ACT(ion)S: Week 11 - The Gospel on Trial

Text: Acts 21–26

Theme: Paul's trials reflect the Gospel under pressure—but with purpose. Jesus, once wrongly accused, rose again, and now empowers Paul (and us) to stand firm.

1. A Risen Savior, A Familiar Story (Easter Connection)

- Jesus was wrongfully accused, tried, and crucified, but He rose again.
- Paul, like Jesus, is also put on trial
- Easter isn't just about an empty tomb—it's about the **power to stand** even when everything seems against you.

2. Law & Order: Jerusalem Edition (Acts 21–26 Overview)

"In the justice system... these are their stories."

Groups at play:

- o Paul and his fellow believers
- The accusers (religious leaders)
- The Roman officials (law, justice, and protection)

3. Paul's Arrest & Prophetic Warning (Acts 21)

- Agabus prophesies Paul's arrest (21:10–14).
- Paul's resolve: "I am ready... to die for the Lord Jesus."
- Application: Are we willing to walk in obedience, even when it costs?

4. Paul Testifies (Acts 22)

- Paul speaks in Hebrew—relating to his audience.
- Shares his testimony and encounter with Jesus:

```
"Saul, Saul, why are you persecuting me?"
"I am Jesus of Nazareth."
```

- The crowd explodes at the mention of Gentiles.
- Paul uses Roman citizenship to protect himself.

5. On Trial – Before the Sanhedrin (Acts 23)

- Paul appeals to resurrection, causing division.
- Jesus appears: "Take courage... you must testify in Rome." (23:11)
- Plot to kill Paul is uncovered—God protects him.

6. Felix, Festus, and Agrippa (Acts 24–26)

- Paul is on trial for years—not guilty, but never released.
- He speaks boldly before rulers:
 - Felix delays justice (24)
 - Festus is confused (25)
 - Agrippa is almost convinced (26)

"Do you think you can persuade me to become a Christian so quickly?"

Application: When we share our faith, some will mock, some will delay, some will walk away—but
we still plant seeds.

7. Threads of the Gospel (Reflection & Application)

- Paul's story reflects Jesus' journey to the cross.
- Paul stands not in his strength, but in resurrection power.
- We may be accused, misunderstood, or even mistreated—but our mission is to testify to Jesus.

8. Lessons for the Church

- Paul Went to Jerusalem despite knowing the outcome
- Arrested and threatened to be killed by jealous leaders
- Instead of remaining silent, Paul decided to speak in his own defense
- When this wasn't working, he made sure his Identity as a Roman was recognized.

9. Tie-In Verses (Paul's Letters in Context)

- Romans 14: "Don't be a stumbling block."
- Romans 7: "I don't do what I want, but what I hate."
- Ephesians 4: "Be angry and do not sin."
- *Philippians 2*: "Let this mind be in you which was in Christ Jesus..." "He humbled Himself... even to death on a cross."
