INTRODUCTION

As we come to the last psalm of the Psalter and of this study, we experience something like a grand finale, with clashing cymbals, blaring trumpets, and shimmering tambourines—a festival of sorts. One might expect a display of fireworks at the end. If the psalmist has only one thing to say at the close of this collection of poems, prayers, and songs, Psalm 150 is it. The psalmist concludes that our life is meant for praise. All of creation was designed to join in unison to praise God, revealing his glory as seen in his mighty deeds and his excellent greatness. When we praise God, we become the outward expression of his glory. Joy is the outcome of our life of praise and the expression of our lives. Hallelujah! Praise the Lord.

ENCOUNTER THE WORD

Read Psalm 150.

- 2. According to verse 2, what are the two main things for which we praise God? What are some things that fall under these two categories, as expressed in Psalm 103?
- 3. How should we praise God, according to verses 3–5? What strikes you about these verses?
- 4. Who is called to praise the Lord in verse 6? Based on our study, what/ who else might this include besides people? (See also Psalm 148:7–10; 103:20–22.)
