MATTHEW 7:12

So whatever you wish that others would do to you, do also to them, for this is the Law and the Prophets.

- I. Recap follow the thread
- II. Relationships I changed the title from the syllabus because Jesus' teaching here goes beyond just the issue of judgment. It's about how we relate to other people, whether friend or foe.
 - A. Matthew 7:1-5
 - 1. One of the most famous verses in the Bible today!
 - a) People tend to focus on verse 1, leaving the context out of it.
 - b) Literally an imperative (Do not judge) and what's called a subjunctive (usually words modified by might, would). Do not just so that you might not be judged.
 - c) Now, sometimes people treat this as a corollary to the Golden Rule (do unto others as you would have them do unto you.)
 - d) But that's not what this passage is about. There's a connection here between this section and the passage at the tail end of the Lord's Prayer in 6:14-15





- (1) In the Lord's Prayer, we're called upon to forgive and in vv.14-15, we're told that we'll receive forgiveness in the same way that we forgive others.
- (2) That's a terrifying reality for some people!
- e) In 7:1-5, we're told that we'll be judged (Hebrews 9:27) with the same measurement by which we judge others.
 - (1) What does it mean to judge?
 - (2) krinō as a technical legal term means to judge, to bring to judgment, or condemn.
 - (3) We are not the judge, jury, and executioner. Only God can do that.
 - (4) We are to exercise judgment as to what is right and wrong based on the Scriptures, but it is not our place to condemn someone to the pit of hell.
 - (5) So, I can say that Hitler's actions were beyond reprehensible but I cannot say "I condemn him to hell." Only the true and righteous Judge can do that.
 - (6) The reason we cannot condemn is because God is the judge and also because we don't even see ourselves clearly.
 - (a) vv.3-5 tell us that we often condemn without looking clearly at our own selves.
 - (b) A good prayer for his is Psa. 139:23-24 Search me, O
 God, and know my heart!
 Try me and know my thoughts! 24 And see if there be any grievous
 way in me, and lead me in the way everlasting!

B. Matthew 7:6

- 1. Treasure, value, worth.
 - a) What do we do with valuable things? Protect them. Not just material things, but truly valuable like our hearts.
 - b) Perhaps it means not correcting (cf. Mt 7:1-5) those who would not listen (cf. Prov 23:9). Perhaps it means giving only to those who want what one offers, as God does





- C. Matthew 7:7-11
 - 1. This passage, on the heels of v. 6 tells us something important.
 - 2. God is concerned with that which is valuable. He knows what is good and valuable.
 - 3. Ask! Because even earthly fathers want to give good gifts to their children.
 - a) Keener Fish and bread were basic staples, integral to the diet of most of Jesus' hearers; they do not stand for the fineries of the wealthy.
- D. Matthew 7:12
 - 1. Golden rule.
 - a) Almost a basic morality.
 - b) Important in all of our relationships
 - c) "For this is the law and the prophets" Mt. 22:40 On these two commandments depend all the Law and the Prophets.
