Galatians - The Start Of The Problem Genesis 3:15 – Two Teams: God and Satan • Team Satan, led by Satan is always trying to <u>derail</u> the plan and purpose of God and His people. • Actions are hostile to God's faith line.

• False teachings.

• They may not know they are on this team.

• Team God (Jesus) is today those members of the Body of Christ that seek to do His will and make Him known. • Sometime these act like they are on the other team.

Galatia

Around 278 BC, Europeans migrated to a specific area of Asia Minor in modern-day Turkey.
The Romans conquered Galatia in 189 BC but

allowed them to have limited autonomy.In 25 BC, it became a province of Rome and the mixture of 'outside' peoples increased.

•There was a wide mixture of ethnic heritage(s) and a wide mixture of religious beliefs.

Overview Of Galatians • Paul visited the area c. 45AD; rife with pagan philosophy:

- Greek & Roman Mythology
- Other pagan religions
- Paul shared the Gospel = salvations & church plants.
- After Paul's visit, the Judaizers opposed this & were
- persecuting the believers & seeking to discredit Paul.
- •They were promoting Law keeping to earn
- righteousness. False teaching affected many!

Overview Of Galatians

• Paul heard about this & wrote this Letter c. 48-53AD.

- It's a very to-the-point, very serious letter. Grace alone by faith alone in Christ alone!
- You cannot mix Law & Gospel.
- You cannot add anything to the work of Christ.
- Addition to truth is heresy: Deut. 18:15, 13:1-5, John 1:21.
- Paul addresses this issue in many of his Letters.
- •This helps us understand later writings by Paul.

Galatians Overview

Paul had preached the gospel in Galatia previously (4:13), and the Galatians had received his gospel despite his physical weakness (4:13-14). Yet now some Jewish believers (6:12) entered the church and were preaching sanctification through the Law (3:1), particularly circumcision (5:11-12), and the Galatians were following them (1:6), even coming to the point of being upset at Paul (4:16) for preaching his gospel, which now they believed he did because he wanted to please men (1:10). Thus. Paul writes to defend himself (and his gospel) and attack the antagonist (false teachers) and their error.
