Key Takeaways:

1. Mary was "full of grace" - She embodied the grace that mothers show and carried the One who would bring grace to the world.
2. Being the Lord's servant means obedience - When God calls, we respond regardless of personal cost or convenience.
3. Mary recognized her need for a Savior - Her humility came from understanding she couldn't save herself, even as she carried the Savior.
4. God uses the lowly, not the lofty - He doesn't operate by the world's standards of power & influence.
5. True humility means exalting Christ - "He must increase, but I must decrease" (John 3:30).

Discussion Questions:

1. What do you think Luke wanted us to understand by introducing Mary as a "virgin" and from "the line of David" before even giving her name?
2. What does Mary's response in Luke 1:38, "I am the servant of the Lord" mean in practical terms?
3. How would Mary's life have been different after saying "yes" to God? What specific challenges would she have faced in her small town?
4. The sermon mentioned that "mothers rise to the occasion when things get difficult." Share a time when you witnessed this—either from your own mother or another mother figure.
5. Mary praised God (Luke 1:46-55) even though her life became "infinitely more difficult." What does this teach us about worship and circumstances?
6. Jason told the story of someone selling their house to follow God's call. Have you ever felt God calling you to something that seemed impossible or uncomfortable? How did you respond?
7. What's the difference between false humility & true humility? How did Mary demonstrate true humility?
8. Jason stated, "God uses the lowly, not the lofty." Why do you think God operates this way? What does this mean for how we view ourselves and our gifts?
9. How can we "exalt Christ" in our everyday conversations at work, school, or home without being preachy or inauthentic?
10. The quote "preach the gospel, die, and be forgotten" emphasizes making it about God, not ourselves. In what areas of your life do you struggle to decrease so He can increase?

Practical Applications:

1. Intentionally point back to God in at least one conversation. When someone compliments you, acknowledges your work, or notices something good in your life, redirect the credit to God.
 - a. Examples: "Thank you! God has really blessed me with this opportunity.", "I'm grateful God gave me the ability to help." "That's all God's faithfulness, not my own doing."
2. Honor Your Mother
 - a. If possible, call or visit your mom this week. Write down 3-5 specific moments you're grateful for with your mother. Thank God in prayer for those memories. If your relationship with your mother is difficult or she has passed, thank God for the mother figures He has placed in your life.
