Sermon Title: No Ordinary Family - Week 3

"Families and Friction"

I. The Family as a Garden (Illustration by Charles Swindoll)

"A family is like a garden..." – cultivating love, unity, and character.

Fifteen Rows of Planting:

- 4 Peas: Preparedness, Perseverance, Promptness, Politeness
- 3 Squash: Gossip, Criticism, Indifference
- 5 Lettuce: Be Faithful, Unselfish, Loyal, Loving, Truthful

- 3 Turnips: Show up with a Smile, New Idea, Determination
- Takeaway: Like gardens, families need tending—and so does the family of God.

II. The Empty Aquarium: A Modern Parable

- What should be simple (water, food, filter) becomes complex when something disrupts the system.
- **Point:** The wrong environment can lead to unexpected conflict and casualties—even in something as basic as community.

III. Paul's Visit to Jerusalem - Galatians 2:1-10

- Paul, Barnabas, and Titus meet privately with Peter, James, and John (Galatians 2:2).
- Paul seeks confirmation of unity in the gospel, not personal gain.
- He refuses to bend to false teachers—even briefly (v.5).
- Lesson: Even with confidence in your calling, seek accountability and unity with other believers.

IV. False Teachers vs. True Gospel

- False teachers seek influence, not truth.
- Example: A TV preacher twisting Psalm 49:16 to justify wealth, without context.

Principle: God doesn't give exclusive "truth" to one person. True gospel invites scrutiny and communal affirmation.

V. Agreement and Assignment – Galatians 2:7–10

- Peter = Apostle to Jews
- Paul = Apostle to Gentiles

- Same gospel, different fields.
- (v.7) "They saw that God had given me the responsibility..."
- Unity is not uniformity. God's assignments differ, but the gospel remains the same.

VI. The Conflict in Antioch – Galatians 2:11–14

- Peter avoids eating with Gentiles when Jewish leaders arrive.
- Paul publicly confronts him: "You're not living in line with the truth of the gospel."
- Modern Analogy:
 - o "It's Your Ship" by Capt. Abrashoff: Breaking down barriers between officers and enlisted men.
 - Real leadership joins people, not divides them.
- **Key Thought:** Compromise with culture or peer pressure undermines the gospel.

VII. Paul's Declaration of Gospel Freedom – Galatians 2:15–21

"We are made right with God by faith in Jesus Christ, not by obeying the law..." (v.16)

Illustration: The Sad Baloney Omelet

- Trying to live under law is like cooking without the right tools—disappointing, wasteful, and joyless.
- Grace is like Mom calling and saying, "Dinner's ready—just come."

♠ Point: The gospel is not "bring what you have and I'll make it work." It's "come and receive what I've prepared."

VIII. Conclusion: Crucified with Christ – Galatians 2:19–21

"It is no longer I who live, but Christ lives in me..."

Y Like a garden, growth comes from continual tending—not rule-keeping.

- Faith in Christ brings freedom, not frustration.
- "If righteousness could be gained through the law, Christ died for nothing."

Application

- Are you living more like Peter—changing based on who's watching?
- Or like Paul—unshaken, even when it means confrontation?
- Is your gospel more like rules—or more like an invitation?
