Palm Sunday Sermon: Repentance, Restoration, and Bearing Fruit

Discussion Questions:

- 4. Discuss the living parable of the fig tree. How does this story relate to our lives as followers of Christ?
- 5. Jesus encourages his disciples to have audacious faith. What "mountain-moving" prayers have you been hesitant to ask God? How can we cultivate this kind of faith?
- 6. The sermon compares forgiveness to oxygen for our souls. How have you experienced the freedom that comes from forgiving others? What makes forgiveness challenging?
- 7. How can we assess whether our lives are bearing the fruit God desires? What does this fruit look like in practical terms?

Practical Applications:

- 1. This week, take time to examine your life for areas where repentance is needed. Pray for God's guidance in this process.
- 2. Identify one "mountain" in your life or community that seems impossible to move. Commit to praying boldly about this situation for the next month.
- 3. If you're holding onto unforgiveness, take steps to release it. This might involve journaling, talking with a trusted friend, or seeking counseling if needed.
- 4. Create a "fruit inventory" of your life. List the ways you see God's work manifesting in your actions, attitudes, and relationships. Also note areas where you'd like to see more growth.
- 5. As a group, brainstorm ways you can address injustice in your local community. Choose one actionable step to implement in the coming weeks.
- 6. Spend time in prayer, asking God to deepen your connection to Him as the true vine. Be open to His pruning work in your life to increase fruitfulness.
