### **SHARE**

What are your most treasured Advent/Christmas traditions? What is it about them that makes them meaningful?

## **READ/STUDY/DISCUSS**

- 1. Read **Isaiah 64:1-9**. What themes of hope do you hear in these verses? How are they accented by the need these verses express?
- 2. Isaiah is a long book of the Bible, but even so, it contains SO many prophecies about the coming Messiah, from the Virgin birth (Isaiah 7, 9) to His suffering (Isaiah 42, 49, 50, 52, 53). Amazingly, these were written around 700 years before the birth of Jesus! In the Old Testament, they didn't know the name "Jesus" yet, but they trusted God's promises. How would you describe *your* hope?
- 3. Read 1 Corinthians 1:3-9. What promise do you hear in these verses for those who wait? For what are we waiting?
- 4. Read **Mark** 13:24-37. The instructions are simple: "Stay awake!" Are you? What are the ways in which you get a little groggy when it comes to His coming? What are the ways you're alert?
- 5. Advent is all about preparation for the coming of Jesus. What does being prepared look like for you? What do you do while you wait??

#### **PRAY**

Pray that God would feed and encourage your soul during this season: in worship, in the Word, in fellowship, in prayer and reflection, in service and generosity, and in joy! Pray for others in this season who need an extra measure of God's presence.
