# God Sees the Unseen Genesis 29:1-35

### THE REDEMPTION STORY: FROM GENESIS TO JESUS

- The Bible is one beautiful story of Jesus and redemption (Ephesians 1:7-10)
- Scripture presents a purposeful narrative revealing God's redemptive plan (2 Timothy 3:16-17)

#### Big Picture

- Redeemer/Seed Hunt Gen. 3:15;
   12:1-3
- Past promises point to future faithfulness, different times - same Lord
- Continuity From Abraham to Christ (Heb 11:13–16; Gal 3:29)

#### Genesis 29:1-35

#### God Sees the Unseen

God uses providence, painful people, and unexpected grace to shape you.

## v.1-14 God Guides Us Even When We Aren't Seeking Him

- 1. "lifted up his feet" renewed courage
- 2. The well: providential intersections (Gen. 24; Ex. 2; John 4)
- 3. Jacob's impulse (29:7)
- 4. Rachel's perfect timing (29:9)

#### v. 15-20 — Sister Wives

1. Leah - likely means "wild cow"
Her eyes are described as "rakkot" —
meaning "weak," "dull," or "lacking
sparkle."

#### v. 15-20 — Sister Wives

2. Rachel -"ewe," (fitting for a shepherdess)
"beautiful in form and appearance" (29:17)

The same phrase used of: Sarah (Gen. 12:11); Rebekah (Gen. 24:16); Joseph (Gen. 39:6); Esther (Esth. 2:7)

#### v.21-30 Pride and Prejudice

- 1. Jacob Gets Jacobed (Gal. 6:7)
- 2. Jacob's directness, crudeness, and lack of prayer reveals his mindset
- 3. "Jacob cries out the same question others asked him: 'What is this you have done?'" (cf. Gen. 3:13; 12:18; 20:9; 26:10)

#### God's disciplining: measure for measure

- Jacob tricked his blind father → Jacob is tricked in the dark.
- Jacob disguised himself as the older brother → Laban gives the disguised older sister.
- 3. Jacob **pretended** to be Esau → Leah **pretends** to be Raçhel.

Galatians 6:7 in narrative form: "You reap what you sow."

#### This is grace—and correction.

God is forming Jacob's character by letting him experience his own sin from the other side.

### v.31-35 God Sees the Unloved and Works Through the Unexpected

- 1. Leah is unloved—but God sees
  - a. Reuben -> God sees
  - b. Simeon \(\rightarrow\) God hears
  - c. Levi -> God attaches
  - d. Judah \(\rightarrow\) Praise
- 2. The Messiah comes through Leah

### Takeaways

1. God guides us even when we aren't seeking Him (Gen. 29:1-4; Psalm 73:23; Prov. 16:9)

Pray that your eyes will be opened, you would turn and recognize His gentle guiding hand

2. **God sanctifies** us through difficult people and circumstances (Gen. 29:15–20; Prov. 27:6; Gen. 50:20)

Difficult people: Instead of just praying, "Lord, remove them," pray, "Lord, refine me through them, change me or the situation"

3. **God uses** painful providence to break our pride and reveal our own sin (Gen. 29:21–30; Gal. 6:7; Heb. 12:5–11)

Instead of asking: "Why is this happening?" ask, "Lord, what are You forming in me through this? Show me the areas of my life that need changing"

4. God sees the unloved and works through the unexpected (Gen. 29:31–35; Psa. 34:18; Rom. 8:28)

Ask for prayer, get in to the Word, join a small group, and preach to your soul: "God sees me. God hears me. God is working in what feels wasted." And then — have eyes to see someone else who needs to be seen.
