- I) V6-12 INTRO: Then the Pharisees went out and immediately plotted with the Herodians
- II) As we have seen, Jesus just performed a tremendous miracle
  He had healed a man suffering with atrophy in his right hand
- III) Even though Jesus was performing incredible works, the Pharisees remained opponents

It seems that each work that He did only created more antagonism

- IV) He healed a paralytic, cleansed a leper and healed a man with a withered hand All of these miracles could have softened even the most callused heart
- V) You would think that such a miracle would have touched even the hardest of hearts
- VI) Instead of joy over such a healing, the response was quite the opposite

  Lu 6:11 They were filled with rage and discussed with one another what
  they might do to Jesus
- VII) Their traditions and man-made regulations hardened them against Jesus
  As far as they could see, Jesus was a habitual offender
  He consistently violated their traditions concerning the Sabbath
- VIII) Mark has recorded how Jesus consistently performed works of mercy on the Sabbath

Ch 1:25 He cast out a demon on the Sabbath

Ch 2 He allowed His disciples to pluck heads of grain on the Sabbath

Ch 3 He healed a man with a paralyzed hand on the Sabbath

- IX) By now Jesus established a pattern of performing works of mercy on the Sabbath
- X) V6 The result was the Pharisees began to plan on how they might destroy Him A coalition of opposition now forms: The Pharisees plot with the Herodians
- XI) The Herodians were a political party that supported Rome

  They were not religious, and formed in order to support the dynasty of Herod the Great
- XII) Because they supported Herod, and by extension Rome, they were hated by the people

These two opposing groups became united in one mutual thing: hatred for Jesus

Ps 2:1-2 Why do the nations rage, and the people plot a vain thing? The kings of the earth set themselves, and the rulers take counsel together, against the LORD and against His Anointed

- XIII) The enemy of my enemy is my friend
- I) The Pharisees hated Jesus because He threatened their religious power The Herodians hated Him because He threatened their political power
- II) They now join together with the desire to destroy Jesus

  Mt 12:14-15 But the Pharisees went out and plotted how they might kill

  Jesus. Aware of this Jesus withdrew from that place. A large crowd followed Him and

  He healed all who were ill
- III) What was His reaction to their plotting to put an end to Him?
- IV) V7 But Jesus withdrew with His disciples to the sea. And a great multitude from Galilee

Jesus knew that His time had not yet arrived, so He went to the Sea of Galilee

- V) There simply was no need to unnecessarily antagonize
  Ps 109:3-4 They have also surrounded me with words of hatred and
  fought against me without a cause. In return for my love they are my accusers, but I
  give myself to prayer.
- VI) V7 He withdrew with His disciples to the sea
  In His ministry, Jesus had many that could be called disciples
  The word Disciples refers to learners; those who attach themselves to a teacher
- VII) Jesus had many followers, and they could, in general, be referred to as disciples
- VIII) Not all of them became life-long followers, as some were simply disciples in name only

They listened to what He said, and were curious about His miracles

IX) The difference between these people and genuine disciples was their commitment

Those who were committed to Him and His words were actual disciples
Jn 8:31 Then Jesus said to those Jews who believed Him If you abide in
My word, you are My disciples indeed

X) Not every one of them remained in His word, and were simply fair-weather followers

XI) An example of this is found in the sixth chapter of the gospel of John
Jn 6:2 A great multitude followed Him, because they saw His signs which He performed on those who were diseased

These people were drawn by His miracles, but not to His message

XII) John tells us a great multitude gathered, and Jesus saw that they were without food

There were 5,000 men (not including women and children) and Jesus fed them

- XIII) After feeding them, we are told that Jesus perceived they would try to make Him King
- I) This caused Him to leave the city of Tiberias, and go across the sea to Capernaum

When it was noted that He had gone, a great crowd followed Him to Capernaum

II) While speaking to them, Jesus made it clear that they followed Him for wrong reasons

He told them they sought Him not for His signs, but because He had fed them

III) He then told them that He is the Bread of Life and they must fully partake of Him

This is where the genuiness of their faith was revealed

- IV) After saying this, John lets us know how those listening responded

  Jn 6:66 From that time many of His disciples went back and walked with

  Him no more
- V) Not every listener is a learner and not every professor of faith is a possessor of faith

It is those who stand firm in Jesus to the end who are His genuine followers

VI) Not everyone who claims to be a Christian is actually a genuine believer

Those who remain faithful to Him no matter what demonstrate that they are

Lu 22:28 You are those who have stood by Me in My trials

- VII) It is from these disciples that Jesus will select His apostles
- VIII) V7-8 Jesus has withdrawn with His disciples to the sea And a great multitude from Galilee

- IX) People from all around began to hear of Jesus and began to follow Him Notice how Mark uses the words great multitude twice (V7, 8) to emphasize this
- X) This covers the nation of Israel from north to south and includes parts of Lebanon
- XI) V8 They heard how many things He was doing, (and) came to Him

  This is the secret of church growth: People hear of all He is doing

  They heard of His miracles and His message, and came to Him
- XII) V9-11 And He told His disciples that a small boat should be kept ready for Him because of

There were so many in need that they crowded Him, and could crush Him

XIII) This happened often

Mk 4:1 And again He began to teach by the sea. And a great multitude was gathered to Him, so that He got into a boat and sat in it on the sea; and the whole multitude was on the land facing the sea

XIV) How did He react to these great crowds that were showing up: He taught them I) V10 For He healed many so that as many as had afflictions pressed about Him to touch

He also healed them and delivered them of possession In the casting out of demons He was revealing that the kingdom of God was present

Lu 11:20 If I drive out demons by the finger of God, then the kingdom of God has come to you.

II) V11 And the unclean spirits whenever they saw Him, fell down before Him and cried out

Have you noticed how many demons were encountered by Jesus

- III) This gives us insight into the incredible number of demons at work

  They seem to be everywhere, and they are constantly being confronted by Jesus
- IV) Demons normally worked in secret, but were often unmasked by Jesus
  When in the presence of Jesus, they immediately were revealed
  They would cause the possessed individuals to fall down, and they would cry out
- V) V11 They said You are the Son of God!

They obviously knew who He was, even when human beings didn't

VI) V12 But He sternly warned them that they should not make Him known
He has already done this kind of thing
Mk 1:34b He...cast out many demons; and He did not allow the demons
to speak because they knew Him

- VII) He did not need the impure testimony of demons; His words and works spoke for Him
- VIII) V13-19 And He went up on the mountain and called to Him those He Himself wanted. And
- IX) Mark now introduces us to the apostles that Jesus appointed

  These men will become Apostles: they are taken out of the multitude of Disciples
- X) They will be the building blocks that Jesus used to build His church
  Eph 2:19-20 You are no longer strangers and foreigners, but fellow
  citizens with the saints and members of the household of God, having been built on
  the foundation of the apostles and prophets, Jesus Christ Himself being the chief
  cornerstone
- XI) The word apostle speaks of someone who has been sent on an errand, or with a message

The apostle is accountable to his Sender, and carries the authority of the Sender

XII) When Jesus was on earth He selected twelve men from the larger group of disciples

These men were given the responsibility of leading the church into the future

- I) Many people today wonder if the church still is led by apostles
- II) Are there modern-day apostles holding the same authority as the original apostles?

I will take a moment to answer this question

III) In scripture, there are certain qualifications that determined if you were an apostle

When Judas betrayed Jesus, there was a need to replace him
When deciding who to replace him the qualification of an apostle was
clearly stated

IV) First: He was to have walked with Jesus before He was crucified and

## resurrected

Ac 1:21-22 Therefore it is necessary to choose one of the men who have been with us the whole time the Lord Jesus was living among us, beginning from John's baptism to the time when Jesus was taken up from us. For one of these must become a witness with us of his resurrection."

- V) Second: He was to have been an eyewitness to Jesus after His resurrection 1 Co 9:1 (Paul said) Have I not seen Jesus our Lord
- VI) Third: He performed miracles

Ac 2:43 Then fear came upon every soul, and many wonders and signs were done through the apostles

2 Co 12:12 (Speaking of his own credentials) Truly the signs of an apostle were accomplished among you with all perseverance, in signs and wonders and mighty deeds

- VII) Fourth: He was inspired by the Spirit to write the scriptures 2 Pe 3:15-16 Bear in mind that our Lord's patience means salvation, just as our dear brother Paul also wrote you with the wisdom that God gave him. He writes the same way in all his letters, speaking in them of these matters. His letters contain some things that are hard to understand, which ignorant and unstable people distort, as they do the other Scriptures, to their own destruction.
- VIII) Fifth: An apostle was chosen by Jesus, through prayer and the Spirit
  Lu 6:12-13 Jesus went out to a mountainside to pray, and spent the
  night praying to God. When it was day, He called His disciples to Himself; and from
  them He chose twelve whom He also named apostles

Ac 9:15 (Concerning Paul) But the Lord said to him (Ananias) Go, for he is a chosen vessel of Mine to bear My name before Gentiles, kings, and the children of Israel

- IX) An apostle no longer exists today because none can meet these conditions
- X) As we look at them, I will highlight a few things about their calling as apostles
- In selecting these men Jesus was judging the religious leaders of Israel
  The Sadducees were infected with Greek philosophy and polluted faith
  The Pharisees were legalists who strained at gnats and swallowed
  camels
- II) These religious leaders were respected by many but were leading the people astray

Because of this, Jesus instituted a fresh leadership not polluted by these men

They were new wineskins that would hold the new wine of the Spirit,

- III) These men were unqualified to be Israel's shepherds
  In Mt 15:14 Jesus called them blind leaders of the blind
  Mt 23:27 Woe to you, scribes and Pharisees, hypocrites! For you are like
  whitewashed tombs which indeed appear beautiful outwardly, but inside are full of
  dead men's bones and all uncleanness
- IV) Israel's religious leaders needed to be replaced, and Jesus brought in new leaders

He first pursued these men, and then He called them to this ministry

V) He had been focusing His attention on the multitudes, but now He trains the new leaders

What do we glean from this calling?

- VI) V13 First: Their calling was the result of Jesus praying

  Lu 6:12 Jesus went out to a mountainside to pray, and spent the night praying to God. When it was day
- VII) Second: They did not strive to become leaders, they were chosen to be
  Mark said that Jesus called to Him those He Himself wanted
  Jn 15:16 You did not choose Me, but I chose you and appointed you that
  you should go and bear fruit, and that your fruit should remain, that whatever you ask
  the Father in My name He may give you.
- VIII) V14 Third: He appointed twelve that they might be with Him

  This would give them personal and first-hand knowledge of Him and His teachings

Ac 4:13 Now when they saw the boldness of Peter and John, and perceived that they were uneducated and untrained men, they marveled. And they realized that they had been with Jesus.

IX) Jesus mentored them in the ways of God, revealing Himself in clear ways to them

He did not entrust Himself to all men, but He did entrust Himself to these men

Lu 10: 23-24 Then He turned to His disciples and said privately, "Blessed are the eyes which see the things you see; for I tell you that many prophets and kings have desired to see what you see, and have not seen it, and to hear what you hear, and have not heard it."

- I) Fourth: He intended to equip them in order that He might send them
- II) These men were being trained to preach the message of redemption, to the whole world

The only plan the Lord has for reaching the world is for those who know Him to witness

Mt 28:19-20 Go therefore and make disciples of all nations, baptizing them in the name of the Father and of the Son and of the Holy Spirit, teaching them to observe all that I have commanded you. And behold, I am with you always, to the end of the age."

III) The responsibility of declaring this message moves us to share His love with others

Jesus equipped them with the message, and at Pentecost gave them the power

We have the same message, and we have the same power

- IV) V14-15 With this in mind, Mark tells us that He sent them out to preach
  They also were empowered to perform healings and to deliver the
  demonized
- V) They were sent out to preach and to have power to heal sicknesses and cast out demons

None of them were formally trained rabbis, but each one was specially prepared

They partook in the power of God's Kingdom and were used to heal and deliver

- VI) This is what Jesus was doing, and they would work alongside of Him
- VII) At this point we get an introduction to the men that Jesus chose Some of them we have already been introduced to, and others are now identified
- VIII) V16-20 Simon to whom He gave the name Peter; James the son of Zebedee and John the
- IX) Some of these names are very familiar to us
  Peter, James, John, Andrew, Philip, Matthew, Thomas, and Judas
  Iscariot
- X) Others are not: Bartholomew, James of Alphaeus, Thaddaeus, Simon the Cananite

Simon the Cananite is also known as Simon the Zealot

XI) He was an anti-Rome revolutionary, yet he worked alongside of Matthew

This by itself reveals the power of Jesus and His ability to bring such
people together

- XII) Simon Peter always heads the list, and Judas always ends it
  Notice how Judas is referred to as the one who betrayed Him
- XIII) V17 refers to James and John as Sons of Thunder

  There is more than one way to look at this nickname

  Some believe that the name speaks of them speaking for God
- I) A son of Thunder could be another way of speaking of God's voice, like thunder

Job 40:9 Do you have an arm like God and can you thunder with a voice like His?

2 Sa 22:14 The Lord thundered from heaven and the Most High uttered His voice

- II) Sons of Thunder more likely speaks of the fact that they were extremely passionate!
- III) Their love for and loyalty to Jesus motivated them to service to and defense of Him

Lu 9:51-56 It came to pass, when the time had come for Him to be received up, that He steadfastly set His face to go to Jerusalem and sent messengers before His face. And as they went, they entered a village of the Samaritans, to prepare for Him. But they did not receive Him because His face was set for the journey to Jerusalem. And when His disciples James and John saw this, they said, "Lord, do You want us to command fire to come down from heaven and consume them, just as Elijah did?" But He turned and rebuked them, and said, "You do not know what manner of spirit you are of. For the Son of Man did not come to destroy men's lives but to save them." And they went to another village.

IV) Briefly: Though their reaction was extreme, it gives us insight into the men God uses

These men had a passion and intensity for Jesus that needed to be directed properly

V) As you read scripture, you will discover that this zeal was part of every great believer

Moses saw injustice and rose in opposition to it, defending one of his fellow Israelites

- VI) Stephen the martyr made mention of this, and supplied the reason behind it

  Ac 7:24-25 And seeing one of them suffer wrong, he defended him, and avenged him that was oppressed, and smote the Egyptian: for he supposed his brethren would have understood how that God by his hand would deliver them: but they understood not
- VII) David was a mighty warrior, used by God to lead the nation

When he heard Goliath taunt the Jews, his indignation boiled over 1 Sa 17:26 David asked the men standing near him, "What will be done for the man who kills this Philistine and removes this disgrace from Israel? Who is this uncircumcised Philistine that he should defy the armies of the living God?"

Ps 144:1 Praise be to the LORD my Rock, who trains my hands for war, my fingers for battle.

VIII) Elijah: You are the troubler of Israel!

Nehemiah: slapped people and pulled their beards

Simon was a Zealot, a member of the Zealots, a political movement in 1stcentury, Second Temple Judaism which sought to incite the people of Judea to rebel against the Romans and expel them from Israel by force of arms

- I) Peter: Cut off Malchus' ear his attempt to defend and protect Jesus Paul spoke to the High Priest and told him: God will smite you!
- II) Jesus revealed indignation in His first cleansing of the temple (Jn 2:13-17)
  When He did this, His disciples remembered a scripture in the psalms
  Ps 69:9 zeal for your house consumes me...
- III) God isn't looking for angry, macho men but for determined and disciplined men of God

There is a proper time for letting our thoughts be known Eccl 3:7b (There is) a time to be silent and a time to speak

IV) Without spending too much time on this, it is time for the church to speak up

Without giving a political speech allow me to speak as a sentry

V) We have gone through much pain as a country and as a state
We have gone through the worst lockdown of any state
Thousands of businesses have closed down, jobs lost and people
are leaving California

We have the second highest unemployment in the nation We have had an incredible spike in crime, with thousands of criminals released

We have a crisis of homelessness

dams

We have the highest taxes in the nation (40-50% higher than other states)

We have the second highest prices for gasoline Our forests have been mismanaged, wildfires are out of control We are going through droughts and blackouts, with no plans for Schools have been closed and there have been moves to involuntarily mask children

Mandatory vaccines have cost people jobs

VI) As for our national government, we have failed our American citizens and allies

Marie and I have voted and I encourage you to do the same We live in a country where we can vote, so I say: let's vote the poor leaders out

- VII) What made it possible for such different personalities to be united

  They loved Jesus and put aside their prejudices and opinions and learned from Him
- VIII) The Pharisees united with the Herodians through hate for Jesus and a rejection of Him

These men united through a love for Jesus and a reception of Him Mt 11:28-30 Come to Me, all you who labor and are heavy laden, and I will give you rest. Take My yoke upon you and learn from Me, for I am gentle and lowly in heart, and you will find rest for your souls. For My yoke is easy and My burden is light."
