What is one thing your father, or a father figure in your life, did that made you feel genuinely loved and secure?

Questions

1. The pastor described God's relationship with Israel as being like a husband whose wife repeatedly cheats on Him, yet He keeps loving her. How does that image change or deepen the way you think about God's love for you personally?

2. Many Christians are taught that God has abandoned Israel and that the Church has replaced her. How does the message of Hosea challenge that idea, and why does it matter for how we understand God's character.

3. Hosea 3:4-5 describes a long period where Israel would be without a King, a Temple, or true worship, but also without pagan, Canaanite idolatry and altars. How do you see that prophecy being fulfilled in the world today, and what does it stir in you?

4. The sermon made the point that God loves Israel not because Israel deserves it, but because He freely chooses to love. How does that kind of love differ from how love is typically understood in our culture?

5. The pastor warned that as believers we can cheat on Christ by giving our hearts to other things. What are some modern-day examples of things that can take our devotion away from Jesus?

6. Hosea chapter 14 says that whoever is wise will understand these things and that the righteous will walk in God's ways. Why do you think the pastor connected knowing Bible prophecy with living faithfully for Christ right now?

7. The sermon mentioned that God's disciplinary judgment can fall on churches and nations when His people are unfaithful and sin. How should that reality shape the way we pray for our church and our country?

8. The pastor closed by asking whether anyone in the room needs to return to Jesus. What does returning to Jesus look like practically in a person's daily life, and what might be holding someone back from doing that?

Life Application

This week, take 15 to 20 minutes to read Hosea chapter 3 on your own. As you read, write down one specific area of your life where you have allowed something else to take the place of your devotion to Christ. Then write a short prayer of commitment, telling Jesus that you are choosing to return your full devotion to Him. If you feel comfortable, share what you wrote with a trusted friend or your small group next time you meet.

God has not abandoned Israel. His glorious plan for the nation is still coming, driven by His unconditional love and His commitment to fulfill the promises He made to Abraham, Isaac, and Jacob.

Hosea chapter 3 is one of the most important prophecies in the Old Testament, revealing that after a long period of separation, Israel will return and seek the Lord and the Messiah, Jesus Christ, in the last days.

The reason God pursues Israel, and His church, is not because either deserves it, but because He freely chooses to love. This is the foundational character of God revealed throughout the 12 minor prophets.

Just as God will not abandon Israel, Jesus will never stop loving or give up on His church.

Knowing Bible prophecy and living with the coming kingdom in mind is not optional for a wise believer. It is what keeps us faithful, devoted to Christ alone, and ready to be rewarded when He returns.
