Date/Title: 7/14/24 "The Ups and Downs of Ministry"
(Paul and Barnabas – Extreme Triumphs and Trials at Lystra and Derbe)



I. Text:

Acts 14:8-28 8 At Lystra a man was sitting who had no strength in his feet, lame from his mother's womb, who had never walked. 9 This man was listening to Paul as he spoke, who, when he had fixed his gaze on him and had seen that he had faith to be made well, 10 said with a loud voice, "Stand upright on your feet." And he leaped up and began to walk. 11 When the crowds saw what Paul had done, they raised their voice, saying in the Lycaonian language, "The gods have become like men and have come down to us." 12 And they began calling Barnabas, Zeus, and Paul, Hermes, because he was the chief speaker. 13 The priest of Zeus, whose temple was just outside the city, brought oxen and garlands to the gates, and wanted to offer sacrifice with the crowds. 14 But when the apostles Barnabas and Paul heard of it, they tore their robes and rushed out into the crowd, crying out 15 and saying, "Men, why are you doing these things? We are also men of the same nature as you, and preach the gospel to you that you should turn from these vain things to a living God, WHO MADE THE HEAVEN AND THE EARTH AND THE SEA AND ALL THAT IS IN THEM. 16 "In the generations gone by He permitted all the nations to go their own ways; 17 and yet He did not leave Himself without witness, in that He did good and gave you rains from heaven and fruitful seasons, satisfying your hearts with food and gladness." 18 Even saying these things, with difficulty they restrained the crowds from offering sacrifice to them. 19 But Jews came from Antioch and Iconium, and having won over the crowds, they stoned Paul and dragged him out of the city, supposing him to be dead. 20 But while the disciples stood around him, he got up and entered the city. The next day he went away with Barnabas to Derbe. 21 After they had preached the gospel to that city and had made many disciples, they returned to Lystra and to Iconium and to Antioch, 22 strengthening the souls of the disciples, encouraging them to continue in the faith, and saying, "Through many tribulations we must enter the kingdom of God." 23 When they had appointed elders for them in every church, having prayed with fasting, they commended them to the Lord in whom they had believed. 24 They passed through Pisidia and came into Pamphylia. 25 When they had spoken the word in Perga, they went down to Attalia. 26 From there they sailed to Antioch, from which they had been commended to the grace of God for the work that they had accomplished. 27 When they had arrived and gathered the church together, they began to report all things that God had done with them and how He had opened a door of faith to the Gentiles. 28 And they spent a long time with the disciples.

Overall, how can you account for or explain the huge swing of this crowd from one moment recognizing and trying to worship Paul and Barnabas as Greek gods, then to the next moment stoning Paul and dragging him out of the city? Also, did you notice it was only Paul who was stoned? (Did Paul keep talking, did Barnabas flee, or were they just not together when the crowd suddenly turned on them?

II. Introduction: Paul and Barnabas and the Lord Jesus know that ministry is Hard – people can flip on a dime

The hardest part of ministry thus far (for Chad) has been the many unexpected deaths of family members since we entered full time ministry 24 years ago in 2000. Second hardest was the internal division/church split in 2012 after confronting an Associate Pastor over Hyper-Calvinism (unbiblical doctrine that God plans/wills/ordains sin). Third, and most ongoing hard part of ministry is all the people who leave the church for relational/preference reasons (not doctrinal or philosophy of ministry reasons) and who don't practice Mt. 18 or Col. 3:12-17 and refuse to meet/communicate with the Elders and who are willing in an instant to jettison their leaders and Christian fellowship/friendships. So the hardest part is all the friends I've lost over the years as a Pastor from my perspective when I first correct/challenge them on sin, or when I say something they disagree with... when I have not changed my doctrine, have not done anything intentional against them, but have genuinely continued to love/shepherd them, teach them, pray for them, and do my best to set a good example for them – only for people to overly criticize or find fault in me, other leaders/Christians, and do not stay thankful or faithful in the church when they have their first relational challenge arise in the church. (Before modern times, you had to work out things in your church because it was the only church/body of fellowship and there was not a buffet of churches to choose from or bounce around from one to another at the first sign of trouble)

No one except the Lord Jesus experienced such dramatic highs and lows in ministry than Paul and Barnabas – can you imagine the highs of traveling to many places, leadings multitudes to the Lord, having the power of God to physically heal people, and even be thought of as a god so that people began to worship you... but then as you are trying to restrain people from worshipping you and assuring them you are just as normal/human as they - in the blink of an eye, agitators from the city you just left arrive and suddenly turn the crowds misguided amazement and urge to worship/sacrifice to mere men into a more misguided but just as equaled frenzy of anger to then stone and attempt to murder the very men they were seeking to worship moments before. Unbelievable turn around.

So also imagine the scene the absolute low of a crowd hurling rocks (probably not just small ones) at you with some force as to kill you, yet God miraculously allows you not only to survive after the vicious crowd left and your friends are surrounding you/looking down with grave concern/prayer, but then you also are strong enough to GO on the next day to the next city to keep on keepin on in preaching the gospel. Amazing highs and lows, ups and downs in ministry – my title today for our study of Acts 14:8-28 "the Ups and Downs of Ministry (extreme triumphs and trials of Paul and Barnabas at Lystra and Derbe.

Btw – the only more extreme turn about from a up/high in ministry to actual death – the lowest low – Is our Lord Jesus – remember the highs of him being worshipped and welcomed into Jerusalem on Palm Sunday? Riding on a donkey, people laying palm branches before him as they shouted "Hossanna, Hosanna in the highest? And yet just a couple days later the same city (maybe not the same people) was stirred up and agitated and turned against Jesus to the point they were screaming CRUCIFY CRUCIFY him and actually did kill./murder the very/one and only Son of God? Talk about an up to a down, and the greatest up and down of ministry possible. Which makes me thankful and comforted that Jesus understands me, is my perfect example in the triumps and trials of ministry of how to persevere and stay focused on the ultimate goal of future glory. Rememer that in our families and church families we must practice Philippians 2:5-11, Colossians 3:12-17, Hebrews 13:17 because the Lord is worthy and this is want He wants/commands believers to do.

What do you think is the hardest part or challenge for anyone serving in church ministry (Elder or Deacon or Member ... whether full time, part time or volunteer)? IV. Main Points: (Acts 14:8-28)

1. A Great Miracle – a man lame from birth is miraculously HEALED! (Acts 14:8-10)

- a. At Lystra (Acts 14, 6,8,21, 16:1,2, 2 Tim. 3:11)
- b. Healing of man lame from his mother's womb (reminds me of John 9:1-5 /Jesus heals man blind since birth)
- c. The Lame man had **FAITH** to be made well (Mt. 9:22, Mark 5:34, 10:52, Luke 8:48, 17:19, 18:42) (πίστις pistis: faith, faithfulness)
- d. The Apostles say with loud voice "Stand up on your feet!" (John 5:8 Get up and walk!)

2. A Great Reaction (but misinformed/misguided by false religion) to the Miracle (the gods have come down to us) (Acts 14:11-13)

- a. The misguided Crowd "the gods have become like men and have come down to us"
- b. Calling them Zeus and Hermes ... offer sacrifice with the crowds Take about a sudden turn about they go from calling Paul Hermes and Barabbas Zeus and the priest of a nearby temple to Zeus coming with people to officer sacrifices (garlands and oxen) to Paul and Barnabas (i.e. worshipping them) to in a short time totally flipping to try to kill them. Take about radical swings (ups & downs) in ministry.
- c. What's wrong with Greek mythology EVERYTHING
 - i. Polytheism MANY GODS
 - ii. Feminization of God
 - iii. Sexualization of God (tempting Gods)
 - iv. Imperfection of God (sinning Gods)
 - v. Warring God (injustice of Gods)

Overall - false religion is an afront to God's eternality, sovereignty, holiness, trinity, and omni's (omnipotence, omniscience, omnipresence)

3. A Great Truth - All glory/worship to God – none to man (Acts 14:14-15)

- a. Tore their robes we are also men same as you. We must Worship God alone not angels, not objects/icons/idols, not mere men (Mt. 4:10, Lk. 4:8, Acts 10:25-26, 12:21-23, 14:11-13, Rev. 19:10, 22:9), we must worship in spirit and TRUTH (John 4:24), btw Jesus received worship because He IS fully God (Mt. 2:11, 14:33, 21:9, 28:9, 28:17, Luke 24:52, John 9:38)
- b. Gospel turn from these vain things (Greek mythology Zeus and Hermes) (turn/repent to serve/worship a living God (who made heaven, earth, sea, all that is in them) (Exodus 20:11, Psalm 146:6)

4. A Great Mystery – why God allows and uses sin (but does not want/will/plan/ordain sin) (Acts 14:16-20)

- a. Permitted (ἐάω eao): to let alone, leave) God allowed all nations to go their own ways God permits/allows people and nations to sin but never plans sins, wills sin, or ordains sin He is not the author of evil (Satan is Read Ezek. 28:15, Hab. 1:13, Jer. 19:3-5
- b. God plans FOR sin...He does not plan sin. God relationship to sin is holy/set apart Habakkuk 1:12-13, Jeremiah 19:5, James 1:13, God is holy righteous and absolutely perfect Revelation 4:8/Isaiah 6:3, Dt. 32:4, 2 Sam. 22:31, Ps. 18:30, Mt. 5:48). God would never wish, will, or want rebellion against Himself (definition of sin, so very dangerous doctrine that asserts God plans sin He allows, He uses, He overcomes, He foresees but in no way is the author of sin as that is blasphemous because it affronts God's absolute perfection, goodness, and holiness.
- C. gotquestions.org Did God create evil? Why does God allow evil? Does God sometimes use evil to accomplish His plans? Is it true that God cannot look upon sin?

5. A Great Salvation (physical rescue/resuscitation) (Acts 14:18-22)

- a. Paul bounces back (likely miraculously sustained even raised from the dead in order to fulfill His God given mission) (see also a list of Paul's miraculous survival rate 2 Cor. 11:25-28)
- b. Acts 14:22 "Through many tribulations we must enter the Kingdom of God"
- c. 2 Tim. 3:12 "And indeed, all who desire to live godly in Christ Jesus will be persecuted."

6. A Great HARVEST of Souls (Acts 14:23-26)

- a. Preached the gospel, Made many disciples They persevered all of this till they reached their goal making many disciples in new areas.
- Returned to Lystra, Iconium, and Antioch. Paul was fearless, fully trusting and confidence in God to protect
 Him and use Him no matter what. Talk about boldness how many of you would return and pass through
 the place you just got almost stoned to death and mistreated?
- c. Through many tribulations we must enter the Kingdom of God His message as he passed through was inspiring to these new Christians and should also be inspiring to us
- d. Appointed elders for them in every church, Prayed with Fasting, Commended them in the Lord to whom they had believed. These new churches had a critical need Biblically qualified and faithful leader

7. A Great Example of Discipleship and Encouraging Missionary Report (Paul's home church – Antioch Syria) (Acts 14:24-28)


- a. Passed through Pisidia, Pamphylia, Perga, Attalia They preach, speak the word (instruct/encourage) the believers in each city that they pass back through (missionaries often need rest, encouragement, refitting during furloughs).
- b. Sailed to Antioch Return to their home church where they were commended/commissioned to the grace of God for the work that they had accomplished (Each of the 3 missionary journeys begin and end at Antioch, Syria)
- $c. \quad \text{Missionary report} \text{gather the church together} \text{report all the things that } \textbf{God had done} \text{ with/through them}.$

(A full report will also be given at the Jerusalem counsel – Acts 15)

- d. Open door of faith to the Gentiles (why Paul is the Apostle to the Gentiles
 - Rom. 1:5, 11:13, Gal. 2:8, 1 Tim. 2:7)
- e. **TIME** spent a long time with the disciples. It takes time to disciple new believers to basic maturity (Eph. 4)

V. Application: Have you been discipled 1 to 1? Are you discipling anyone 1 to 1 / passing the spiritual torch to the next generation? Colossians 4:2-6, Acts 16:1-3, 2 Tim. 3:10-11

Paul's First Missionary Journey • AD 47-49 • Acts 13:1-14:28




- Iconium: More plots force them to flee.
- 6. Lystra: When Paul heals a lame man, the townspeople think he and Barnabas are Greek gods. Jews from Antioch stir up the crowd, and Paul is stoned and left for dead. But Paul survives and goes back into the city.
- Derbe: Paul preaches and many disciples are added to the church.
- Antioch in Syria: The Holy Spirit sets apart Paul and Barnabas to be missionaries. John Mark goes along as their helper.
- Sailed from Seleucia to Salamis and Paphos (on Cyprus): Paul confronts a sorcerer named Elymas and blinds him. (From this point the Bible calls him Paul, rather than Saul.)
- Perga in Pamphylia: John Mark deserts the group and returns to Jerusalem.
- 4. Antioch of Pisidia: Paul preaches his longest recorded sermon, and many respond. Jewish leaders drive them out of the city. The Lord calls Paul to focus his ministry on Gentiles. The Gentiles are glad and many become believers.
- 5. Iconium: More plots force them to flee.

- Lystra: When Paul heals a lame man, the townspeople think he and Barnabas are Greek gods. Jews from Antioch stir up the crowd, and Paul is stoned and left for dead. But Paul survives and goes back into the city.
- Derbe: Paul preaches and many disciples are added to the church.
- Lystra, Iconium, Antioch of Pisidia, Pamphylia, Perga, Attalia: On the return trip, Paul and Barnabas appoint elders in the churches they had planted.
- Antioch (Syria): Paul remains there for a while, reporting what God had done. (Possibly writes Galatians from here.)
- Jerusalem, via Phoenicia and Samaria:
 In AD 49, Paul and Barnabas report to the leaders of the Jerusalem church. This meeting is known as the Jerusalem Council (Acts 15:1–35).






The Churches of Galatia




Timothy most likely from Lystra/Derbe area and saved during the 1st Missionary Journey

- Acts 16:1-2 And he came also to Derbe and to Lystra. And behold, a certain disciple was there, named Timothy, the son of a Jewish woman who was a believer, but his father was a Greek, ² and he was well spoken of by the brethren who were in Lystra and Iconium.
- 2 Timothy 3:10-17 10 But you followed my teaching, conduct, purpose, faith, patience, love, perseverance, ¹¹ persecutions, *and* sufferings, such as happened to me at Antioch, at Iconium and at Lystra; what persecutions I endured, and out of them all the Lord delivered me! 12 And indeed, all who desire to live godly in Christ Jesus will be persecuted. 13 But evil men and impostors will proceed from bad to worse, deceiving and being deceived. ¹⁴ You, however, continue in the things you have learned and become convinced of, knowing from whom you have learned *them*; ¹⁵ and that from childhood you have known the sacred writings which are able to give you the wisdom that leads to salvation through faith which is in Christ Jesus. ¹⁶ All Scripture is inspired by God and profitable for teaching, for reproof, for correction, for training in righteousness; 17 that the man of God may be adequate, equipped for every good work.















































Acts 14:5 Converts and Conflict in Iconium (5 D's-verses 14:1-5)

- "UnDeterred (indominable spirit) Apostles (never quit, never give up, never surrender!) "They spoke in a way that a large number of people believed" (Lit. "they spoke thus so that believed Jews and also Gentiles many multitudes") (Acts 19:8, 28:23-24, 2 Cor. 5:11)
- 2. Disbelieving the Jews who disbelieved STIRRED up (ἐπεγείρω epegeiro: to rouse up, excite) the minds (Lit. souls ψυχή psuche: breath, the soul) of the Gentiles to be embittered (κακόω kakoo: to ill-treat, harm, mistreat) against the brethren (Acts 13:50, 14:2)
 - Discord towards brethren embittered against the brethren (causing/spreading bitterness/ill-treatment (κακόω kakoo to ill-treat) the usual target is church leadership by casting doubt, suspicion/scrutiny, questioning motives, qualifications, comparisons, slander, fault-finding, diversion, critical spirit, anti-authoritarian, unteachableness) (Prov. 6:14, 6:16-19, 12:17, 19:5-9, Ps. 27:12, Eph. 4:25, Rom. 16:17-18, James 4:11, Titus 3:9-11, 1 Peter 2:11, Matthew 18:15-20, 1 Tim. 5:19-20, Col. 3:12-17)
- 1. Divided city people of the city were divided (σχίζω schizo: to cleave, split) (Mt 12:25, Mk. 3:24, Lk 11:17, *12:51–53, Acts 14:4, 23:7)
- 2. Danger seeking to mistreat (ὑβρίζω hubrizo: to run riot, to outrage, insult) and stone (λιθοβολέω lithoboleo: to pelt with stones, to stone them) the Apostles (overall Satan seeking to steal, kill, and destroy) (Mt. 21:35, Acts 5:26, 14:19, 2 Cor. 11:25,

Acts 14:6-7 - Pushing through the Pushback: Perseverance out of love for the lost (genuine concern for the eternal destiny of others)

Continued to preach the gospel (Lit. there preaching good news they were") in the cities of Lycaonia, Lystra, and Derbe) – Talk about undeterred – to keep going with the gospel and missionary work after someone tries to kill you twice – most might cut and run – but here they "continued to preach the gospel"

Love of others souls – That is love, perseverance, and plain old guts, courage, backbone, spine, and supernatural sustaining to carry on. But ultimately its love – agape – divine love that is selfless, sacrificial, unconditional amd genuinely cares about the well-being of others – especially their eternal well-being, safety, prosperity, and ultimately peace with God.

Romans 9:1-3 I am telling the truth in Christ, I am not lying, my conscience testifies with me in the Holy Spirit, ² that I have great sorrow and unceasing grief in my heart. ³ For I could wish that I myself were accursed, *separated* from Christ for the sake of my brethren, my kinsmen according to the flesh...Romans 10:1 Brethren, my heart's desire and my prayer to God for them is for *their* salvation.

God's desire and our desire for ALL people to be saved

- 1 Timothy 2:1-6 First of all, then, I urge that entreaties and prayers, petitions and thanksgivings, be made on behalf of all men, ² for kings and all who are in authority, so that we may lead a tranquil and quiet life in all godliness and dignity. ³ This is good and acceptable in the sight of God our Savior, ⁴ who desires all men to be saved and to come to the knowledge of the truth. ⁵ For there is one God, and one mediator also between God and men, the man Christ Jesus, ⁶ who gave Himself as a ransom for all, the testimony given at the proper time.
- 2 Peter 3:9 9 The Lord is not slow about His promise, as some count slowness, but is patient toward you, not wishing for any to perish but for all to come to repentance.
- Titus 2:10-14 but showing all good faith that they may adorn the doctrine of God our Savior in every respect. ¹¹ For the grace of God has appeared, bringing salvation to all men, ¹² instructing us to deny ungodliness and worldly desires and to live sensibly, righteously and godly in the present age, ¹³ looking for the blessed hope and the appearing of the glory of our great God and Savior, Christ Jesus; ¹⁴ who gave Himself for us, that He might redeem us from every lawless deed and purify for Himself a people for His own possession, zealous for good deeds.
- Ezekiel18:23 ²³ "Do I have any pleasure in the death of the wicked," declares the Lord God, "rather than that he should turn from his ways and live?
- 1 Timothy 4:9-10 9 It is a trustworthy statement deserving full acceptance. 10 For it is for this we labor and strive, because we have fixed our hope on the living God, who is the Savior of all men, especially of believers.

A Great Miracle - man lame from birth HEALED!

Acts 14:8-10 ⁸ And at Lystra there was sitting a certain man, without strength in his feet, lame from his mother's womb, who had never walked. ⁹ This man was listening to Paul as he spoke, who, when he had fixed his gaze upon him, and had seen that he had faith to be made well, ¹⁰ said with a loud voice, "Stand upright on your feet." And he leaped up and *began* to walk.

At Lystra (Acts 14, 6,8,21, 16:1,2, 2 Tim. 3:11)

Healing of man lame from his mother's womb (reminds me of John 9 /Jesus heals man blind since birth) Jn. 9:1–5 As He passed by, He saw a man blind from birth. ² And His disciples asked Him, "Rabbi, who sinned, this man or his parents, that he would be born blind?" ³ Jesus answered, "*It was* neither *that* this man sinned, nor his parents; but *it was* so that the works of God might be displayed in him. ⁴ "We must work the works of Him who sent Me as long as it is day; night is coming when no one can work. ⁵ "While I am in the world, I am the Light of the world."

Lame man had FAITH to be made well (Mt. 9:22, Mark 5:34, 10:52, Luke 8:48, 17:19, 18:42) (πίστις *pistis*: faith, faithfulness)






Acts 14:11–13 ¹¹ And when the multitudes saw what Paul had done, they raised their voice, saying in the Lycaonian language, "The gods have become like men and have come down to us." ¹² And they began calling Barnabas, Zeus, and Paul, Hermes, because he was the chief speaker. ¹³ And the priest of Zeus, whose temple was just outside the city, brought oxen and garlands to the gates, and wanted to offer sacrifice with the crowds.


Crowd - "the gods have become like men and have come down to us"

Calling Zeus and Hermes ... offer sacrifice with the crowds – Take about a sudden turn about – they go from calling Paul – Hermes and Barabbas – Zeus – and the priest of a nearby temple to Zeus coming with people to officer sacrifices (garlands and oxen) to Paul and Barnabas (i.e. worshipping them) to in a short time totally flipping to try to kill them. Take about radical swings (ups & downs) in ministry.




































All glory/worship to God - none to man

Acts 14:14-17 ¹⁴ But when the apostles, Barnabas and Paul, heard of it, they tore their robes and rushed out into the crowd, crying out ¹⁵ and saying, "Men, why are you doing these things? We are also men of the same nature as you, and preach the gospel to you in order that you should turn from these vain things to a living God, who made the heaven and the earth and the sea, and all that is in them. ¹⁶ "And in the generations gone by He permitted all the nations to go their own ways; ¹⁷ and yet He did not leave Himself without witness, in that He did good and gave you rains from heaven and fruitful seasons, satisfying your hearts with food and gladness."

Tore their robes – we are also men – same as you. We must Worship God alone – not angels, not objects/icons/idols, not mere men (Mt. 4:10, Lk. 4:8, Acts 10:25–26, 12:21–23, 14:11–13, Rev. 19:10, 22:9), we must worship in spirit and TRUTH (John 4:24), btw Jesus received worship because He IS fully God (Mt. 2:11, 14:33, 21:9, 28:9, 28:17, Luke 24:52, John 9:38)

Gospel - <u>turn</u> from these vain things (Greek mythology - Zeus and Hermes) (<u>turn/repent</u> to serve/worship a living God (who made heaven, earth, sea, all that is in them) (Exodus 20:11, Psalm 146:6)

God allows (but does not want/will/plan/ordain sin)

Permitted (ἐάω eao): to let alone, leave) God allowed all nations to go their own ways - God permits/allows people and nations to sin - but never plans sins, wills sin, or ordains sin - He is not the author of evil (Satan is - Ezek. 28:15 15 15 "You were blameless in your ways From the day you were created UNTIL unrighteousness was found in you.) Hab. 1:13 Your eyes are too pure to approve evil, And You can not look on wickedness with favor. Why do You look with favor On those who deal treacherously? Why are You silent when the wicked swallow up Those more righteous than they? Jer. 19:3-5 'Hear the word of the LORD, O kings of Judah and inhabitants of Jerusalem: thus says the LORD of hosts, the God of Israel, "Behold I am about to bring a calamity upon this place, at which the ears of everyone that hears of it will tingle. 4 "Because they have forsaken Me and have made this an alien place and have burned sacrifices in it to other gods, that neither they nor their forefathers nor the kings of Judah had ever known, and because they have filled this place with the blood of the innocent 5 and have built the high places of Baal to burn their sons in the fire as burnt offerings to Baal, a thing which I never commanded or spoke of, nor did it ever enter My mind;

God allows (but does not want/will/plan/ordain sin)

God plans FOR sin...He does not plan sin

(God relationship to sin is holy/set apart - Habakkuk 1:12-13, Jeremiah 19:5, James 1:13, God is holy righteous and absolutely perfect - Revelation 4:8/Isaiah 6:3, Dt. 32:4, 2 Sam. 22:31, Ps. 18:30, Mt. 5:48). God would never wish, will, or want rebellion against Himself (definition of sin, so very dangerous doctrine that asserts God plans sin – He allows, He uses, He overcomes, He foresees but in no way is the author of sin as that is blasphemous because it affronts God's absolute perfection, goodness, and holiness.





From one extreme to another (one minute worship the next stoning)

Acts 14:18-19 ¹⁸ And even saying these things, they with difficulty restrained the crowds from offering sacrifice to them. ¹⁹ But Jews came from Antioch and Iconium, and having won over the multitudes, they stoned Paul and dragged him out of the city, supposing him to be dead.





Paul bounces back (likely miraculously sustained even raised from the dead in order to fulfill His God given mission)

Acts 14:20-22 ²⁰ But while the disciples stood around him, he arose and entered the city. And the next day he went away with Barnabas to Derbe. ²¹ And after they had preached the gospel to that city and had made many disciples, they returned to Lystra and to Iconium and to Antioch, ²² strengthening the souls of the disciples, encouraging them to continue in the faith, and *saying*, "Through many tribulations we must enter the kingdom of God."

2 Tim. 3:12 ¹² And indeed, all who desire to live godly in Christ Jesus will be persecuted.

2 Cor. 11:25-28 ²⁵ Three times I was beaten with rods, once I was stoned, three times I was shipwrecked, a night and a day I have spent in the deep. ²⁶ I have been on frequent journeys, in dangers from rivers, dangers from robbers, dangers from *my* countrymen, dangers from the Gentiles, dangers in the city, dangers in the wilderness, dangers on the sea, dangers among false brethren; ²⁷ I have been in labor and hardship, through many sleepless nights, in hunger and thirst, often without food, in cold and exposure. ²⁸ Apart from *such* external things, there is the daily pressure upon me *of* concern for all the churches.

Acts 14:21-23 Perseverance and ministry on the way home


Acts 14:23–26 ²³ And when they had appointed elders for them in every church, having prayed with fasting, they commended them to the Lord in whom they had believed. ²⁴ And they passed through Pisidia and came into Pamphylia. ²⁵ And when they had spoken the word in Perga, they went down to Attalia; ²⁶ and from there they sailed to Antioch, from which they had been commended to the grace of God for the work that they had accomplished.

Preached the gospel, Made many disciples - They persevered all of this till they reached their goal - making many disciples in new areas.

Returned to Lystra, Iconium, and Antioch. Paul was fearless, fully trusting and confidence in God to protect Him and use Him no matter what. – Talk about boldness how many of you would return and pass through the place you just got almost stoned to death and mistreated?

Through many tribulations we must enter the Kingdom of God – His message as he passed through was inspiring to these new Christians and should also be inspiring to us

Appointed elders for them in every church, Prayed with Fasting, Commended them in the Lord to whom they had believed. – These new churches had a critical need – Biblically qualified and faithful leaders



- Acts 14:23 ²³ And when they had <u>appointed elders for them in every church</u>, having prayed with fasting, they commended them to the Lord in whom they had believed.
- Tit. 1:5-9 ⁵ For this reason I left you in Crete, that you might set in order what remains, and appoint elders in every city as I directed you, 6 namely, if any man be above reproach, the husband of one wife, having children who believe, not accused of dissipation or rebellion. ⁷ For the overseer must be above reproach as God's steward, not self-willed, not quick-tempered, not addicted to wine, not pugnacious, not fond of sordid gain, 8 but hospitable, loving what is good, sensible, just, devout, self-controlled, 9 holding fast the faithful word which is in accordance with the teaching, that he may be able both to exhort in sound doctrine and to refute those who contradict.

Acts 14:24–28 Travel back to the sending church to give Missions Update/Report

Acts 14:27-28 ²⁷ And when they had arrived and gathered the church together, they *began* to report all things that God had done with them and how He had opened a door of faith to the Gentiles. ²⁸ And they spent a long time with the disciples.

Passed through Pisidia, Pamphylia, Perga, Attalia – They preach, speak the word (instruct/encourage) the believers in each city that they pass back through (missionaries often need rest, encouragement, refitting during furloughs).


Sailed to Antioch – Return to their home church – where they were commended/commissioned to the grace of God for the work that they had accomplished (Each of the 3 missionary journeys begin and end at Antioch, Syria)

Missionary report – gather the church together – report all the things that God had done with/through them. (A full report will also be given at the Jerusalem counsel – Acts 15)

Open door of faith to the Gentiles (why Paul is the Apostle to the Gentiles – Rom. 1:5, 11:13, Gal. 2:8, 1 Tim. 2:7)

TIME - spent a long time with the disciples. It takes time to disciple new believers to basic maturity (Eph. 4)

5. New Testament Read-Through Class:

The class time will summarize the major events and teachings of the life of Christ, the early church, and the New Testament books. Correspondingly, participants will be encouraged to read the New Testament through chronologically in 6 months



(1 chapters a day) and highlight the commands and promises they encounter in order to "see" God's will and enabling for the Christian life. The class time will summarize the major events and teachings of the Old Testament: Creation, Fall, Flood, Babel, Abraham and the Patriarchs, Egypt and the Exodus, Wilderness Wanderings, Conquest of Canaan, Period of the Judges, Israel's First Kings and United Kingdom, Kings of Israel and Judah during the Divided Kingdom, Decline, Defeat, and Exile by the Assyrians and Babylonians, Return and Rebuilding under the Medo-Persians, and 400 silent years until the time of the Christ.




