

The Parable of the Tenants – Passion Parable Week

Wicked Tenants and God's Judgment

Parable of the Vineyard Tenants

The tenants repeatedly mistreat and kill the servants sent to collect the harvest, and ultimately kill the landowner's son. Pastor Keith explains that Jesus is telling this story to the chief priests and Pharisees, who react with outrage at the tenants' behavior. When Jesus asks what the landowner should do, they suggest destroying the wicked tenants and leasing the vineyard to others who will pay the rent. Pastor Keith notes that this response shows the listeners understood the parable's implications up to that point.

Parable of the Vineyard and God's Mercy

Pastor Keith discussed the parable of the vineyard, emphasizing the role of the tenants and the landowner. He highlighted the tenants' failure to produce fruit and their subsequent rejection of the landowner's son, who was sent to the vineyard.
