

THE PROBLEM

- Nationwide, there are over 670,000 children in foster care.
- The median age that a child enters foster care is 6 years old.
- In Alabama, 9175 children were served by the foster care system in 2020..
- Children can enter the system right after birth if they are born with drugs in their system.
- Most children come to the attention of DHR due to abuse, neglect, or mistreatment. The large majority have been abused by parents or a family member.
- Alabama is 5% above the national average in grandparents raising their grandchildren, with about 35% of grandparents actively raising one ore more grandkids.
- Every year, hundreds of children age out of the foster care system in Alabama, which means that they turn 18 and reach adulthood without a parent or guardian to guide them. Nationwide, this happens to over 23,000 children per year.
- Jackson County is in the top three counties in Alabama in terms of the number of foster homes. However, most homes stay full.
- While may individuals finish the certification process, over 50% quit fostering within the first year.

FOSTER CLOSET'S SOLUTION



We are the Shortt family. We are a foster family licensed in Jackson County. After many years of ignoring it, Doug and I answered the call to foster in February of 2018. We currently have 8 children ranging in age from 24 down to 2 years old. Our 4 youngest children are adopted out of foster care. Since we became licensed foster parents, we have welcomed 16 children into our home with some staying days and others staying forever.

As we have welcomed new children into our home, we have seen that they usually don't come with any of the basic necessities. Immediately we have to start gathering the items they need. Usually a new placement means a hefty trip to Wal-Mart for all the odds and ends that are required to care for our new little love.

More recently, we have been blessed to be able to reach out to the Fostering Love Community Closet for help with the material needs. They have everything from diapers and bottles to Halloween costumes, holiday clothes, and toys. If we need it, they probably have it. The ladies have spent endless hours and have everything organized and easy to access and they love for us to use it. This fall I got some nice name brand church clothes and some athletic pants for our three little boys. I also found several items that I will be using as Christmas gifts for the children. We consider it a privilege to be able to use the foster closet to help meet the material needs of our children. I try to encourage every foster parent I meet to check it out.

Foster care life is not easy. Within one year of being licensed half of all foster homes close. Foster parents need emotional support from others who have chosen to walk this path. We need our village of like minded people to hear us and encourage us. Doug and I have found that support through our monthly Foster and Adoptive Parent meetings at Agape Baptist Church. Our monthly meetings keep us in touch with other foster parents. We eat together and laugh together. We share each others' burdens and cheer each other on. Our children play together and get to be with other children whose lives are also touched by foster care. The church has been gracious enough to allow us to use their facilities for our meetings. More foster families have been coming since we started meeting at Agape.

In my opinion, there are two major needs that foster families have. The first is more of a physical need for material items for the children that are in their care. The second and probably even more important need is emotional support. I know personally we would not have made it almost 6 years if we didn't have our Lord, our foster parent friends, and the many prayers lifted on our behalf. Agape Baptist Church is helping to meet those needs. The church as a whole truly has a heart for foster children and the families that take them in. We saw that the first time we stepped in the door. They are following God's example and walking in love.

Fostering Love Community Closet currently serves approximately 5-10 families per week. That number has been steadily increasing.

On average, each individual aided by Foster Care Closet receives anywhere from 5-10 outfits. At this time, we do not put a limit on the amount of clothing they receive. They may also receive shoes, diapers, formula, baby equipment, bedding, school supplies, etc.


WHO WE ARE








CLOTHING

EMOTIONAL SUPPORT




COMMUNITY
