1

- I) V23-29 INTRO: By faith Moses when he became of age refused to be called the son *WE'RE GOING TO LOOK AT MOSES*
- II) Moses was Israel's greatest prophet
- III) When God revealed Himself to Israel, He would use various ways to do so He used dreams, visions, angels, events, symbols, signs, wonders and miracles
- IV) God used various means of revelation, but He especially did so through prophets Nu 12:6 (God) said, "Listen to my words: When a prophet of the LORD is among you, I reveal Myself to him in visions, I speak to him in dreams.
- V) It was the prophets who ultimately were moved by God to write the Bible 2 Pe 1:20-21 Above all, you must understand that no prophecy of Scripture came about by the prophet's own interpretation. For prophecy never had its origin in the will of man, but men spoke from God as they were carried along by the Holy Spirit.

 Moses was used by God to write the *first five books*
- VI) The prophets were incredible witnesses of God, but Moses was the greatest First: When God spoke to Moses, it was more intimate and personal GOD MADE IT CLEAR: MOSES WAS GREAT
- VII) Moses had a sister Miriam and a brother named Aaron
 On one occasion they had spoken against Moses
 They were upset over his marriage to a foreign wife, and caused strife

 BOTH MIRIAM AND AARON WERE REGARDED
- VIII) Ex 15:20 reveals that Miriam was a prophetess

 Ex 4:15-17 reveals that Aaron was Moses' spokesperson, and

 Ex 29:9 reveals that he was the first High Priest of Israel
- IX) This placed them in leadership as well as high esteem in the nation
- X) Their rebellion against Moses and his authority provoked the Lord to anger Nu 12:6-8 (God) said, "Listen to My words: "When a prophet of the LORD is among you, I reveal Myself to him in visions, I speak to him in dreams. But this is not true of My servant Moses; he is faithful in all My house. With him I speak face to face, clearly and not in riddles; he sees the form of the LORD. Why then were you not afraid to speak against My servant Moses?"

- I) The others receive <u>visions</u>, or <u>dreams</u> but I am different with Moses I reveal My will to him plainly, and communicate intimately with HIm <u>SECOND</u>
- II) Not only was Moses Israel's greatest prophet, he was also Israel's Lawgiver It was Moses who went to Mt Sinai to receive the Law of God (Ex 24; Ac 7:38)

 Jn 1:17 The law was given through Moses; grace and truth came through Jesus Christ THIRD
- III) He was also Israel's greatest writer, giving us the first five books of the Bible FOURTH: He was Israel's greatest type of Messiah

Dt 18:15 The LORD your God will raise up for you a prophet like me from among your own brothers. You must listen to him. (quoted in Ac 3:21-23)

Jn 1:19-21 This was John's testimony when the Jews of Jerusalem sent priests and Levites to ask him who he was. He did not fail to confess, but confessed freely, "I am not the Christ". They asked him, "Then who are you? Are you Elijah?" He said, "I am not". "Are you the Prophet?" He answered, "No".

FIFTH: He was Israels greatest example of godliness

Nu 12:3 Moses was a very humble man, more humble than anyone else on the face of the earth.

- IV) SIXTH: In the OT, he was Israel's greatest deliverer Exodus gives us the details concerning how Israel's deliverance took place
- V) To this day, to the people of Israel, there is no one who matches Moses
 Dt 34:10-12 Since then, no prophet has risen in Israel like Moses, whom the
 LORD knew face to face, who did all those miraculous signs and wonders the LORD
 sent him to do in Egypt --to Pharaoh and to all his officials and to his whole land. For no
 one has ever shown the mighty power or performed the awesome deeds that Moses did
 in the sight of all Israel.
- VI) The writer of Hebrews Intends to show us that his entire life was bathed in faith V23-29 Contain 5 sections emphasizing his faith, each section beginning By Faith FIRST
- VII) V23 By faith Moses, when he was born, was hidden three months by his parents V23 Opens up with the faith of his parents

DEVELOP: EX 1

VIII) Joseph and his family had moved to Egypt remaining for 400 years (Gen 15:13) Ex 1:8-14 During those centuries, they had grown in number and power

- Over the enturies, a new dynasty arose
 Ex 1:8 A new king, who did not know about Joseph, came to power in Egypt.
- II) The new Pharaoh feared the Jews as they had grown numerous in Egypt He believed they might side with enemies if war broke out, and leave (V10)
- III) V11-14 Because of this he ordered them into forced labor, building Royal cities V12 Yet the more they were oppressed, the more they multiplied and spread
- IV) This caused the Egyptians to treat them even more harshly They made their lives bitter, working them in construction and field labor
- V) V15-16 Pharaoh ordered the Hebrew midwives to kill every male child V17 The midwives feared the God of Abraham, and would not follow his orders CH 2
- VI) Ch 2:1-10 A Jewish couple named Amram and Jochebed were raising a family They had three children: Aaron, Miriam, and a beautiful son named Moses
- VII) V2 Tells us that Jochebed hid Moses for three months

 The writer of Hebrews gives us two reasons why his parents hid him

 Heb 11:23 By faith Moses when he was born, was hidden three months by his

 parents because they saw he was a beautiful child; and they were not afraid of the kings command
- VIII) First: He was a beautiful child: Of higher quality; Valuable, better, ethical, excellent Ac 7:20 At this time Moses was born, and was well pleasing to God
- IX) Second: They weren't afraid of Pharaoh because they exercised faith in God
 They trusted in God seeking Him to protect them
 Ps 12:5 Because the poor are being oppressed, because the needy are sighing, I
 will now arise," says the LORD, "I will establish in safety those who yearn for it."
- X) V3 When Moses was three months old, Jochebed could no longer hide him She got a basket, waterproofed it, and placed him in the Nile as Miriam watched V5 Pharaoh's daughter found him while bathing
- XI) V6 She knew he was a Hebrew child but felt sorry for him and decided to take him

- V7 Miriam suggested she bring him to a Hebrew woman, to nurse the baby V9 She brought him to his mother: Jochebed nursed him, and got paid for it!
- II) V10 Painfully: When he grew beyond nursing age, she gave him to Pharaoh's daughter, who named him Moses, saying "I drew him out of the water"

 He would have been between two and three years of age
- III) Before being given to Pharaoh's daughter Moses was taught faith in God He would have been taught the basics of the Jewish faith, from birth He would have been made aware that he was Jewish
- IV) This made him prepared for when he was called to be Israel's deliverer
 Heb 11:24-26 By faith Moses, when he became of age, refused to be called the
 son of Pharaoh's daughter choosing rather to suffer affliction with the people of God
 than to enjoy the passing (temporary) pleasures of sin, esteeming the reproach of Christ
 greater riches than the treasures in Egypt; for he looked to the reward
- V) While in Pharaoh's household, Moses was trained up in the wisdom of Egypt
 Ac 7:22-23 Moses was educated in all the wisdom of the Egyptians and was
 powerful *in speech* and *action*. When Moses was forty years old, he decided to visit his
 fellow Israelites.
- VI) Moses received all the training a King would receive yet remained faithful to God
 He was trained in geography, geometry, astronomy, natural history hieroglyphics
 and martial arts

SECOND: HE ACTED ON HIS CALL

- VII) Heb 11:24 **By faith** Moses, when he became of age, refused to be called the son of Pharaoh's daughter, choosing rather to suffer affliction with the people of God than to enjoy the passing pleasures of sin, esteeming the reproach of Christ greater riches than the treasures in Egypt; for he looked to the reward.
- VIII) Ex 2:11-15 At this time Moses began to act on what he knew was his call He was visiting the children of Israel, and looking at their burdens
- IX) He became enraged at the injustice of their lives, and dealt with it in the flesh Ac 7:25 Moses thought that his own people would realize that God was using him to rescue them, but they did not.

It was at the age of 40 that he committed himself fully to the Jewish people
He refused to be called the son of Pharaoh: This is why he was among the Jews
The result of this was his exile from Egypt

RETURN TO HEB 11:23-29

- II) The rest of his life is incredible reading: the question at this point is simple Why was he willing to do this? Why did he choose to suffer with the Jews
- Earth's pains are temporary: God's rewards are eternal
 Ac 20:23-24 The Holy Ghost witnesses in every city, saying that bonds and afflictions abide me. But none of these things move me, neither count I my life dear unto myself, so that I might finish my course with joy, and the ministry, which I have received of the Lord Jesus, to testify the gospel of the grace of God.
- IV) V26 He looked for an eternal reward, one that was beyond earthly possessions

 He stood to be incredibly wealthy and powerful yet saw beyond the momentary
- V) Mt 6:19-21 Do not store up for yourselves treasures on earth, where moth and rust destroy, and where thieves break in and steal. But store up for yourselves treasures in heaven, where moth and rust do not destroy, and where thieves do not break in and steal. For where your treasure is, there your heart will be also.
- VI) Dt 34:7 tells us that he died at the age of 120

 He could have ruled Egypt for a number of years, and then simply die

 He wanted something permanent: an eternal reward

 THIRD: BY FAITH HE BECAME FULLY COMMITTED
- VII) V27 By faith he forsook Egypt not fearing the wrath of the king He forsook Egypt on two occasions
 After killing the taskmaster, and when he delivered Israel
- VIII) He *forsook* (renounced, turned his back) *on everything*, to follow God

 This is the requirement for all who follow the Lord

 Lu 9:23 Jesus said to all of them, If anyone wants to come after Me, he must deny himself and take up his cross *daily* and follow Me
- Lu 9:62 No one who puts his hand to the plow and looks back is fit for service in the kingdom of God

V27 How did he do this? He endured as seeing Him who is invisible
 He knew his means of support was an invisible power

Ps 91:14 Because he loves me," says the LORD, "I will rescue him; I will protect him, for he acknowledges my name. He will call upon me, and I will answer him; I will be with him in trouble, I will deliver him and honor him.

FOURTH: HE KEPT THE PASSOVER

- II) V28 By faith he kept the Passover and the sprinkling of blood
 When God delivered Israel, he brought a series of 10 plagues against Egypt
 These plagues were actually God judging the false gods worshiped in Egypt
- III) Remember: The Egyptians were idolaters

 They worshiped creation and rejected God

 Ro 1:25 They exchanged the truth of God for a lie, and worshipped and served created things rather than the Creator who is forever praised.
- IV) Egypt had kept the Jews in bondage, but God determined to set them free In doing so, He judged the false gods of Egypt
- V) This is what is referred to as Passover

 Ex 12:12 I will pass through the land of Egypt on that night, and will strike all the firstborn in the land of Egypt, both man and beast; and against all the gods of Egypt I will execute judgment: I am the Lord
- VI) Blood: All water: River, pools, ponds, even in vessels (Hapi the Nile goddess)
 Nile: Life giving Nile god represented fertility and nourishment
 Frogs: Heqt: Frog headed goddess of fertility and rebirth
 Lice (Stinging blood sucking gnats): Geb, god of the dust
 Flies: May have been Kheper, the scarab deity representing continual existence
 Pestilence on flocks: Bull-headed god Apis and Hathor a cowlike mother goddess
 Boils on man and beast (Thoth, god of healing)
 This afflicted the priesthood--priests could not sacrifice unclean animals
 Hail: Isis, the sky goddess is judged
 Locusts: Seth, Insect god that was supposed to protect the crops
 Darkness for 3 days: Against the sun god, Ra, chief god of Egypt, the source of life

VII) To survive, blood was applied to the doorposts and the lintel, covering the family

Death of firstborn: Pharaoh was descended from Ra, but his children were not safe

I) The sprinkling was a symbolic act of faith, trusting for the Lord to deliver them It symbolizes His sacrifice by which He conquered death for all who trust Him To enter into the Kingdom, we must accept God's way of salvation

FIFTH: THEY CROSSED THE RED SEA

- II) V29 By faith they passed through the Red Sea as by dry land As Israel escaped, Pharaoh's armies were not far behind
- III) The crossing of the Red Sea represented many things
 It was a symbol of Israel being delivered from bondage
 It symbolized a picture of purification, separating them from their past
 It revealed faith, and obedience
 It became a picture of passing from death to life
 It pictured the entrance into a deeper spiritual life
 It revealed God's divine intervention and presence with His followers
- IV) It also represented Israel's relationship to Moses, as their leader/deliverer 1 Co 10:1-2 For I do not want you to be ignorant of the fact, brothers and sisters, that our ancestors were all under the cloud and that they all passed through the sea. They were all baptized into Moses in the cloud and in the sea.
- V) THE STUDY BIBLE: The crossing of the Red Sea prefigures Christian baptism, which signifies identification with Christ. The concept of baptism as a form of *initiation* or *passage* is consistent with Jewish purification rituals and the New Testament understanding of baptism as a symbol of spiritual cleansing and commitment.
- VI) We will close by reading Ex 14

 Faith takes God at His word and gives provision for victory in Him
