KAPONO: Would you join me in a word of prayer? Lord, this time is so important, Lord, so important.

We need not miss out on anything, Lord.

Today I pray that, Lord, that worship would not be a routine, Lord. That coming to church would not

be a routine, Lord. We want to seek You today. And we know that You always have something for

us, Lord. So would You bless us today? Pull our attention close to You, Lord, and speak. In Your

precious name we pray, amen.

PASTOR JD: Amen and amen. Good morning and welcome. You can be seated. Thank you. So glad

you're here today. Also, those of you joining us online, we're so very glad that you are. This is the

first of two services that we have on Sunday mornings, which is the Bible Prophecy Update that we

do weekly.

The Second Service, which will be live streamed, by the way, at 11:15 a.m. Hawaii time is the actual

sermon, which is a verse-by-verse study through the Word of God.

And we're currently in 1 John, the second chapter, and we're going to today – second chapter. Did I

say first chapter?

[Audience answers "Yes"]

I did? Let's try that again.

[Laughter]

Our Second Service is a sermon and it's a verse-by-verse study through 1 John. The second chapter

today, the second chapter. In fact, to be more specific, it's verses 12-14 of the second chapter of 1

John.

And what we're going to do is look at the availability of a cure, as it were, for the condition of

remaining spiritually immature, and might I add, at a time in human history where being so is most

unforgiving.

Also, for those of you that are joining us by way of YouTube or Facebook, we would really encourage

you to go directly to the website at JDFarag.org, and there you will find the uninterrupted entirety,

also uncensored entirety of today's Update. And with that, let's get to it.

I just want to talk with you again today. And what I want to talk with you about is how the only way

to not lose heart in this the very last day in human history as we know it, is to persistently and

tenaciously pray.

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I think you would agree with me that the profound increase of evil perpetrated on the global population in the world today is the likes of which we've never before seen. But God.

But the God of the Word, vis-à-vis the Word of God provides us with how it is that we can take heart in order that we do not lose heart.

Can I invite you to join me in the *Gospel of Luke the 18th chapter?* I want to begin reading in *verse 1*? I want you to pay particular attention to the first verse, first word in *verse 1*. It's the word "Then." Understanding this will be germane to our understanding of this parable.

So we're told *verse* 1, *Luke* 18, "Then He [Speaking of Jesus] spoke a parable to them, [Speaking of the disciples] that men always ought to pray and not lose heart, saying: [Verse 2] "There was in a certain city a judge who did not fear God nor regard man. Now there was a widow in that city, and she came to him saying, 'Get justice for me from my adversary.'

And [Verse 4] he would not for a while, but afterward he said within himself, 'Though I do not fear God nor regard man, yet because this widow troubles me I will avenge her, lest by her continual coming she weary me."

Translated: The only way I'm going to get this woman off my back is to give her what she wants.

"Then [Verse 6] the Lord said, "Hear what the unjust judge said. And [Verse 7] shall God not avenge His own elect who cry out day and night to Him, though He bears long with them? I tell you that He will avenge them speedily. Nevertheless, when the Son of Man comes, will He really find faith on the earth?"

It's important to understand that right after Jesus likens the last days to the days of Noah and also the days of Lot, He [Here's that word] "then" teaches this parable about not losing heart.

Can you make that connection? In other words, you guys, as He teaches this parable to the disciples in the last days it is going to be so perilous. "Perilous times will come."

Paul writes to Timothy and lists 19 characteristics of said perilous times in the end times, the last days. And those last days are this day today.

And I want you to know that the only way you're going to survive, let alone thrive in these perilous times, is to pray so you don't lose heart because it's going to get really bad, so bad that it will be like it was in the days of Noah.

Was it bad In the days of Noah? It was very bad in the days of Noah. The evil was unspeakable. How about the days of Lot? Unspeakable evil.

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And so He teaches them this parable on the heels of likening the last days in which we are now living

to the days of Noah and the days of Lot. And in a sense, what He's saying is it's going to get so bad,

you guys, the only way you're going to make it is to pray. Otherwise you're just going to give up.

You're going to lose heart.

This parable; it's really a prophetic parable. It's a parable about the end times and the Lord's return.

And it's unique for several reasons, chief of which is that Jesus, unlike the other parables, begins with

the point of the parable before teaching the parable.

Right out of the shoot, verse 1, He tells them, us, what the parable is about. I like it when God gives

us the test answers to the questions.

So what's the point of the parable?

The point of the parable is that of always praying if we're to have any hope of not losing heart and

giving up in the perilous times of the end of time.

Actually, think this through with me. The impetus for this widow's persistency and tenacity in prayer

was her perilous desperation. Because you have to understand, as a widow she's helpless, she's

hopeless in her situation. And this was the impetus for her persistency and tenacity in praying and

pleading for justice.

She has been on the receiving end of evil, adversarial injustice, and her only hope was this unjust

judge helping her, meting out justice for her because of the unjust evil against her.

And this is why it is, by the way, that Jesus is emphasizing that if an unjust, ungodly judge will mete

out justice, how much more will God do so and speedily? He will not delay, though it seems that He

is. No, He will rush in and move, and justice will be served and speedily.

You know, this parable is a kind of a tough one in a sense because one can almost come away with

this impression that, you know, God is reluctant. And here's JD, he just keeps – he's really starting to

bug Me.

[Laughter]

He keeps coming to Me. He keeps asking. How am I going to get rid of this guy? I'll just give him

what he wants, and I'll get rid of him.

That's not at all the point of the parable. I hope you know that, right? No, the point of the parable is

if this ungodly unjust judge will mete out justice, how much more will God?

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There's something else here, and I – just kind of – bear with me for a moment. But the question is not whether or not God will mete out judgment in the end. The question is: will He really find faith in the end?

Did you catch that at the end of the parable? So God is almost kind of like flipping it around. And you're asking the wrong question in a sense, rhetorically so, I suppose. Because your question is, your concern is: Will this widow get justice?

That's not the right question. The question isn't: Will she get justice? That's a given.

Here's the real question: When I come back, when Jesus returns, the question is: will He really find faith in the end?

This is why this particular parable is about the end when Jesus returns, first in the Rapture, and then second, at the end of the 7-year tribulation at His Second Coming.

This is at the heart of the parable in that it's a parable about the time of the end being so evil that absent persistent prayer, we will lose heart. This description of losing heart, barely hanging on at the time of the end comports with the letter in Revelation to the Philadelphia Church.

This church is one of seven churches on the receiving end of a letter from Jesus through the Apostle John, which is also a prophecy. And by that, I mean these seven letters, while to those specific churches in that day, are prophecies for us concerning the end of time in our day.

Kindly allow me to read this letter in Revelation chapter 3, beginning in *verse 7*. "And to the angel of the Church in Philadelphia write, 'These things says He who is holy, He who is true, "He who has the key of David, He who opens and no one shuts, and shuts and no one opens": "I know your works. See, I have set before you an open door, and no one can shut it; for you have a little strength, have kept My word, and have not denied My name.

Indeed, I will make [Verse 9] those of the synagogue of Satan, who say they are Jews and are not, but lie – indeed I will make them come and worship before your feet, and to know that I have loved you.

Because [Verse 10, listen] you have kept My command to persevere, I also will keep you from the hour of trial which shall come upon the whole world, [The whole world] to test those who dwell on the earth." [That's the 7-year tribulation]

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Because you've kept My name, I'm going to keep you out of the 7-year tribulation. And then He says,

verse 11, "Behold, I am coming quickly!" Speedily, "Tachos" in the original language of the Greek

New Testament, where we get our word for our tachometers in the car.

A measurement, a set time, a measurement of revolutions per minute, RPMs. I'm going to come

speedily, quickly, when things are revving up.

Are things revving up? Things are revving up.

[Audience says, "Amen!"]

Hold fast, hold on, buckle up. "Hold fast what you have, that no one may take your crown. He who

overcomes, [Verse 12] I will make him a pillar in the temple of My God, and he shall go out no

more. I will write on him the name of My God and the name of the city of My God, the New

Jerusalem, which comes down out of heaven from My God. And I will write on him My new name.

[And then He ends as He ends all the letters] "He who has an ear, let him hear what the Spirit says to

the churches."

The common denominator between this parable that Jesus taught in this letter that Jesus had John

write is that of persistent perseverance. Persistent perseverance, specifically persevering and

persistent prayer that's proportionate to and commensurate with the perilous and evil times of this

the end of time.

What do you mean?

Well, let me explain. The way we pray today cannot be the same as the way we used to pray in the

past by virtue of the unspeakable evil in the present.

And it's evidenced by how the widow in the parable had reached her end, which is what propelled

her into this proportionate persistency and perseverance in prayer. I mean, her situation, had it not

been so perilous, it's doubtful that her prayers would have been so tenacious.

You know how it is. I mean, think about it. When things are going good, what does your prayer life

sound like and look like? Probably a lot like mine. "Thank You, Lord. Bless them. Bless this. Bless

that. In Jesus' name, Amen."

But then let adversity strike. "Oh, God, Creator of the heavens and the earth and the sea and all that

in them is!"

Oh, now we're talking. Now we're talking.

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This is so true for us in the sense that the evil of this last hour has risen to the level of warranting this

level of persistent prayer.

Now, the question becomes one of why it is and even how it is that we too can also be numbered

amongst those of whom it's said, they always persist in prayer so as to not lose heart in this evil day.

And I am keenly aware that whenever I talk about prayer, it has this unintended effect of guilt, the

gift that keeps on giving, as one said. I mean, who among us has prayed enough? Is there such a

thing?

Whenever it comes to the topic of prayer, the matter of prayer, there's always that sense of, man, I

need to pray more.

Yes, you do! But never imagine that God is in heaven going, I'm going to make you a man of prayer if

it's the last thing I do! No. Can you imagine? Think about it as an earthly father, earthly parent.

(Sound of disgust) "I got to spend time with my father. I've got to get this over with. I've got to talk

to him. I've got to spend time with him."

"That's okay, honey. Sweetheart, that's okay. Don't bother. I don't want it like that." I don't want it

to be a "got-to." I want it to be a "get-to."

I mean, think about this. We get to and have unfettered access to God any time. We never get

voicemail. We never get the secretarial screen. Do they still have that these days? I don't know

anymore. I don't get out much.

He's always at the ready, waiting. "JD, just come to Me. Bring that to Me. Why are you carrying

that? It's killing you. Why are you so weighed down with that burden and that care? Cast your care

on Me, for I care for you. Just come to Me. I have everything you need right here. Come to Me.

Let's talk."

But we don't do that. We don't call on the Lord. We call everyone but the Lord. And by the way, can

I just lovingly – and the Lord knows my heart. I just would lovingly suggest that sometimes the worst

thing you can do is to call someone up and try to have them help you because how are they going to

help you?

In fact, if anything, maybe I better speak for myself, they make it worse.

"Where's your faith? What's the matter with you? Oh, there must be some deep sin in your life."

"I'm sorry. I didn't realize I dialed Job's friend."

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[Laughter]

Can I just take it a step further, just real quick? I wonder sometimes, again, I'll speak from my own

prayer life from my own experience. I wonder sometimes if God allows that phone call to take place

so I'm like, "What in the world was I thinking? Why did I even call them?"

And the Lord's like, "I know. Why did you? Hello, you've got My number. In fact, it won't even ring.

I'll pick it up even before it rings because I know you're going to call Me before you call Me, so it's not

going to ring."

Ring, ring, ring...

And then when He answers, by the way, it's never like, "WHAT?"

"Oh, sorry God. I know You're busy?"

No, it's more like this.

"I've been waiting for you to come to Me. I love you so much."

I want to share with you, it's not exhaustive, but several powerful truths the Lord has been teaching

me about prayer over the years in my own walk with the Lord.

First, by way of a preface, while prayer is one of the most powerful tools in our spiritual toolbox, it's

also the tool that most of us do not avail ourselves of.

And this for a number of reasons, not the least of which is that Satan knows prayer is the deciding

factor in his defeat, which is why prayer is so difficult. This explains why it is that when you start to

pray, all hell literally breaks loose.

Why is that?

Because Satan doesn't want you – if you – see Satan knows when you pray, it's game-over for him.

So he'll do everything and stop at nothing to keep you from praying. Because if you can beat the

devil in prayer, you've got everything else. He cannot mess with you. He knows it's the deciding

factor.

Prayer. When a child of God prays to his God, the devil knows. Uh-oh! And he runs as fast as he can,

as far away as he can because he knows now you got your daddy involved. That's why prayer can be

so difficult.

It's also in addition to being difficult, it's been complicated. I'm not going to lay the blame solely at

the feet of the enemy on this. I think we're to blame for complicating the simplicity of prayer. The

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volumes that have been written. The books on prayer, my goodness, you could fill a library ten times

over.

I shared with you, it's a true story. It was a number of years ago. I really set out and even prayed,

"God make me a man of prayer."

To which I could almost hear God saying, "Are you sure you want me to do that?"

"Oh, I want to be a man of prayer."

"Okay."

So I mean, I was determined. So I went out and I bought me some big books on prayer, voluminous $\,$

volumes this thick. I'm like, okay, I'm going to read this book on prayer. A good book, I have nothing

against them, okay? I got a library full of them. You're welcome to them if you want.

Actually, no, I'm not going to give them to you. One in particular, E.M. Bounds. You want to read a

good book on prayer? Read E.M. Bounds. And here I got this book. I mean, I'm "All right, all right!"

And then I'm sitting there, and the Holy Spirit in that still, small voice starts speaking to my heart like,

"Oh, that's a big book."

"Yeah, I know. Man, I'm going to be a man of prayer."

"Yeah, that's going to take you a while."

"Yeah, but I'm going to do it."

"JD, what about, maybe just instead of reading that book on prayer, you just prayed?"

You know how when the Holy Spirit light bulbs go off and you're like, great idea! The amount of time

that it would have taken me to read a book on prayer, I could have been in prayer.

And so I did. And wow! I mean, it was - I just don't have any other word, but wow, just wow! You

know, I always know I made a good decision when my only regret is that I didn't make it sooner. And

such was the case.

But let me just expound briefly on how we [We] have complicated prayer. And I mean, we're

cooperating with the enemy who wants nothing more than for us to complicate prayer because a

prayer becomes so complicated that we won't do it.

You know what prayer is? You ready for it? Wait for it. It's talking to God, your daddy in heaven.

Baba, Abba, Papa. Baba, I need You, God. I need You.

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You know, and sometimes – and I guess this is probably as good of a time as any to mention this.

Sometimes, you just can't pray because you're in such deep pain. And I get that. I know all about

that.

And sometimes those are just wordless prayers. They're liquid prayers, as one affectionately

referred to them, where you can't – all you can do is just moan and cry.

Those are powerful prayers, by the way, because God hearkens unto the voice of your cry. You're a

child of God crying out to your Heavenly Father, your loving, tender, Heavenly Father who loves you

more than you could ever imagine.

I know as a parent, as a young parent with young children, when my kids would cry, I would just go

crazy. I would – you know that – (Frustrated sound)

Whatever. Well, now I have to say it. (Chuckle)

Sorry. You remember that 'Let them cry it out' movement back in the - I don't know. It's a number

of years ago. Let them cry it out!

We tried that, my wife and I because we had to sleep. We never slept. In fact, when our first son

was born, we haven't slept since.

[Laughter]

So we're like, okay, you know, we got to get some sleep, we're sleep deprived. So just let him cry it

out. Okay, let's do it. So we let him cry it out. I think, and this is not an exaggeration. I think it

lasted for me; I think I made it about – I didn't make it a minute. That's not an exaggeration.

I think about 30, 40 seconds into it, I'm like, running in there "Okay Habibi, what's wrong? Oh, it's

okay.

What's your point, Pastor?

My point is, I'm so glad that God doesn't let us cry it out. Oh, no, He hearkens unto the voice of our

cry speedily. Quickly He rushes in. "Shh!" "JD's crying out to Me."

The silence in the heavens, the hush of heaven, the holy hush of heaven. "Be quiet. He's praying."

What is prayer? That before the throne of Almighty God it is a fragrance, an incense pleasing in His

sight.

Again, as a young parent, you'll forgive another personal reference, but I just loved – I recorded – we

all have the home videos of our kids, right? And they were so adorable.

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I just loved to hear – that's why we talked their language, goo-goo ga-ga, just to get some expression

out of them and hear them squeak and squawk and talk. And you know, of course, the first words

you always want as a father is dada and say, Honey, did you hear that? He said, Dada first.

Oh, how much more to our Heavenly Father? That's all prayer is. Just talking to God. This alone has

encouraged and settled my heart such that I can come to my tender, loving Heavenly Father any time

with anything, knowing that He always hears my prayers.

And not only does He always hear my prayers, He will always answer my prayers the same exact way

that I would answer my own prayers if I knew what He knew. That really settles me.

Actually, this is another problem that explains, not excuses, but explains prayerlessness. Stay with

me.

Because God who always answers my prayers, doesn't answer my prayers the way I want or how I

want, and certainly when I want, I stop praying, I stop asking. Then when this happens, we have not

an answer to prayer because we asked not for an answer in prayer as James says.

Oh, may it never be said of us that we have not because we asked not you. If you would have but

asked. If you would have just come to Me and asked Me for that, I would have given it to you. If it

brings Me glory and it's for your good, you got it. I'll give you anything. You ask anything of Me, if it's

according to My will, for My glory and for your good, why would I not give that to you?

The Apostle Paul writing to the church in Rome in Chapter 8 of Romans says it and frames it in a very

interesting way. He says, How in the world – this is a very loose paraphrase, but here's the essence

of it. How in the world does it make any sense to you, Romans, that if God was unwilling to spare His

only begotten Son and was willing to give you His only begotten Son to die for you, is there anything

He would withhold from you?

How does that make any sense to you? God will give you anything. He'll withhold nothing from you.

Just ask.

"Yeah, but this is a big ask."

"Oh, He's a big God!"

I did not mean for this to be a sermon on prayer. But maybe this is a word fitly spoken on prayer.

Question: Do you find it interesting that the disciples would ask Jesus to teach them to pray? See, I

totally wouldn't have done that. I would have asked Jesus to teach me to preach, teach me to teach.

No, they didn't ask Him to teach them to preach. They asked Him to teach them to pray. Not how to

pray. No, teach me to pray. I don't want to just be taught how to pray. I want to be taught to pray.

Have you ever asked yourself why they would ask Jesus to teach them to pray? Could it be because

they saw firsthand what happened when Jesus prayed?

I point this out because of another account also in Luke's Gospel, seven chapters earlier in Chapter

11, beginning in verse 1. "Now it came to pass, as He [Speaking of Jesus] was praying in a certain

place, when He ceased, that one of His disciples said to Him, "Lord, teach us to pray, as John also

taught his disciples."

So He said to them, "When you pray, say: Our Father in heaven, Hallowed be Your name. Your

kingdom come. Your will be done on earth as it is in heaven.

Give us day by day our daily bread. And forgive us our sins, for we also forgive everyone who is

indebted to us. And do not lead us into temptation but deliver us from the evil one."

And He said to them, [Verse 5, listen] "Which of you shall have a friend, and go to him at midnight

and say to him, 'Friend, lend me three loaves; for a friend of mine has come to me on his journey,

and I have nothing to set before him.'

And [Verse 7] he will answer from within and say, 'Do not trouble me; the door is now shut, my

kids are in bed; I cannot rise.

[Oh, that sounds like the parable of the persistent prayer of the widow] [And then He says this, verse

8] I say to you, though he will not rise and give to him because he is his friend, [Thanks a lot, friend]

[How about former friend, now] yet because of his [And here it is again] persistence he will rise and

give him as [Watch this] many as he needs.

"So I say to you, ask, and it will be given to you; seek, and you will find; knock, and it will be open

to you. For everyone who asks receives, and he who seeks finds, and to him who knocks it will be

opened."

You know, this is a misunderstood promise, a powerful promise, sadly misunderstood because it kind

of comes packaged with a false teaching, by the way, that if you have to ask more than once, that's a

demonstration of a lack of faith. Nothing could be further from the truth.

When Jesus says "ask," in the original, it carries with it the idea of asking, keep on asking and don't

stop asking. Knock, (Knocking on the pulpit) keep knocking.

(Knocking repeatedly on the pulpit)

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Is that getting on your nerves?

[Laughter]

Well, it's getting on, apparently, these guys' nerves so they're going to get out of bed.

Again, God's not reluctant. By the way, God is not in bed either. Whoever asks and keeps on asking, whoever seeks and keeps on seeking, whoever knocks and keeps on knocking persistently, tenaciously.

Well, this brings me full circle to the aforementioned explanation of how we ought to pray as Jesus taught so as to not lose heart. So we'll go ahead at this time and end the livestream on YouTube and Facebook.

Pictured here is a prayer chart of sorts that I organized and categorized specific to specific prayers as it relates to specific evils. The first is the evil that makes us lose heart; second, a suggested way to pray, to not lose heart; and third, the Scripture references to encourage our heart.

Because we've covered in depth all that's on this chart in prior Updates and, again, not exhaustive, but in the interest of time, this will be a cursory consideration of what I'll call the top seven, though again, not in any particular order nor exhaustive in any sense.

Number 1: Mounting adverse events and even death from the poisonous COVID-19 injections.

Please know that these are only suggestions on the way to pray. And for this, it's praying for God's mercy concerning sudden death, God's healing from ensuing illnesses.

I'm including *Psalm 91*, which for many a saint over the generations has been a go-to Psalm, a powerful prayer Psalm prayed by many.

But I want to add to it also *Acts 28:3-6*. Luke writes By the Holy Spirit, "Paul gathered a pile of brushwood and, as he put it on the fire..."

He's been shipwrecked on the island of Malta because God wants the Islanders to get saved. So He changes Paul's itinerary on his trip to Rome.

So here's Paul, he's helping out with the fire and "...a Viper, driven out by the heat, fastened itself on his hand.

When the Islanders saw the snake hanging from his hand, they said to each other, "This man must be a murderer; for though he escaped from the sea, Justice has not allowed him to live."

But [Verse 5] **Paul** shook the snake off into the fire and suffered no ill effects. [Slash adverse events]

The people expected him to swell up [Or be one of those who died suddenly] [Died suddenly] The people expected him to swell up or suddenly fall dead, [Died suddenly] but after waiting a long time..."

Could you imagine? He's going to die. Watch. Just wait.

He's not dying.

No, he will. Everybody who gets bit by these vipers, you know, Uncle, Auntie, you know, they all died. He's going to die. He doesn't die.

"After waiting a long time and seeing nothing unusual happen to him, [He's not swollen up like everybody else] [He's not dying like everybody else] they changed their minds and said he was a god."

Okay. No, Paul is not a God. But Paul is going to tell you about his God.

This is called praying the word. You can take a passage like this and pray this. You can turn Scripture into prayers. Lord, please do not let me swell up or suffer adverse events or become ill. Let nothing happen to me.

Number 2: Looming collapse of the global economy.

Pray for God's provision because you have God's promise. As a child of God, you will never be begging bread. He will always provide. He will always provide for you. It will never be necessarily in the way that you expect it to be. God may choose to provide for you from an unseen treasury, unknown before, in ways that you could have never imagined.

But you see, you have the promise in God's Word throughout, replete throughout Scripture. I have *Matthew 6:19-34*, as the go-to. But also *Philippians 4:6-8*. These are just two passages among a myriad of passages and promises in Scripture.

You know, we receive numerous and voluminous emails from people saying, "What should we do in light of what is happening globally to the economy?"

And obviously, we're never going to give people financial advice. But the best advice, financial advice, is in the pages of Scripture.

Solomon writing in Ecclesiastes, says, diversify in six seven areas because you do not know what evil

will befall the land.

Matthew 6, again, 19-34. Jesus says, Don't worry about it, I gotcha. If I'm going to provide for the

birds in the air and the flowers of the field, how much more valuable are you? They weren't created

in My image. You were. So if I'm going to take care of them, I'm not going to take care of you?

Don't worry. Today is the tomorrow you worried about yesterday, by the way. I'll give you some

time on that one. I know that was quite a bit.

No, remember yesterday you were worrying about tomorrow? Well, it's tomorrow. Today is the

tomorrow you were worrying about yesterday. Did it happen?

No.

You know what they found? 90-plus percent of the things we worry about never happened. Now,

that does not - that makes you, some of you, you worriers like me that have a PhD in worry, you're

like, that's great.

90-what percent did you say? Because you're not thinking about that. You're thinking about, so that

means there's 3 or 4 percent that I need to worry about? That's all you think about, right? See, I

know. I know. I know.

But even that which you fretted about that did come about, God will give you the grace at the time

that you need it and see you through it.

One last thing on this financial thing because this is a big issue, especially now and for obvious

reasons, I think. It's God's money, right? We're the stewards of that which He's entrusted us with.

We're the owners of nothing, the managers of everything. We're only the managers of God's money.

So really, what's your problem? That's for the owner to be concerned with. It's not your money.

You think God's not – you think God's caught off guard by this? Oh, My goodness, CBDC? When did

- what?

No, He already told us. It's right here. Yeah, CBDC, social credit scores, climate credit scores, 15-

minute cities; we talked about that last week. It's all right in here.

Question - I ask this - it's a rhetorical question, but I ask this with the sincerity of my heart, and the

Lord knows my heart. And it's a "why" question.

Why would God not provide for you? Why would – maybe better asked, why would God just all of a

sudden stop providing for you at such a time as this?

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No, He will always provide no matter what. He will always provide for you.

Number 3. We better keep moving. Stop doing that. We've got to move faster now. Impending threats of wars with current wars, by the way.

Romans 2:4, "It is the kindness of God that leads one to repentance."

1 Corinthians 6:9-11. It's astounding. This is 2 Thessalonians 2, really the entire chapter. I want to spend just a little bit of time, if you

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Number 7 because this is where it really hits home. The intensifying personal trials for Christians.

This kind of brings us back to our text, *Luke 18*:1-8. I'll add to it *James 5:16*, which I know you know well. "The effectual, fervent prayer of the righteous, [Not our own righteousness] [But those righteous in Christ's imputed righteousness] avails [Accomplishes] much."

Oh, I love that hymn of old, Λ What a friend we have in Jesus Λ Λ Oh what peace we often forfeit

because we don't carry everything to Him in prayer ♪

Well, this is why we do these Updates and have for many years. This is why we end with the gospel,

the good news and the simple ABCs of salvation.

The A is just simply for admit or acknowledge. This is how to be saved. This is just a simple way to

share your faith, should the Lord ever give you the profound privilege of sharing Jesus with someone.

It starts this way: There has to be an acknowledging that you're a sinner. Otherwise why would you

be interested in the Savior?

Romans 3:10 says, "There is no one righteous, not even one." Romans 3:23 tells us why. It's

because "all have sinned and fall short of the glory of God."

Romans 6:23 sort of explains the bad news first, with the good news. And the bad news is, is that "The wages of sin is death." But here's the good news: "The gift of God is eternal life in Christ Jesus our Lord."

That's what the word "gospel" means. Good news, your debt has been paid. You're free to go. "And whom the Son has set free is free indeed."

The B, very central, is for believe. Believe in your heart that Jesus Christ is Lord. *Romans 10:9-10* says, "If you believe in your heart that God raised Jesus from the dead, you will be saved." It's so simple. Like with prayer being complicated, so too have we also complicated the simplicity of the gospel.

And the C, lastly, is just for call upon the name of the Lord. Or as *Romans 10:9-10* also says, "confess with your mouth".

Romans 10:13, "All who call upon the name of the Lord will [Will, will, will] be saved."
