

Sermon Outline: ACT(ion)S - Learning from the Early Church

Scriptures:

Acts 1:1-3, Acts 1:16-17, John 5:19, Acts 1:20, Acts 2:1, Acts 2:5-6, Acts 2:12, Acts 2:13, Acts 2:14, Acts 2:40, Acts 2:44-47

Introduction: The Power of an Origin Story

- **Illustration:** Every superhero has an origin story, often shaped by loss (Batman, Spider-Man, Superman, etc.).
- Parallel: The Book of Acts serves as the origin story of the Church.
- Historical Context: Written around 62 AD by Luke, a physician and companion of Paul.

I. The Foundation of the Early Church

A. The Resurrection – The Ultimate Proof

- Acts 1:1-3 Jesus presented Himself alive by many infallible proofs.
- **Importance of evidence:** Sir William Ramsey, a skeptic-turned-believer, confirmed Luke's historical accuracy.

B. The Disciples' Obedience to Scripture

- Acts 1:16-17 Peter references prophecy about Judas' betrayal.
- John 5:19 Jesus followed the Father's example; the disciples did the same.
- Acts 1:20 Peter uses the Psalms to guide the decision to replace Judas.

II. The Power of Unity and the Holy Spirit

A. The Command to Wait and Pray

- Acts 2:1 The disciples were together in unity before Pentecost.
- Key point: Obedience to God's Word precedes the outpouring of the Spirit.

B. The Holy Spirit's Arrival Brings Action

- **Illustration**: A stadium in Australia caused curiosity before people realized its purpose—similar to Pentecost.
- Acts 2:5-6 The crowd gathered in bewilderment at the Spirit's work.

III. Five Responses to the Holy Spirit's Move

- 1. **Bewildered Interest** Acts 2:5-6
- 2. Utter Amazement Acts 2:12
- 3. Mocking and Skepticism Acts 2:13
- 4. Boldness to Proclaim Acts 2:14
- 5. **Unified Support** Peter stands with the eleven

IV. The Impact of the Spirit-Filled Church

A. The Message of Salvation

• Acts 2:40 – Peter calls people to repentance.

B. A Transformed Community

 Acts 2:44-47 – The believers shared all things, worshiped together, and experienced daily growth.

- Are we responding with boldness or skepticism when God moves?
