

**5 Day Devotional**  
**February 1, 2026 AM Sermon**  
**“Building faith on truth Pt. 2”**

**Day 1: The Foundation of Truth**

**Reading:** Hebrews 1:1-4

**Devotional:** In a world drowning in opinions and shifting philosophies, God has given us unchanging truth through His Son. Jesus is not one voice among many—He is the final, complete revelation of God. The writer of Hebrews reminds us that while God spoke through prophets in various ways, He has now spoken definitively through Jesus, who is "the brightness of His glory and the expressed image of His person." Your faith must be anchored not in feelings, traditions, or religious performance, but in the person of Jesus Christ and the truth of Scripture. Today, ask yourself: Is my faith built on the solid rock of Christ, or am I trusting in something that will ultimately fail me?

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**Day 2: Jesus Is God**

**Reading:** John 1:1-14; Colossians 1:15-20

**Devotional:** Satan's primary strategy is to distort who Jesus really is. Many religions acknowledge Jesus but deny His deity, reducing Him to a good teacher or created being. Scripture is clear: Jesus is fully God. He is not merely reflecting God's glory like the moon reflects sunlight—He IS the glory. He is "the expressed image" of God's person. This truth matters eternally. A created being cannot save you from sin. Only God Himself could pay the infinite debt your sin created. When you worship Jesus, you worship God. When you trust Jesus, you trust God. When you hear Jesus' words, you hear God speaking. Don't settle for a diminished Jesus. Embrace the Christ of Scripture—fully God, fully worthy of your complete devotion.

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**Day 3: The Finished Work of Christ**

**Reading:** 1 Peter 3:18; Romans 6:8-11;  
Hebrews 10:10-14

**Devotional:** "When He had by Himself purged our sins, sat down at the right hand of the Majesty on high." Jesus sat down because His work was finished. Unlike Old Testament priests who stood daily offering sacrifices that could never truly remove sin, Jesus offered one sacrifice—Himself—once for all. You cannot add to what Christ has done. Your good works, church attendance, or religious performance cannot supplement His finished work. He died for the sins of the whole world, taking the punishment you deserved. Because He died once, salvation cannot be lost and regained repeatedly. Either you are saved and secure in Him, or you need to be saved today. Rest in this truth: what Jesus finished stays finished.

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**Day 4: Your Advocate Before the Father**

**Reading:** Romans 8:31-39; 1 John 2:1-2;  
Hebrews 7:23-25

**Devotional:** When you stumble, when you fail, when guilt threatens to overwhelm you—Jesus stands before the Father as your advocate. He "always lives to make intercession" for you. Satan whispers that you've gone too far, sinned too much, disappointed God beyond repair. But Jesus speaks louder, reminding the Father that you are covered by His blood, sealed by His Spirit, and held in His hand. You don't receive judgment; you receive correction wrapped in love. The same Jesus who saved you continues to defend you, pray for you, and present you as righteous before God. When you don't know how to pray, the Holy Spirit intercedes with groanings too deep for words. You are never alone, never abandoned, never without a defender.

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#### **Day 5: Loved in Spite of Yourself**

**Reading:** Ephesians 2:1-10; Romans 5:6-11

**Devotional:** You will never deserve God's love—and that's precisely the point. God didn't wait for you to clean up your life, get your act together, or prove yourself worthy. While you were still a sinner, Christ died for you. His love isn't based on your performance; it's based on His character. Religion says, "Do enough to earn God's approval." Jesus says, "It is finished—you are loved, forgiven, and accepted." This truth should transform how you view yourself and others. If God loves you in spite of your faults, you can extend that same grace to those around you. Stop trying to earn what has already been freely given. Rest in the unshakeable truth that Jesus loved you enough to die for you, and He loves you enough to never let you go.
