He begins each poem with the first letter of the Hebrew _____ and progresses through the alphabet as he writes each verse, literally weeping “from A to Z.”

Suddenly, amidst his weeping, Jeremiah cries out to God, “Great is thy _____” (Lam. 3:23), and acknowledges that even amidst _____, God is _____ to those who love Him.
