Icebreaker: What are some of your favorite underdog stories?

Exodus 3:1-6

Moses is just doing his regular job of being a husband, son-in-law, father, and shepherd when God chose to speak to him. We are ordinary people, living ordinary lives, with Gospel intentionality.

- What are some ordinary things in our lives that we can leverage for Gospel intentionality?
- What is significant about how Moses responded to God?
 - *“When we understand the character of God, when we grasp something of His holiness, then we begin to understand the radical character of our sin and hopelessness. Helpless sinners can survive only by grace.” - R.C. Sproul*

Exodus 3:7-15

Moses was worried that he would be unable to accomplish what God was asking of him. Moses was also fearful because it would require him to face his past. God reminded Moses that He would be with him and of His past faithfulness as a way of growing Moses' faith for the future.

- At times, we all feel like underdogs, insufficient, and unable to do what God may be calling us to do. What problem does this fear reveal about our faith?
- What is important about how God responds to Moses in his fear?

Exodus 4:1-17

Moses comes up with more reasons why he shouldn't do what God has called Him and why he needs Aaron to help him. To continually complain about insufficiencies is to tell God that He is wrong.
