In this section Paul continues to address the Gentiles among his audience, explaining the mystery of God's dealings with Israel. He does so to prevent them from becoming conceited and thinking that God has chosen them instead of Israel. He reminds them that they were at one time as disobedient to God as the majority in Israel is now, and that just as they received mercy, so Israel will also experience God's mercy. ¹
