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BIG IDEA: Sin requires judgment.

Read Genesis 5:25-27

1. Methuselah's name means, "After him comes death." God let him be the oldest man in recorded history to be a living, breathing, warning to the world that judgment was coming. He is a sign that God is patient with sinners to repent before he finally acts. How did God show patience to save you? How can you can be patient with those around you who need Jesus?

Read Genesis 6:5-8

2. The scandal of this story is that God doesn't end all of us on the spot. That he doesn't just destroy us and the world. Yet he is patient with us and shows us grace. How does this impact our worship to Jesus and how we live?

Read Genesis 6:9

3. Noah was described as a righteous and blameless man who walked with God. Hebrews tells us he was righteous because of his faith. How are we counted righteous? How can you grow in walking with God?

Read Genesis 6:11-13

4. The world is filled with evil and God, as the righteous judge, must judge evil. No good judge allows murder, violence, perversion, to go unpunished and neither will God our judge. Which is why the gospel is such good news. How is God's righteous judgement of evil such good news for us?

Read Genesis 6:14

5. It takes Noah over 100 years to build the ark. Peter tells us in his letters that it took so long so people had time to repent. This tells us that God knows and cares about our suffering. He will end injustice in this world at the right time. How does that bring us comfort in this season?

Read Genesis 6:17-18

6. God tells Noah that sin requires judgment. And yet grace offers an ark of salvation. How does this whole scene of Noah and the ark point us to Jesus?
