Altared – Week 2: An Altar of Repentance

"A threefold cord is not easily broken." — Ecclesiastes 4:12 (NLT)

Big Idea:

True repentance is more than regret—it's surrender. When paired with worship and sacrifice, it builds a spiritual life that's strong, connected, and transformative.



1. The Purpose of Repentance

- "I baptize with water those who repent... but one is coming who will baptize with the Holy Spirit and with fire."
- *Matthew 3:11 (NLT)*
- Repentance is the starting point for a Spirit-filled life.
- It allows God to remove what doesn't belong.

Illustration: Repentance is spiritual anesthesia—it makes healing and correction possible without unnecessary pain.

1 2. Two Kings, Two Responses

- X King Saul: Religion Without Repentance
 - Acted in fear and impatience (1 Samuel 13)
 - Used an altar he didn't build (1 Samuel 14:35)
 - Refused to own his sin (1 Samuel 14:38)

"You have not kept the command of the Lord... your kingdom must end."

- 1 Samuel 13:13-14
- King David: Sin, Confrontation, and Sincere Repentance
 - Confessed: "I have sinned against the Lord." (2 Samuel 12:13)
 - Mourned, fasted, and sought God
 - Wrote Psalm 51 a model prayer of repentance

- "Create in me a clean heart, O God..."
- Psalm 51:10 (ESV)
- "The sacrifices of God are a broken spirit..."
- Psalm 51:17 (ESV)

3. What Real Repentance Looks Like

- Not just avoiding consequences—but turning your heart.
- Not longing for the past—but burying what once defined you.
- Leads to restoration, testimony, and deeper joy.

Charles Spurgeon:

"If I hate sin because of the punishment, I have not repented; I merely regret that God is just."

🛐 4. The Call to Build

"If My people... will humble themselves... turn from their wicked ways... I will hear from heaven."

- 2 Chronicles 7:14 (NLT)
- The altar isn't a whipping post—it's where transformation happens.
- When we build an Altar of Repentance, God responds with mercy, healing, and restoration.
