¹⁴ Do everything without complaining and arguing, ¹⁵ so that no one can criticize you. Live clean, innocent lives as children of God, shining like bright lights in a world full of crooked and perverse people.

For many Christians this requires a significant change in our Posture | Tone | Approach

1 Corinthians 9:19-23 (NLT)

¹⁹ Even though I am a free man with no master, <u>I have become a slave to all people to bring many to</u> <u>Christ</u>. ²⁰ When I was with the Jews, <u>I lived like a Jew to bring the Jews to Christ</u>. When I was with those who follow the Jewish law, I too lived under that law. Even though I am not subject to the law, <u>I did this</u> <u>so I could bring to Christ those who are under the law</u>. ²¹ When I am with the Gentiles who do not follow the Jewish law, <u>I too live apart from that law so I can bring them to Christ</u>. But I do not ignore the law of God; <u>I obey the law of Christ</u>.

²² When I am with those who are weak, I share their weakness, for <u>I want to bring the weak to Christ</u>. <u>Yes, I try to find common ground with everyone, doing everything I can to save some</u>. ²³ I do everything to spread the Good News and share in its blessings.

What if the greatest way of influencing people is to <u>submit</u> to and <u>serve</u> them?
