Paul's argument from Scripture is convincing. He shows that God is out to secure mercy, not condemnation. God is not unjustly condemning some, but in mercy saving some. We sinners have no claim on God whatever. If we are saved, that is due to God's mercy, not the justice of our cause.¹

Paul has made it clear that God does what he wills in both showing mercy and hardening (v. 18). But to human ways of thinking that presents some problems. Paul proceeds to look at them, and he advances his argument by showing that what God has done has been to extend his mercy to the Gentiles.²
