- 4. What can we learn from the Pharaoh's anxiety-driven decision-making, and how might this relate to our own tendencies to create worst-case scenarios?
- 5. How does the preservation of Shipra and Pua's names, while the Pharaoh remains unnamed, reflect God's values and priorities?
- 6. In what ways does the oppression of the Israelites in Egypt parallel modern-day situations, and how should believers respond to similar injustices?

- 7. How does the concept of God's law as an 'MRI' for sin, and Jesus as the 'surgeon', help us understand the relationship between conviction and redemption?
- 8. What lessons can we draw from the patience required in God's plan for Israel, especially in a world that values instant gratification?
- 9. How does the story of Moses' birth and early life demonstrate God's ability to work through seemingly impossible circumstances?
- 10. In what ways does the Exodus narrative challenge our understanding of freedom, both in a physical and spiritual sense?
