# Corinthian (Christian) Problems

- Lacking in love.
- Attraction to fleshly things.
- Despising personal weakness.
- Love of skill and gifts, not of God and others.
- Quickly turning against one another.

# Corinthian (Christian) Problems

- Suspicious, judgmental.
- Factions and favoritism.
- Loose on sin, hard on leaders.
- Influence by the culture instead of the scriptures.
- Selfish ambitions.

(1) This will be the third time I am coming to you. "By the mouth of two or three witnesses every word shall be established."

(2) I have told you before, and foretell as if I were present the second time, and now being absent I write to those who have sinned before, and to all the rest, that if I come again I will not spare

(3) since you seek a proof of Christ speaking in me, who is not weak toward you, but mighty in you.

(4) For though He was crucified in weakness, yet He lives by the power of God. For we also are weak in Him, but we shall live with Him by the power of God toward you.

(5) Examine yourselves as to whether you are in the faith. Test yourselves. Do you not know yourselves, that Jesus Christ is in you?--unless indeed you are disqualified.

(6) But I trust that you will know that we are not disqualified.

# Church discipline and the Gospel

- 1. Confront lovingly in private (Matt. 18:15; Gal. 6:1)
- 2. If refuses to repent, take one or two others along as witnesses (Matt. 18:16)

# Church discipline and the Gospel

- 3. If still unrepent, bring it to church leadership (Matt. 18:17)
- 4. If still unrepent, kicked out and treated as an unbeliever (Matt. 18:17)
- 1 Tim. 5:19; 1:18; Titus 3:10; 1 Cor. 5

# v. 4 - Weakness & power in the Gospel

The Paradox of the Cross, The upsidedown kingdom, A Divine Conspiracy (Mat 5-7)

Christ's Spirit at work in the believer has certain effects of sanctification and faithfulness (Gal. 5:22–23; 2 Pet. 3:18)

#### v. 5-6 - Self Examination

1. Trust: Faith and Repentance, a trust, allegiance, and reliance on Jesus as my Savior and Lord.

2. Follow: This trust leads to a desire to be His disciple/apprentice, implementing His teachings (John 8:31), integrating our existence into eternal living.

3. Obey: This discipleship/ apprenticeship leads to obedience. Our experiences make us love God more and more, encouraging obedience, even in misunderstanding or dislike.

4. LOVE: Obedience, and the discipline it demands, leads to inner transformation. The disciple's state becomes one of loving others as we grow in love, joy, peace, patience, kindness, goodness, faith, meekness, and self-control.' (Gal. 5:22

Love, joy, peace, patience, kindness, goodness, faithfulness, gentleness, and self-control.
