought of. And if they would but look on that cross, they would be saved and healed.

By the way, that's a - the modern medical symbol is a perversion of that, by the way, of the pole on the cross. It was vertical, horizontal, and then a bronze snake, a picture of the cross.

Numbers 16; let me read verses 1-3. This, and you'll forgive me for my warped sense of humor, but this is my favorite one because of what God does when this happens. "Now, Korah [This is Moses' cousin] the son of Izhar, the son of Kohath, the son of Levi, with Dathan and Abiram, the sons of Eliab, and On the son of Peleth, sons of Reuben, took men; and [Verse 2, Numbers 16] they rose up before Moses with some of the children of Israel, 250 leaders of the congregation, representatives of the congregation, men of renown.

[These were the board, the elders, the leaders]

They gathered together against Moses and Aaron [Verse 3] and said to them, 'You take too much upon yourselves, for all the congregation is holy, every one of them, and the Lord is among them. Why then do you exalt yourselves above the assembly of the Lord?'"

What? I told you, I never applied for this position. I tried to get out of this. I tried everything. God would not let me out of this. I did not exalt myself. God exalted me and placed me in this position. Oh, by the way, have you been talking to my brother and sister?

I wonder what Aaron thought because this was against Aaron too. You know, God doesn't just speak only through you. Who do you think you are? You're all that? God speaks to us too. Why do you - you're so full of yourself. You exalt yourself in the assembly of the Lord.

Well, again, this is why it's my favorite. And you'll forgive me for the humor that I see in this, but Moses, being the humble man that he is, says, Okay, you know, first of all, this is getting really old. We need to settle this because apparently you guys have a problem with me.

But your problem is not with me because God's the one who called me and exalted me and chose me and speaks through me. So if you've got a problem with me, actually your problem is with God.

And by the way, this comes from the garden. This is the Adamic sin nature in every single one of us.

What happened when sin entered the world, and God asks Adam, What have you done? He knows what he did. And they're hiding.

And Adam, what does he do? He (Chuckling) come on; you know what he did? He blames the wife, but he's not really blaming the wife. "It's the woman You gave me."
