The Good News: "The Son of God is Alive" I Corinthians 15:1-11

I. The gospel must be <u>preached</u>. (vs 1-2)

- 1. The gospel message must be preached to <u>all people</u>. (vs 1) Romans 10:12-15
- 2. The gospel must be received by those who hear. (vs 2)
- 3. The gospel message is to be <u>believed</u> and <u>practiced</u>. (vs 2)

II. The gospel message must be <u>clear.</u> (vs 2-4)

- 1. Jesus died for our sins. (vs 3)
- 2. Jesus was buried. (vs 4)
- 3. Jesus was raised on the third day. (vs 4) Romans 1:4
- 4. Jesus' death and resurrection was a promise from the Old Testament. (vs 3)
- 5. Jesus showed himself in his resurrected body. (vs 5) Acts 1:3

III. The gospel was heard, received, and lived out. (vs. 5-11)

I Corinthians 15:14; I Corinthians 15:20-22; Acts 4:12

LET'S GO DEEPER:

- 1. Read Acts 2, Peter's account of the gospel on Pentecost, and see how many of the 5 elements of the gospel of salvation in I Cor 15:1-8 you can identify. Discuss the importance of them.
- 2. I Cor 15:1-2 describe the way in which the Corinthian believers became Christians. The steps in the process are described. Can you identify them? What relevance do they have to our evangelism?
- 3. What difference should the assurance of our Savior's resurrection and the promise of ours have upon our serving Him?
- 4. Read Philippians 2:5-11. Using this passage, discuss what the contrasts and similarities are in I Corinthians 15:1-11.
- 5. How does believing you are living in the last phase of human history help your understanding of Jesus and his risen life?
