Romans 8:18-25 For the week of March 19, 2023

Reflection

1.	What were some of the takeaways, for you, from Sunday's sermon?

2. Were there questions, comments, concerns...?

It is a wonderful thing to belong to God's family, to be "heirs of God and co-heirs with Christ" (v. 17). Paul might well have gone from this thought to the magnificent vista that it opens out before us, and so he does in due course. But he was not unmindful that our heavenly destiny does not blot out the fact of our earthly existence and that that earthly existence is in a troubled world. There is pain and misery in this world, and they are not confined to human existence. Paul recognizes that there is pain throughout creation, and he writes movingly about it: "here we have, as nowhere else in the Bible—perhaps nowhere in ancient literature—a man who feels with the pain of creation" (Gore). But for Paul the great thing is that this is not meaningless pain, and he could look forward with confidence to the final unfolding of the purpose of God. He is sure of this, despite the pains of the present.¹
