- I) V8-10 INTRO: We are *hard pressed* on every side yet not *crushed* we are *perplexed REVIEW*
- II) V7 Paul just contrasted what he called the treasure with the container

 This was to reveal the difference of quality between the treasure and vessel
- III) Treasure is something that is a valuable or precious possession of any kind What is Paul saying is the treasure contained in the earthen vessel?
- IV) The treasure is the light of the knowledge of the glory of Christ
 The gospel of Jesus is what gives spiritual illumination to those in darkness
 BRIEFLY
- V) Light and darkness is often used to speak of the difference between good and evil Eph 4:18 speaks of those who are darkened in their understand and alienated from the life of God because of the ignorance that is in them due to the hardness of their hearts
- VI) In Romans, Paul gave insight into the fruit of spiritual darkness
 Ro 1:21-22 For although they knew God, they neither glorified him as God nor gave thanks to him, but their thinking became futile, and their foolish hearts were darkened. Although the claimed to be wise, they became fools

 WHAT IS THE REMEDY
- VII) The receiving the message of the gospel, which drives away the darkness
 The gospel message presents Jesus to us, and His work of salvation
 Jn 1:4 In Him was life, and that life was the *light of men*
- VIII) Ps 119:130 The **entrance** (revelation) of Your words gives light; it gives understanding to the simple
- IX) The entrance of God's word occurs when the message is received by faith
- X) To those in darkness, the light of saving knowledge in Jesus has been received When we trusted in Jesus, the result was spiritual illumination: enlightenment 1 Co 2:12-13 What we have received is not the spirit of the world, but the Spirit who is from God, so that we may understand what God has freely given us. This is what we speak, not in words taught us by human wisdom but in words taught by the Spirit, explaining spiritual realities with Spirit-taught words

- I) Paul made it clear: the gospel is veiled to those who are perishing (V4)

 This is because Satan has blinded those who do not believe the message
- II) This spiritual blindness is removed when the gospel is received 2 Co 3:16 When one turns to the Lord, the veil is taken away
- III) V6 God's light, illuminating our darkness, reveals Jesus to us

 God who commanded *light to shine* out of darkness *has shone* in our hearts
- IV) Salvation originates with God, and not with man
 It is His message of salvation through Jesus that we believed and were save
 Jn 1:12-13 To all who received him, to those who believed in his name, he gave the right to become sons of God--sons born not of natural descent, nor of human decision or a husband's will but born of God

BEFORE WE WERE SAVED

- V) We not only *lived* in spiritual darkness, but we also actually *preferred it*Jn 3:19-20 Light has come into the world, but *men loved darkness* instead of light because their deeds were evil. Everyone who does evil hates the light and will not come into the light *for fear that his deeds will be exposed*.
- VI) V6 God has shone in our hearts to give the light of the knowledge of the glory of
- VII) Without God's grace, we are helpless, walking and stumbling in darkness Eph 2:1-3 As for you, you were dead in your transgressions and sins, in which you used to live when you followed the ways of this world and of the ruler of the kingdom of the air, the spirit who is now at work in those who are disobedient. All of us also lived among them at one time, gratifying the cravings of our sinful nature and following its desires and thoughts. Like the rest, we were by nature objects of wrath.
- VIII) God Himself brings light into our lives through the illuminating gospel of Jesus In the beginning God made light to shine, and now shines in our hearts in rebirth
- IX) This is what Paul told the Ephesian church happened when they were saved Eph. 1:18 The eyes of your understanding being enlightened
- X) This treasure is stored in *earthen vessels* (clay pots--We are made out of dust) Earthen vessels are without value, which contrasts God with man

- I) The means the excellence is the *power of God,* not of *the vessels* He uses It is what is contained in the vessel, not the vessel itself
- II) I once asked my wife about the value of perfumes
 I asked if the shape of the container added to its value
- III) She told me it isn't the shape of the bottle alone, nor the scent itself
 She told me what makes the perfume valuable is the Maker of the perfume
 V5 FOR THIS REASON
- IV) We do not preach ourselves but Christ Jesus the Lord and ourselves your servants
 V5 His critics had said he was preaching himself
- V) In response he said he was not trying to become some great one in their sight THE FACT IS
- VI) Jesus had taught His men not to seek honor from men
 Mt 23:11 He who is greatest among you shall be your servant
 Mk 9:35 If anyone wants to be first, he must be the last of all and the servant of all
- VII) As Christians, it is to be our desire to be usable vessels in the hands of the Lord Paul made it clear that he was only a servant, and that Jesus was the greatest
- VIII) This is something Paul had earlier made clear to the Corinthians

 They were already arguing about who was great: Apollos Paul Cephas

 1 Co 3:5-6 Who then is Paul, and who is Apollos, but ministers through whom you believed, as the Lord gave to each one? I planted, Apollos watered, but God gave the increase.
- IX) V5 Paul made it clear that he was a servant, preaching Jesus and not himself HE SPOKE OF VESSELS OF HONOR
- X) He now answers the question: How can we become vessels used by God What is the process God uses to produce vessels of honor

THE ANSWER

- XI) Through the process of spiritual trials in the life of a believer BEGIN STUDY
- XII) V8-10 We are hard pressed on every side, yet not crushed; we are perplexed, but Trials are part of God's process of refining and maturing our faith They are a necessary element of God training us in the way of holy service

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- I) Sometimes, when we are in a trial we can lash out at anyone trying to encourage us To minister to them, he refers to the *trials* he himself had gone through
- II) This should encourage them, but also serve to remind them of his ministry
- III) His credentials have been called in to question, so he speaks of his trials
 This should establish his spiritual authority in contrast to the false teachers
- IV) Trials of faith are a very important part of walk with the Lord God's purpose in bringing them into our lives is to develop and purify our faith
- V) Our afflictions work to awaken us to what we may not be aware of C. S. Lewis: God whispers to us in our pleasures, speaks in our conscience, but shouts in our pains: it is his megaphone to rouse a deaf world.
- VI) Paul suffered many afflictions but knew that his faith was being purified
- VII) This was something that Job taught us
 Job 23:10-12 But he knows the way that I take: when he has tried me, I shall come
 forth as gold. My foot has held his steps, his way have I kept, and not declined. Neither
 have I gone back from the commandment of his lips; I have esteemed the words of his
 mouth more than my necessary food.
- VIII) Trials are a very important part of being a follower of Jesus Christ
 One of the things that trials, and afflictions reveal is the reality of someone's faith
 1 Pe 1:6-7 In this you greatly rejoice, though now for a little while, if need be, you
 have been grieved by various trials, that the genuineness of your faith, being much more
 precious than gold that perishes, though it is tested by fire, may be found to praise,
 honor, and glory at the revelation of Jesus Christ
- IX) Paul's ministry is being questioned so in answer to this, he speaks of his afflictions
 This serves to remind them of his sacrifices in contrast with false teachers
 HE PAYS A PRICE
- X) Quote: You may readily judge whether you are a child of God or a hypocrite by seeing in what direction your soul turns in seasons of severe trial. The hypocrite runs to the world and finds a sort of comfort there. But the child of God runs to his Father and expects consolation only from the Lord's hand.

- V8 We are hard-pressed on every side, yet not crushed; we are perplexed Paul reveals some of his pain, though he runs the risk of being misunderstood He begins by revealing the inner pressure that he is enduring INTERNAL CONFLICT
- II) To illustrate this, he uses the image of a soldier in combat

 Hard pressed: Troubled: afflicted, distressed; no place of escape
 Yet not crushed: To be in a narrow place; cramped

 THOUGHT
- III) I am under spiritual attack and hemmed in, but I am not giving up

 Ps 68:20 Our God is a God of deliverance; the Lord God is our rescuer from death
- IV) Perplexed: Without resources, to be left lacking, not to know which way to turn But not in despair: At loss, utterly destitute of resources; to renounce all hope Is 41:10 Do not fear, for I am with you; Do not be afraid, for I am your God. I will strengthen you, I will also help you, I will also uphold you with My righteous right hand.

 EXTERNAL CONFLICT
- V) **Persecuted**: (pursued) To put to flight, drive away; to pursue in a hostile manner From almost the beginning, Paul was persecuted when he began preaching **EXAMPLES**
- VI) Shortly after his conversion, he preached to Jews living in Damascus, Syria Ac 9:29 (The result) they attempted to kill him

Ac 13:50 (Pisidian Antioch-Turkey) The Jews incited the devout women of prominence and the leading men of the city, and instigated a persecution against Paul and Barnabas, and drove them out of their district

Ac 14:5 (In Iconium-Galatia) a *violent attempt* was made by both the Gentiles and Jews, with their rulers to abuse and stone them

- VII) Paul had gone through much persecution by the time he came to Corinth
 He had ministered in Thessalonica and had to be sent out by night (Ac 17:10)
 He went to Athens, and then came to Corinth
- VIII) At first he was afraid to continue ministering because of opposition It was at that time that Jesus told him to remain, and to preach Ac 18:9-10 The Lord spoke to Paul in the night by a vision, Do not be afraid but speak, and do not keep silent; for I am with you, and no one will attack you to hurt you; for I have many people in this city

He was persecuted, but not forsaken: Abandoned, deserted (Heb 13:5)

- I) He knew persecution, and this should have earned their respect
- II) Struck down: To throw to the ground
 But not destroyed: To put out of the way entirely, to ruin; render useless

 ANOTHER EXAMPLE
- III) In a city called Lystra (Turkey), Paul was used to miraculously heal a crippled man What an amazing thing, worthy of awe and a holy fear

 WHAT WAS THE RESULT
- IV) Ac 14:19-20 Then some Jews came from Antioch and Iconium and won the crowd over. They stoned Paul and dragged him outside the city, thinking he was dead. But after the disciples had gathered around him he got up and went back into the city
- V) This was Paul's life: sharing the gospel and often, suffering for doing so
- VI) V10 Always carrying about In the body the dying of the Lord Jesus
 He never forgot that Jesus died for him, which fueled his service to Him
- VII) This gave him the strength to serve Him, even though suffering as he did so
 Col 1:24 Now I rejoice in what I am suffering for you, and I fill up in my flesh what
 is still lacking in regard to Christ's afflictions for the sake of His body which is the church
- VIII) The afflictions he endured made Paul aware of the price Jesus paid on the cross
 This made him aware of his need to die to self so Jesus could be seen in him
 He surrendered his personal desires and ambitions in order to live for Jesus
 THE FACT IS
- IX) God uses trials in our lives to refine our faith and produce dependence on Him Paul died *to self* daily, which revealed that he was only an earthen vessel
- X) V10 Paul carried about in his body the death of Jesus
 This is a way of saying that he was enduring suffering for a lost world
- XI) He was experiencing the sorrow and rejection Jesus had experienced Phil. 3:10 I want to know Christ and the power of his resurrection and the fellowship of sharing in his sufferings, becoming like him in his death
- XII) V10 That the life of Jesus also may be manifested in our mortal flesh

 We are transformed by God's power so that we can display Jesus (Jn 12:24)

- V11 For we who live are always delivered to death for Jesus' sake that the life of Interesting: We who live are always delivered (exposed) to death We live in the atmosphere of impending death
- II) My response to this is to continue serving Jesus

 This is because I had the desire to remain faithful to Him, no matter what

 Lu 9:23 Jesus said to all of them, "If anyone wants to come after Me, he must
 deny himself and take up his cross daily and follow Me.
- III) We are constantly facing death, yet we also constantly see God deliver us

 The result of what we go through serves to strengthen us and make us dependent

 2 Co 12:9 He said to me, "My grace is sufficient for you, for my power is made
 perfect in weakness."
- IV) V11 that the life of Jesus also may be manifested in our mortal flesh God's power is revealed in us, freeing us from a life given over to the flesh
- V) V12 So then death is working *in us* but life *in you*You reap the fruit of my sufferings, and have life in Him because I died to my self
- VI) In the face of persecution, I brought the gospel to you, and you were saved Can the false apostles make such a claim?
- VII) V13 But since we have the same spirit of faith, according to what is written I He quotes Ps 116: A hymn of thanks for deliverance
- VIII) Paul had the same kind of faith the Psalmist had: He expected God to deliver him God's word brought comfort to him in the midst of all his suffering
- IX) V14 Knowing that He who raised up the Lord Jesus will also raise us up with Jesus Paul speaks by a faith that is fully convinced, having no doubt about being raised
- X) God raised Jesus from the dead, and He will also raise us up
 1 Co 6:14 God has both raised up the Lord, and will also raise up us by his own power
 Ro 8:11 But if the Spirit of Him who raised Jesus from the dead dwells in you, He who raised Christ from the dead will also give life to your mortal bodies through His
 Spirit who dwells in you.

- I) Though we endure afflictions, together we will one day be presented to God Eph 5:27 That He might present it to Himself a glorious church, not having spot, or wrinkle, or any such thing; but that it should be holy and without blemish.
- II) V15 For all things are for your sakes, that grace having spread through the many All the sufferings I have gone through are worth it if it results in your loving Jesus This is the heart of a father who truly loves his children
- III) V16-18 Therefore we do not lose heart. Even though our outward man is perishing
- IV) Paul closes by revealing that he has an eternal perspective concerning suffering He knew that his suffering was but a momentary and very light affliction
- V) We endure physical and emotional affliction, and it impacts us greatly How do we view these things? Do they tempt us to reject God?
- VI) We are not losing heart: Our inward (spiritual) man is renewing strength daily These afflictions remove our grip from the world, and make us long for Jesus In comparison to the eternal glory awaiting us, this is but a light problem
- VII) Our perspective is one that is **eternal**, and our treasures are found **in heaven**
- VIII) In the eyes of the world, Paul's life was a waste of talent and a horrible failure

 He gave up a promising career, embracing hardship, persecution and rejection

 WHY DID HE DO THIS
- IX) Paul had an eternal perspective because he knew the world was not his home One day he would see Jesus, face to face, and it would be worth it all Job 19:25-27 I know that my Redeemer lives, and that in the end He will stand upon the earth. And after my skin has been destroyed, yet in my flesh I will see God; I will see Him with my own eyes, I, and not another. How my heart yearns within me
- X) The product of all this affliction was what he called the eternal weight of glory The final result was to be like Jesus

Phil 3:20-21 For our citizenship is in heaven, from which we also eagerly wait for the Savior, the Lord Jesus Christ, who will transform our lowly body that it may be conformed to His glorious body, according to the working by which He is able even to subdue all things to Himself.

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This is what these trials will produce, and this is what the believer truly desires

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
