


OBJECTIVES

3 Arguments As Objective Evidence For God

1) Cosmological Argument

Premise 1 - The Universe Had A Beginning

Premise 2 - Anything That Had A Beginning Must Have Been Caused By Something Else

Conclusion – Therefore The Universe Was Caused By Something Else, Which We Call GOD

Personal, Timeless, Spaceless, Immaterial, Powerful

QUESTION: What Caused God?

The Uncaused First Cause



PART 1 - Conversations About God Question Two

How can a Good God allow evil and suffering?

A Perceived contradiction in the faith

"Yeah, like I don't understand why He doesn't just stop bad guys before they do bad stuff. Why wouldn't He just want good things to happen?"

1) Defining the Problem of Evil

The Heart of the Issue is:

If God is All-Good, He Would eliminate evil

If God is All-Powerful, He Could eliminate evil

But Evil Exists

How then can the Existence of Evil be reconciled with the Existence of God?

Christians Like to Refer to Genesis 3:17-19 However

- People who raise it do not believe
- It is an emotional one

- 1) Defining the Problem of Evil

An Argument for Evil and Its Origins

- 1. God Created Everything
- 2. Evil is Something

Conclusion: Therefore God Created Evil

The Problem with this is Premise 2 - An Assumption

Evil is a Corruption of a Good thing

- Rot on a Tree
- Rust on a Car

1. Human Corruption

Free Will - Not Robots We Can Choose our Own Path

God Wants Us To Freely Love Him. A Love Forced Is No Love at All

2. God Can Do Anything? But Is This True?

- He Cannot Lie
- He Cannot Do Something Contradictory

God can't force us to freely make good choices; He would have to destroy our freedom so He could destroy evil.

The Most Difficult Evil That Is Addressed

Natural Evil is a By-Product of Good Process

Tough to Answer

Doesn't Mean there are No Answers

Moral and Natural evil can both be viewed as a by-product of God's perfectly good creation.

- The Old Testament Recounts the Conquest of Canaan
- Sceptics Argue: God Immoral for Ordering the Genocide of the Canaanites.
- THE ARGUMENT
 - If a Good God Exists, He wouldn't Order Something Immoral like Genocide
 - Therefore, God Doesn't Exist

1) An Execution of God's Judgment

- God Promised Abraham
- 2. Canaanites Inhabited the Land
- 3. They were Depraved
- 4. God Knew Canaanite Influence on Israel

- 1) An Execution of God's Judgment
- 2) Command Genocide Immoral?

- The Horrendous Imagery of Genocide
- 2. God Authority is Perfect And Absolute
- 3. This is an Execution of Judgment

- How Can a Loving God Send People to Hell?
- Question More Complex
 - Why Does Good Need To Punish Anyone?
 - Who Should Be Punished?
 - What Should The Nature Of Punishment Be?

1) Why Does Good Need To Punish Anyone? Common Objection: "I believe in Jesus and all He taught, But I can't believe in hell. I think of how much I adore my own kids, and no matter what they did, I would never want them to be severely punished. God must love us even more than that, so how could He create hell?"

Two Big Problems

- The Problem of Sin
- God is Both Loving and Just

- God's Moral Code (First Question for the Existence of God)
- Transgression of God's Laws
- Expect Punishment for Breaking God's Laws
- Must Be a Penalty For Sin
