His voice, His ear, and His body.

We cannot have a genuine and life-giving relationship with God without prayer.

David Mathis, "Prayer, for the Christian, is not merely talking to God, but responding to the One who has initiated toward us. He has spoken first. This is not a conversation we start, but a relationship into which we've been drawn. His voice breaks the silence. Then, in prayer, we speak to the God who has spoken."

C.S. Lewis, "Prayer in the sense of petition, asking for things, is a small part of it; confession and penitence are its threshold, adoration its sanctuary, the presence and vision and enjoyment of God its bread and wine."

² <u>Devote yourselves to prayer</u> with an alert mind and a thankful heart.

¹⁸ <u>Pray in the Spirit at all times and on every occasion</u>. Stay alert and <u>be persistent in your prayers</u> for all believers everywhere.

1. Pray in secret.

Matthew 6:5-6 (NLT)

⁵ "When you pray, don't be like the hypocrites who love to pray publicly on street corners and in the synagogues where everyone can see them. I tell you the truth, that is all the reward they will ever get. ⁶ But when you pray, go away by yourself, shut the door behind you, and pray to your Father in private. Then your Father, who sees everything, will reward you."

Tim Keller, "The infallible test of spiritual integrity, Jesus says, is your private prayer life. Many people will pray when they are required by cultural or social expectations, or perhaps by the anxiety caused by troubling circumstances. Those with a genuinely lived relationship with God as Father, however will inwardly want to pray and therefore will pray even though nothing on the outside is pressing them to do so. They pursue it even during times of spiritual dryness, when there is no social or experiential payoff."

Private prayer will <u>reveal</u> if we are the <u>real</u> deal.

David Mathis writes, "This is the heart of prayer – not getting things from God, but getting God. Prayer is where we speak back to God, in response to his word to us, and experience what it means to enjoy him as an end in himself, not just a means to our petitions."

5 practical (quick) suggestions for Secret Prayer:

- 1. Create your <u>closet</u>.
- 2. Begin with the Bible.
- 3. Walk through <u>ACTS</u>. (Adoration, Confession, Thanksgiving, and Supplication.)
- 4. Put it all on the table.
- 5. Make it <u>new</u> again.

2. Pray with constancy.

Luke 18:1 (NLT)

¹ One day Jesus told his disciples a story to show that <u>they should always pray and never give up</u>.

Tim Keller says, *"Everywhere God is, prayer is...Since God is everywhere and infinitely great, prayer must be all-pervasive in our lives."*

3. Pray with company.

Acts 1:14 (NLT) -

¹⁴<u>They all met together</u> and <u>were constantly united in prayer</u>, along with Mary the mother of Jesus, several other women, and the brothers of Jesus.

Acts 2:42 (NLT)

⁴² All the believers devoted themselves to the apostles' teaching, and to fellowship, and to sharing in meals (including the Lord's Supper), <u>and to prayer</u>.

Acts 4:24 (NLT)

²⁴ When they heard the report, <u>all the believers lifted their voices together in prayer to God</u>: "O Sovereign Lord, Creator of heaven and earth, the sea, and everything in them—
