The goal: <u>CLEARLY</u> <u>ARTICULATED</u> <u>HOPE</u>.

Alternatives:

- 1. MUFASA hope: NOTHING awaits you
- 2. <u>SERTA</u> hope: <u>REST</u> awaits you
- 3. OPRAH hope: all soul, no body
