- Christmas and this last week of the year is a special time for reflection
- There is a tendency to try to make everything perfect and add a shiny veneer
- However, this year, in the midst of war and turmoil all around us, it is in many ways most true to the first Christmas
- And so we zoom into the story of Bethlehem this year
- Moment of meditation w/ Majalia Jackson's version of O Little Town of Bethlehem.
 - O little town of Bethlehem How still we see thee lie Above thy deep and dreamless sleep The silent stars go by Yet in thy dark streets shineth The everlasting light The hopes and fears of all the years Are met in thee tonight
- My connection to Bethlehem trips in 2015 & 2018 cross stich collective
- Visiting the garden full of gas cannisters
- This year they have cancelled many of the festivities in Bethlehem

- In many ways this is actually a realer Christmas than usual Hope and Fear
- Manger, Magi, and Massacre
- The Good News is that God shows up to the people and places that need it most.
