- I) V1-6 INTRO: Moreover Job continued his discourse and said
- II) As we begin our look at this chapter, I will remind you of what has just taken place
- III) One of Job's friends, Bildad, has once again made it clear he thinks Job has sinned

He has reminded Job that God is Sovereign and that God is the

Almighty

God commands an infinite military and His presence is throughout the earth (25:3)

IV) Since God is perfect, what is a man in comparison to Him

How can a man claim to be righteous, seeing that man is filled with
sinfulness

The fact is man is a maggot and simply a worm! (25:6)

V) Job responded to Bildad by basically saying that what he had just said was worthless

How has what you have said been of help to me?

VI) The fact is you have been of no help at all

Have you strenghtened my weakened life? Have you given the benefit of your wisdom

You are convinced that I have no wisdom but what wisdom have you offered to me?

- VII) Job went on to ask: just whom are you speaking to, anyway? (26:3)

 Surely you aren't speaking to me, and just who prompted you to speak to me like this
- VIII) We saw how after Job made these statements, he once again spoke of God's greatness

The dead tremble before Him, He suspends the earth with nothing supporting it

He creates clouds, and they hold the water but do not burst by its weight

He covers the face of His throne, and man cannot approach His holiness

IX) Even in my saying these things of Him, I am just touching on His grandeur (26:14)

How can I speak of such an awesome God

X) Bildad spoke of God's might and asked how can a man be righteous before God (25:4)

In this question he revealed that he know of God's righteousness but

In this question he revealed that he knew of God's righteousness but not His grace

- XI) QUOTE: If sin will be the ruin of men-and surely it will-yet our Lord Jesus Christ knows how to take the ruined sinners and build them up to be temples for His indwelling. Christ will take the very castaways of the devil and use them for Himself. He delights to stoop over the dunghill and pick up a broken vessel that is thrown away, and make it into a vessel fit for the Master's use.
- XII) Bildad had touched a nerve with Job, and Job has begun to respond
 V1-6 Job now continues to maintain his claim of integrity before God
 and man
- I) V1 He begins by calling God to be his witness: As God lives

 Job makes it clear that what he is going through is from the hand of God

This has confused him deeply because he did not know of anything he had done

II) He says God has taken away my justice and has made my soul bitter

TAKEN AWAY: He has denied, or withheld justice from me, treating me
as guilty

I am suffering, but God hasn't helped me to understand why this is
happening

III) He won't explain His actions to me and has left me wondering what I have done wrong

God has not entered into discussion with him concerning the justice of His doings

He has treated Job as if he is guilty but hasn't revealed what he is guilty of

IV) He has not shown me what I have done wrong, though He knows that I trust Him

I have begged Him to reveal why this is happening, but He is silent He hasn't revealed to me what I have done to offend him

- V) V2 THE RESULT: He has made my soul bitter

 Bitterness is often defined as anger and disappointment at being treated unfairly
- VI) Job had already made it clear that he was in misery and would speak openly

about it

Job 7:11 Therefore I will not keep silent; I will speak out in the anguish of my spirit, I will complain in the bitterness of my soul

- VII) Bitterness is being settled on the injustice of something and not letting it go
 It can be overcome when we relinquish to God what is out of our control
 Heb 12:14-15 Make every effort to live in peace with everyone and to be
 holy; without holiness no one will see the Lord. See to it that no one falls short of the
 grace of God and that no bitter root grows up to cause trouble and defile many.
- VIII) At this point, Job has become bitter because he has had no answer from God
- IX) Still, we need to remember that Job still trusts the Lord
 Job 13:15 Though He slay me, yet will I trust Him. Even so, I will defend
 my own ways before Him
- X) V3-4 As long as my breath is in me, and the breath of God in my nostrils my lips will not

The breath of God is alluding to how God breathed life into Adam Gen 2:7 And the Lord God formed man of the dust of the ground, and breathed into his nostrils the breath of life, and man became a living being

- XI) V4 As long as I am alive I will not speak wickedness nor my tongue utter deceit
- I) This would inform his friends that he was not what they thought he was I am not speaking in favor of wickedness, nor am I lying to cover up any sin
- II) V4 Nor my tongue utter deceit
 I cannot confess to a guilt that I do not truly possess
- III) V5 Far be it from me that I should say you are right! Til I die I will not put away my

I am not going to say that you have been right all along! I am not going to confess to sin, just to please you!

- IV) I am going to continue to maintain my innocence:

 I am know I am a sinner, but I have not done what you continue to accuse me of!
- V) V6 My righteousness I hold fast and will not let it go My heart shall not reproach me

I will hold on to my knowledge that I have lived uprightly before God

VI) I have lost every thing of value to me: family, possessions, health, dignity and standing

But I will not let go of my sense that I have lived in my integrity
Ps 7:8 The Lord judges the peoples; judge me, O Lord, according to
my righteousness and according to the integrity that is in me.

VII) V7 May my enemy be like the wicked and he who rises up against me like the unrighteous

Job's tone changes and he begins to call down curses upon his enemies

Instead of being like the wicked, Job makes it clear that they have nothing in common

- VIII) This kind of speech in not completely uncommon in scripture

 The psalms have many examples of this kind of intense sentiment
- IX) Ps 3:7 Arise, O LORD; save me, O my God: for You have struck all my enemies on the cheekbone; You have broken the teeth of the ungodly.

Ps 10:15 Break the arm of the wicked and the evil man: seek out his wickedness until You find none

Ps 58:6 Break their teeth, O God, in their mouth

- X) Job is responding to how his friends have painted him as evil and sinful
 He is distancing himself from such thoughts
 I do not love wickedness, I even hate even the thought of it
- XI) V8 For what is the hope of the hypocrite Though he may gain much if God takes away his

A hypocrite is an actor, putting on a mask to appear different then what he is

- C. S. Lewis Of all bad men, *religious* bad men are the worst
- I) Job is saying that he is not a hypocrite

 There is no reason he should envy them or desire what they have

 Even if they gain much they never enjoy it and eventually leave it, or

lose it

- II) V8 Eventually God takes away his life
- III) He dies, God judges him and he enters into eternity as one who lost everything Lu 12:15-20 And He said to them Take care, and be on your guard against all covetousness, for one's life does not consist in the abundance of his possessions. And He told them a parable, saying The land of a rich man produced plentifully, and he thought to himself, What shall I do, for I have nowhere to store my

crops? And he said, I will do this: I will tear down my barns and build larger ones, and there I will store all my grain and my goods. And I will say to my soul, Soul, you have ample goods laid up for many years; relax, eat, drink, be merry but God said to him, Fool! This night your soul is required of you and the things you have prepared, whose will they be?

- IV) V9 Will God hear his cry when trouble comes upon him
 Will God listen to the one who never listened to Him?
 Ps 66:18 If I regard iniquity in my heart, the Lord will not hear
- V) V10 Will he delight himself in the Almighty? Will he always call on God? No, because his delight is in what the world has to offer him
- VI) Because of this he does not call on God because his confidence is in his possessions

His trust is in his material advantages

1 Ti 6:17 Teach those who are rich in this world not to be proud and not to trust in their money, which is so unreliable. Their trust should be in God, who richly gives us all we need for our enjoyment.

- VII) V11 Will he delight himself in the Almighty Will he always call on God
 Delighting in the Lord occurs when we learn to long for the things that
 He desires
- VIII) A genuine believer finds their fufillment and delight in the Lord
 Ps 37:4 Delight yourself in the Lord and He will give you the desires of your heart
- IX) The believer knows that it is in God's word that he will find true joy
 He delights in the Lord when He desires what the Lord desires
 Ps 1:1-2 Blessed is the man who walks not in the counsel of the
 ungodly, nor stands in the path of sinners, nor sits in the seat of the scornful; but his
 delight is in the law of the LORD, and in His law he meditates day and night.
- I) V11 Will he always call on God

 The fact is, the hypocrite does not always call on God

 If his prayer is answered, he still will not have a genuine relationship with God!
- II) V11-12 I will teach you about the hand of God; what is with the Almighty I will not conceal

I will now teach you regarding how God deals with the wicked

- III) Job will at this point refine and restate what he believes God to be like and what He does
- IV) V12 Surely all of you have seen it; why then do you behave with complete nonsense

What I am about to say is something that you have known by your own experience

I am not saying anything that you haven't learned yourself

V) Because this is true, I don't understand how you continue with your wrong opinions

Why do you continue saying that my suffering is proof of a secret sin

life?

Why do you insist on saying that only wicked people suffer, but not the righteous?

- VI) V12 Surely you have seen that the wicked can be afflicted
 I just don't understand why you insist on condemning me as being wicked!
- VII) V13 This is the portion of the wicked man with God and the heritage of oppressors

In this opening word, he repeats what Zophar had said in 20:29 This is what the wicked have in store for them

VIII) V14 If his children are multiplied it is for the sword and his offspring shall not be satisfied

In the ancient world, children were regarded as gifts from God The more the children, the greater the blessing

IX) The sad fact is, even when the wicked have many children often there is tragedy

They may die at the hand of enemy forces, or die in tragic ways

X) V14b And his offspring shall not be satisfied with bread
If they somehow escape this kind of experience, they can fall into poverty

Being poor, there will be no one to relieve them of their misery, and will suffer hunger

XI) V15 Those who survive him shall be buried in death and their widows shall not weep

Those who survive the sword and famine will die of disease

There will not be any friends who will bury them so they remain unburied

XII) V15 Their widows shall not weep (no one to lament and sorrow at their death)

There will be no funeral procession or those who weep at their death

I) When he says widows it is a hint that the man had many wives

This often was the case with the rich: many wives was a symbol of status

None of them will weep at his death A very great omission in the eyes of middle-easterners

II) V16-17 Though he heaps up silver like dust and piles up clothing like clay he may pile

These are pictures of abundance

- III) The wealth of Solomon was described in a similar way
 2 Chron 1:15 The king made silver and gold as common in Jerusalem as
 stones, and cedar as plentiful as sycamore-fig trees in the foothils
- IV) Even as today, wealth was often demonstrated by quantities of furniture and clothing

There was a desire to display wealth openly, so clothing became very important

Because they had so much, the value of such things ceased being important

V) V17 He may pile it up but the just will wear it and the innocent will divide the silver

This is a thought found in other places in scripture

Eccl 2:26 God gives wisdom, knowledge, and joy to those who please him. But if a sinner becomes wealthy, God takes the wealth away and gives it to those who please him. This, too, is meaningless—like chasing the wind.

Pr 23:5 Cast but a glance at riches, and they are gone, for they will surely sprout wings and fly off to the sky like an eagle.

VI) V18 He builds his house like a moth, like a booth which a watchman makes

An evil man attempting to build a lasting home and family is like a moth trying to build a lasting monument to itself

It is as temporary as a cocoon

VII) V19 The rich man will lie down but not be gathered up he opens his eyes and he is no

Like all men, the rich man will die

He will not be gathered up (for burial) but his carcass will lie openly
upon the earth

VIII) V19 He opens his eyes and he is no more

This is a picture of dying suddenly, never having the full use of all the weath he had

In just a moment, he is gone and his life is concluded

- IX) V20 Terrors overtake him like a flood A temptest steals him away in the night He does not die in peace, and his death is quick and unexpected
- X) V21-22 The east wind carries him away and he is gone it sweeps him out of his place
- I) The east wind is a picture of swift and violent judgment

 The east wind violently takes him away, sweeping him from the earth
- II) V23 Men shall clap their hands at him and shall hiss him out of his place
 People will rejoice when he no longer is alive
 Instead of weeping, they deride his death and are happy that he is dead
- III) This reminds me of the last words of some who rejected Jesus
- IV) Voltaire: A brilliant man who used his skills to attack Christianity

 He said "My single hand shall destroy the edifice it took twelve apostles to rear
- V) When he died, his physician wrote down his last words and this is what he said

I am abandoned by God and man! I will give yu half of what I am worth if you will give me six months' life. Then I shall go to hell; and you will go with me. O Christ! O Jesus Christ

- VI) Shortly after he died the house he used to print his literature became the depot of the Geneva Bible Society
- VII) Contrast this with the way a believer can die
- VIII) The first martyr of the church was a man named Stephen

 He was one of the first deacons, and had been arrested for preaching the gospel
- IX) When he stood before the high priest, Stephen preached the gospel

As he preached he gave a short history of the nation of Israel
After sharing its history, he made it clear that Israel's priests resisted
the Spirit

- X) As the result of this strong word, the Jewish officials executed him Stephen's last words were Lord, do not charge them with this sin Ac 8:60 closes with the words And when he had said this, he fell asleep
- XI) Peace comes through forgiveness and a fellowship with God
