Discussion Questions

Daily Devotional

Day 3: Light in the Darkness

Reading: John 3:16-21

Devotional: "Light has come into the world, but people loved darkness instead of light because their deeds were evil." This passage reveals the heart of the gospel - God's love confronting human darkness. Reflect on areas in your life or in society where you see this tension between light and darkness. How has Christ's light transformed your own life? Consider how you might be called to be a bearer of that light in your sphere of influence. Pray for courage to step out of comfort zones and shine Christ's love in dark places, remembering that the light always overcomes the darkness.

Day 4: Freedom in Truth

Reading: John 8:31-36

Let this truth anchor your soul in the midst of life's storms.
