WHO DO YOU SAY I AM?

The Boy with the Evil Spirit, Mark 9:14-29

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Mark 9:14-19 And when they came to the disciples, they saw a great crowd around them, and scribes arguing with them. ¹⁵ And immediately all the crowd, when they saw him, were greatly amazed and ran up to him and greeted him. ¹⁶ And he asked them, "What are you arguing about with them?" ¹⁷ And someone from the crowd answered him, "Teacher, I brought my son to you, for he has a spirit that makes him mute. ¹⁸ And whenever it seizes him, it throws him down, and he foams and grinds his teeth and becomes rigid. So I asked your disciples to cast it out, and they were not able." ¹⁹ And he answered them, "O faithless generation, how long am I to be with you? How long am I to bear with you? Bring him to me."

When they came to the disciples...they were not able...O faithless generation (vv. 14-19): Jesus descends from his <u>glory</u> only to find chaos and disorder because of the <u>weak faith</u> of his disciples. This must have been discouraging.

Implied in Jesus' response is that he expected his disciples to be able to <u>operate</u> in enough faith to <u>handle</u> this situation.

How long am I to bear with you? (v. 19): The Jesus of the Bible was not the totally <u>accepting-of-anything</u> Jesus of American <u>culture</u>.

He has a spirit that makes him mute...seizes him, throws him...foams and grinds his teeth...becomes rigid (vv. 17-18): This statement by the father is intended to show the reader the <u>piling-up</u> of the <u>negative</u> effects from the evil one. Romans 1 is another example of this.

Romans 1:21, 24 and 26-28 For although they knew God, they neither glorified him as God nor gave thanks to him, but their thinking became futile and their foolish hearts were darkened.

24 Therefore **God gave them** over in the sinful desires of their hearts to sexual impurity for the degrading of their bodies with one another.

²⁶ Because of this, **God gave them** over to shameful lusts. Even their women exchanged natural sexual relations for unnatural ones. ²⁷ In the same way the men also abandoned natural relations with women and were inflamed with lust for one another. ²⁸ Furthermore, just as they did not think it worthwhile to retain the knowledge of God, so **God gave them over** to a depraved mind, so that they do what ought not to be done. ²⁹ They have become filled with every kind of wickedness,...

Mark 9:20-29 So they brought him. When the spirit saw Jesus, it immediately threw the boy into a convulsion. He fell to the ground and rolled around, foaming at the mouth. ²¹ Jesus asked the boy's father, "How long has he been like this?" "From childhood," he answered. ²² "It has often thrown him into fire or water to kill him. But if you can do anything, take pity on us and help us." ²³ "'If you can'?" said Jesus. "Everything is possible for one who believes." ²⁴ Immediately the boy's father exclaimed, "I do believe; help me overcome my unbelief!" ²⁵ When Jesus saw that a crowd was running to the scene, he rebuked the impure spirit. "You deaf and mute spirit," he said, "I command you, come out of him and never enter him again." ²⁶ The spirit shrieked, convulsed him violently and came out. The boy looked so much like a corpse that many said, "He's dead." ²⁷ But Jesus took him by the hand and lifted him to his feet, and he stood up. ²⁸ After Jesus had gone indoors, his disciples asked him privately, "Why couldn't we drive it out?" ²⁹ He replied, "This kind can come out only by prayer.

Mark 9:29 (NKJV) So He said to them, "This kind can come out by nothing but prayer and fasting."

Matthew 17:20-21 So Jesus said to them, "Because of your unbelief; for assuredly, I say to you, if you have faith as a mustard seed, you will say to this mountain, 'Move from here to there,' and it will move;

and nothing will be impossible for you. ²¹ However, this kind does not go out except by prayer and fasting."

Say to this mountain, Move... (Matthew 17:20): A mountain in 1st century Jewish culture was a metaphor for <u>huge problems</u>.

If you can? Said Jesus. Everything is possible for one who believes (v. 23): Of course, all things were possible for Jesus (except for <u>logical</u> impossibilities). The challenge here is for the <u>disciple</u>.

This must be understood in light of the whole <u>counsel</u> of God (Acts 20:27). James 4:2-3 Yet you do not have because you do not ask. ³ You ask and do not receive, because you ask amiss, that you may spend it on your pleasures.

"I do believe; help me overcome my unbelief!" (v. 24): This is the classic statement of the believer who desires to hold fast to the truth and promises of God and, yet, is subject to difficult <u>circumstances</u>, <u>doubt</u> from the enemy, and <u>emotional</u> ups and downs. We need God's help even to <u>believe</u>.

Why couldn't we drive it out?...only by prayer and fasting (vv. 28-29): First, this miracle teaches us that we need the power of God through faith to overcome the devastating effects of the <u>enemy</u>.

The disciples had been careless in their personal lives by <u>neglecting</u> prayer and <u>fasting</u>.

The authority given to the Church is effective only if exercised by faith that is immersed in spiritual <u>discipline</u> and <u>devotion</u>.

Romans 4:19-21 And not being weak in faith, he did not consider his own body, already dead (since he was about a hundred years old), and the deadness of Sarah's womb. ²⁰ He did not waver at the promise of God through unbelief, but **was strengthened in faith**, giving glory to God, ²¹ and being fully convinced that what He had promised He was also able to perform.
