Sin Defiles, but God Will Purify It

Why is this better called a "purification offering?"

The different foci of Leviticus 4-5:13 and Leviticus 12-15.

4-5:13 – these actions are sinful and need forgiveness and cleansing 12-15 – these actions are not sinful and do not need forgiveness, but they still need cleansing

Inadvertent sin

Unknown sin Rationalized sin Sins of human weakness Guilt is an objective reality, not a subjective feeling

Symbolism in the sanctuary

"The horns represented the powerful force of the entire altar... To put blood on the horns was the most obvious way to purify the entire area in which the altar was centered." – Allen Ross

Blood before the veil

Making a way

The purification offering shows us that the sanctuary must not be defiled by human sin.

God's ultimate sanctuary (new heavens, new earth) will also be perfectly purified and holy.

Sin Spreads, but God Will Stop It

The significance of leadership

This passage is structured around **who** sins

4:3 – if the anointed priest sins	a bull is required
4:13 – if the whole congregation sins	a bull is required
4:22 – when a leader sins	a male goat is required

- 4:27 if anyone of the common people sins
- a female goat or lamb

Sin spreads through bad leadership

Sin spreads through lack of awareness

Implied in the idea of inadvertent sin is the fact that they at some point became aware of it

Sanctification - a present and ongoing reality

We are cleansed by Christ We are being cleansed by Christ
