Father's Day – Gotta start with some bad-dad jokes... DUH!

Being a dad is a serious thing!

- Maybe this is why we need bad jokes like these!

I have a bunch for you today!

ALSO... for Father's Day, I will only be talking for about 5 minutes... JUST KIDDING!

Truthfully, there are just a few verses we will be springing out of today.

While is this is **technically**, **a "Father's Day" message**, there are certainly **applicable elements to this for all**, for sure.

Our verses are from Paul's first letter to the Corinthian church.

Paul writes to them to give those in Corinth further instruction, and because there are <u>significant problems</u> that are going on in the church

- There were <u>cultural things</u> that have become part of their worship service that needed to be corrected
- There were sin issues that needed to be corrected
- There were mindset issues that needed to be corrected

Part of the issue was how they viewed leadership

- They did not understand servant leadership (1 Cor. 3:5)
- They thought of the leader to be the end-all, be-all and minimized the work of God (1 Cor. 3:7)

They had an **immature understanding of wisdom** and needed **mentoring** and further instruction.

This is some of why Paul was writing:

- To correct wrongs
- To give direction
- To re-establish truths that were previously given

The people in Corinth, much like the church today, needed clarity and direction.

Paul takes time to correct some things and speaks strongly in the process.

The church in **Corinth had a strong anti-Jesus current** it was **swimming up against** and **some found it easier just to float** downstream with it, *rather than swim against the current.*

- Don't you find it easier that way too?
- It is much more fun to "go along" than to be "the one" who goes against the flow even if the flow is going in the wrong direction...

This was **certainly the case** for the church in Corinth...

They **needed God's wisdom** to know **how to walk the way of Jesus** in their culture.

They had many opinions, they needed wisdom...

This background helps us to understand more what Paul was teaching in this passage.

Let's read these few verses...

1 Cor. 4:14-16

¹⁴ I do not write these things to make you ashamed, but to admonish you as my beloved children. ¹⁵ For though you have countless guides in Christ, you do not have many fathers. For I became your father in Christ Jesus through the gospel. ¹⁶ I urge you, then, be imitators of me.

Paul's <u>strong talk</u> and <u>direct teaching</u> in this letter was needed, but it was <u>with the deepest kind of love</u> for them

- The love only a parent can give.
- He communicated to them as a "spiritual father."

The love of parents is absolutely critical in the raising of children.

Both mother and father.

I do not have the statistics for Corinth, back in the first century, but my guess it would be similar to our culture now...

Mothers are typically more avilable than fathers in being there for their kids.

Roughly 80% of single-parent families are mom-parented.

Of course there are great fathers out there, and many of them in this very room - but many have left their post

My prayer for us today is that the fathers in our church would not leave their post – or that they would come back to it if applicable and as the Lord leads.

Paul says here -

- You have all "guides"
 - Many who *give you their "two cents"* invited or not
 - o Those with many "opinions" on what you "should" do...
 - People can <u>blatantly tell you what to do</u> as well

BUT...

Where are the ones who will be there like a good father would be...

- Invested
- There through thick and thin?
- With wisdom for OTHER's benefit, even if it does not benefit them?
- Someone who will sacrifice time and resources as necessary?

I am **not usually a "statistics" guy** – I am a bit **skeptical** how people use them for their benefit or to just prove their point...

The **statistics on** *biological* <u>fatherlessness</u> however and *its affect* are similar across the board – and they are alarming...

Fatherlessness in our nation is a problem considered to be an epidemic by some.

Here are some of the results of this in our nation – (This is from nolongerfatherless.org...)

Results of kids growing up without a father -

- 85% of youths in **prison**
- 71% of high school dropouts
- 90% of all homeless and runaway children
- 60+% of **youth suicides** are from fatherless homes

I also read:

- Nearly 19 million children live without their biological father (about 1 in 4-5)

This is a lot... and there is actually more

Fathers, you are important.

Many of you know I myself grew up without a dad.

By God's grace and a great mom, I did not become any of the statistics we read about.

It also gave me a great desire and a God-fueled passion/calling to be the dad I never had.

Truly by God's grace, the Lord gave me a wonderful wife and together we have 4 amazing kids.

The term "Father" is a pretty loose term.

It ranges from:

- Simply one who is a biological father

- An <u>amazing mentor</u> and <u>perfect role model</u>
 - MOST of us dads are somewhere in between!

I will add that there are many who are "spiritual fathers" and have been a father-figure for many.

Fathers are greatly needed in our culture today.

1 Corinthians 4:15

¹⁵ For though you have countless guides in Christ, you do not have many fathers.

I realize this kind of message can feel very daunting.

The role of "father" can be weighty for sure.

- The *guilt and shame* of **not doing well** in the past
- The *accusations from others* (even from your own children) that can weigh you down
- The enemy has tried to keep you under a rock...

Time to GET OUT from UNDER that rock and BREAK FREE!

Time to receive forgiveness <u>from the past</u> and <u>direction</u> for your <u>future</u>!

Honor.

Honor is not a word use a lot these days.

There is **not much that is sacred** anymore...

Honor is something we *learn* to practice

Honor is *something we <u>choose</u>* to do

Honor is <u>not always easy</u>, but something we *put into*practice none-the-less.

If we are to live according to God's Word, honor is not optional.

The 5th commandment (of the 10) is

Exodus 20:12

12 "Honor your father and your mother, that your days may be long in the land that the Lord your God is giving you.

Paul chimes in like this

Ephesians 6:1-4

Children, obey your parents in the Lord, for this is right. ² "Honor your father and mother" (this is the first commandment with a promise), ³ "that it may go well with you and that you may live long in the land." ⁴ Fathers, do not provoke your children to anger, but bring them up in the discipline and instruction of the Lord.

Honor your father and mother...

Interesting fruit of this...

I believe...

Fathers who <u>honor</u> are much *more likely to be* <u>honorable.</u>

Fathers who honor God and live a life to honor God, will be honorable

This helping? How about we get really practical...

Where do we go from here?

<u>In a very practical way – Honorable Fathers are:</u>

- Present

- o There is intentional time given
- o They are available
- Sometimes just being there is all your child needs

- Intentional

- Love your wife first
- o Love your children too!

Romans 12:9-10

⁹ Let love be genuine. Abhor what is evil; hold fast to what is good. ¹⁰ Love one another with brotherly affection. Outdo one another in showing honor.

- **Consistent** (no time-stamp on this!)
 - o Being one your kids can count on.
 - There are exceptions to this (work, etc.) but there is a
 plan to be there
 - This is another way of saying you are <u>reliable</u>
 - This is so important for your children to trust you!

- Humble -

- Unlike God, who IS perfect, we are not!
- I have had to ask for my kid's forgiveness more than once!

Humility like Jesus.

Philippians 2:8

"Being found in human form, he humbled himself by becoming obedient to the point of death, even death on a cross"

Jesus, in His ministry, He was:

- Present
- Intentional
- Consistent
- Humble

There is **more** – but **I know first-hand how valuable** these are.

- In times you do not agree with your adult children, you <u>love</u>
 them anyway
- In times you feel like "they didn't listen last time" you are still there for them
- In times when they ask for help and you don't "feel like it" – pray and see if there is anything you are led to do.

We are told in Proverbs...

Proverbs 22:6

Train up a child in the way he should go; even when he is old he will not depart from it.

We **looked at some sad stats** from earlier about **children raised** without their biological father -

Now let's look at how we can **change these statistics** thru **MENTORING** – This is **certainly of fathering <u>biological</u>** and **spiritual** as well!

Here is some information from Mentor.org; these are **statistics** of at-risk youth who have had a mentor:

- 55% more likely to enroll in college
- 80% less likely to spend time in jail
- 75% less likely to experience teen pregnancy
- **78% more likely** to **volunteer** regularly
- 46% less likely to use drugs

- 81% more likely to participate in sports or extracurricular activities
- 90% of them are interested in becoming a mentor (a good father/mother) themselves...

GOOD NEWS... Fathers who are investing in their kids are on the rise

PRAY -

- **For fathers** (grab their hands, etc.)
- For more "fathers" here at CFC
- For us to **grow as a culture who honors fathers** and builds them up
