Attacks on the Northern Kingdom of _____:

740–738 BC: Assyrian King Tiglath-pileser III invaded the regions east of the Jordan River and Galilee, exacting tribute and exiling northern _____ tribes (Reuben, Gad, and Manasseh). (Isa. 7:16; 8:4; 17:1–3)

733–732 BC: Assyrian King Tiglath-pileser III returned, attacking _____ and annexing further northern and eastern territories of Israel, deporting more inhabitants. (Isaiah 10:9–11)

727 BC: Shalmaneser V ascends to the Assyrian throne. King Hoshea initially remains a _____ vassal.

725–722 BC: King Hoshea, the last king of Israel, attempts to break free from Assyrian vassalage by _____ annual tribute and seeking an alliance with _____. Hoshea stopped paying annual tribute to Assyria and revolted. In response, Assyrian King Shalmaneser V began a three-year siege of Samaria, the capital of _____, which resulted in the arrest of Hoshea and the fall of Samaria in 722 BC. (Isaiah 28:1–4; 2 Kgs. 17:3–6)
