## Points

Title: The Resurrection and the Life: Jesus' Power Over Death

Jesus said to her, 'I am the resurrection and the life. He who believes in me, though he may die, he shall live. And whoever lives and believes in me shall never die. Do you believe this?'

Miracles do not produce faith. All they produce is a hunger for more miracles, something else to excite the soul, something else to get us all stirred up.

There are no guarantees, even with faith in Jesus. I pray for some people and they get healed. I prayed for one of my best friends who was an elder, fantastic elder named Mark Braden. I prayed and prayed and prayed for him. And he was healed for a season, but then the Lord took him, took him home.



## Discussion Questions

How does Jesus' statement 'I am the resurrection and the life' challenge our understanding of life, death, and eternity?

In what ways might our faith be tested or strengthened when facing the death of a loved one, as Martha and Mary experienced?

How do you reconcile the idea that 'miracles do not produce faith' with the many miraculous acts Jesus performed in the Gospels?

What can we learn from Jesus' emotional response (weeping, groaning in spirit) to Lazarus' death and the grief of his loved ones?

How might understanding Jesus as both fully divine and fully human (as seen in His response to Lazarus' death) impact our relationship with Him?

In what ways does the story of Lazarus challenge or affirm your beliefs about the afterlife and resurrection?

How can we cultivate a faith that, like Martha's, remains strong even in the face of seemingly unanswered prayers or delayed responses from God?

What insights does the parable of the rich man and Lazarus (in Luke 16) offer about the nature of faith and the power of God's word?

How might Jesus' command to 'believe and see' rather than 'see and believe' apply to our lives and faith journeys today?

In what ways does the concept of Jesus as 'the resurrection and the life' offer hope and comfort in our daily lives, beyond just the moment of physical death?



## Small Group Guide: Jesus, the Resurrection and the Life

Opening Prayer

Key Scripture: John 11:17-37

Discussion Questions:

1. What stands out to you most from the story of Jesus raising Lazarus? Why?
2. How does Martha's response to Jesus (verses 21-22, 27) demonstrate faith? In what ways can we cultivate that kind of faith in difficult circumstances?
3. Jesus states, "I am the resurrection and the life" (v. 25). What does this mean to you personally? How does it impact your view of death and eternity?

## Daily Devotional

Reading: John 11:1-6
