Philippians 3:17-4:1

Paul gives a testimony that his personal devotion wasn't just to Christ, but also an example of what the life of Christians should be toward one another. He encourages us to imitate him.

There is great value in seeing a model of what being a Christian should look like. How is this most helpful when you're apart of a church environment? Do you believe there is value in being fully engaged in a Christian community? How are you connected?

What is an enemy of Christ and why is it important to examine ourselves in regard to being a citizen of heaven vs a citizen of the world?

Paul doesn't have a category for imitating yourself. You are either imitating him or imitating someone else. How does this help you in considering if you are living a life worthy of the gospel or worthy of worldly gain?

Paul's driving force was future-oriented. Enemies of Christ seek benefits of the world, followers of Christ are motivated toward a future glory.

Who do we consider in our lives to be a joy and a crown? Who is imitating you? How serious do you take this responsibility?
