

# John 16 Sermon Discussion Guide

## Passage Summary

Jesus continues preparing His disciples for what is about to come. The cross is near. Their world is about to feel as though it is falling apart. Everything familiar; their routines, their expectations, even their understanding of what the Messiah should do, is about to be shaken.

Jesus tells them plainly that hardship is coming. They will face opposition, confusion, and sorrow. There will be moments when it feels as though the world is winning and God is silent. The disciples are about to watch the One they love be arrested, humiliated, and crucified.

Yet Jesus is not speaking these things to frighten them, but to steady them. He tells them that His leaving is actually for their good because the Helper, the Holy Spirit, will come. What feels like loss will become the doorway to deeper nearness. The Spirit will convict the world of sin, point people to Christ, and guide believers into truth. The disciples will not be abandoned to navigate suffering alone.

Then Jesus gives them an image they can understand: childbirth. Labor is painful and overwhelming in the moment, but it gives way to joy when new life arrives. In the same way, their grief will not last forever. Sorrow is real, but it is not final.

Again and again, Jesus lifts their eyes beyond the immediate moment. He reminds them that the Father loves them. He reminds them that He has come from the Father and is returning to Him. And He reminds them that peace is not found in easy circumstances, but in Him.

The chapter closes with one of the most comforting and honest statements in all of Scripture: *“In this world you will have tribulation. But take heart; I have overcome the world.”* Jesus does not promise a trouble-free life. He promises His presence, His victory, and a hope stronger than suffering itself.

## **Theological Highlights**

- **Jesus prepares His people for suffering, not surprise**  
Hardship is not evidence that God has abandoned His people.
- **The Holy Spirit continues Christ’s work**  
The Spirit convicts, comforts, teaches, and reminds believers of what is true.
- **Christian sorrow is real, but temporary**  
The resurrection reframes suffering and gives hope in the middle of pain.
- **The Father loves His people deeply**  
Through Christ, believers are welcomed into relationship with the Father.
- **Jesus has already secured the victory**  
Christians live from Christ’s victory, not toward an uncertain outcome.

## **Reflection Questions**

### **Walking Through Suffering and Disappointment**

1. Jesus tells His disciples plainly that trouble will come.
  - How do you typically respond when life becomes difficult or disappointing?
  - Are there ways you subtly expect the Christian life to protect you from hardship?
2. Jesus prepares His disciples ahead of time because He loves them.
  - How does it change your perspective to know that suffering does not catch God off guard?

### **The Ministry of the Holy Spirit**

3. Jesus says it is actually good that He goes away so the Helper can come.
  - Why do you think the disciples would have struggled to believe that?
  - Why might we struggle to believe it ourselves?
4. In what ways have you experienced the Holy Spirit comforting, convicting, or guiding you?
5. Are there areas where you have become resistant or numb to the Spirit's work in your life?

### **Sorrow Turning to Joy**

6. Jesus compares grief to labor pains that eventually give way to joy.
  - Have you experienced a season where God brought unexpected growth or hope through pain?
7. What does it look like to hold sorrow and hope together at the same time?
8. Where are you tempted to believe that your current struggle is the end of the story?

### **Living in the Love of the Father**

9. Jesus says plainly, "*The Father himself loves you.*"
  - Is that easy or difficult for you to believe personally? Why?
10. What tends to shape your view of God more: your circumstances or the character of Jesus?

### **Peace in a Troubled World**

13. What do you think it means practically to "take heart" because Jesus has overcome the world?
14. How can the victory of Christ reshape the way you face fear, uncertainty, or discouragement?

## **Closing Prayer Points**

### **1. Trusting God in Suffering**

- Bring before the Lord areas of pain, confusion, or discouragement.
- Ask for endurance and faith in difficult seasons.
- Thank Him that suffering is never wasted in His hands.

## **2. Welcoming the Work of the Holy Spirit**

- Thank God for giving His Spirit to dwell within His people.
- Pray for hearts that are soft and responsive to His work.

## **3. Holding onto Hope**

- Ask God to remind you that sorrow does not have the final word.
- Pray for hope in places where you feel weary or overwhelmed.
- Thank Jesus that resurrection joy is coming.

## **4. Resting in the Father's Love**

- Thank the Father for loving you through Christ.
- Confess areas where fear or shame have distorted your view of Him.
- Ask for deeper assurance of your identity as His child.

## **5. Receiving the Peace of Christ**

- Bring your anxieties and fears honestly before God.
- Ask for the peace that Jesus promises in the midst of hardship.
- Pray for steady hearts anchored in Christ rather than circumstances.

## **6. Living with Courage**

- Ask God for courage to remain faithful in a difficult world.
- Pray for strength to follow Jesus even when it is costly.
- Thank Him that Christ has already overcome the world.
