Imposition of Ashes



Ash Wednesday begins the season of Lent. We will spend the coming days journeying with Jesus toward the cross; toward the death that ultimately brings resurrection life.

We come together to acknowledge our sin and our mortality. We come to glimpse the Christ who offers forgiveness and everlasting life.

As part of tonight's worship, the imposition of ashes will be offered. Ashes have been used in Christian churches to mark the beginning of Lent since at least the 10th Century, and ashes are mentioned in scripture as a symbol of purification and repentance.

We offer ashes as a physical reminder of our human brokenness and as an assurance of God's forgiveness and salvation. We gather in the darkness of our souls to be with the God who brightens the shadows of our lives.
